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PUBLISHERS' FOREWORD.

THE great interest evinced in the first issue of the Dictionary of Organs and Organists fully justified its publication as a first attempt to give, in a collective form, particulars of the Organs and Organists of the British Isles.

It was realized that the publication was then far from complete, but in presenting this Second Edition we are happy to think that at any rate the more serious omissions have been rectified and there is now included considerably more information than was given in the first issue.

For this we have to thank primarily the innumerable Organists throughout the Kingdom who have supplied information for inclusion in the book, but this foreword would be incomplete without an acknowledgment of our indebtedness to the Federation of Master Organ Builders for the valued assistance it has afforded in compiling and verifying as far as possible the particulars of organs included in Part II. The interest evinced by the Federation has enabled us to include particulars of numerous organs which would not otherwise have been obtainable, for all of which we take this opportunity of expressing our sincere appreciation to this organization.

We desire also to convey our thanks to all who have in any way helped to bring this edition to a successful issue, and not the least those authors whose painstaking labours are evidenced in tangible form in the articles contained in Part I., which, we venture to think, will form a valuable addition to the Bibliography of the Organ.

A considerable amount of time has, of necessity, elapsed during the compilation of such a comprehensive work, and, despite the safeguards adopted to eliminate errors, both of omission and commission, it is certain that, even as the book leaves the press, some few records will be out of date. We feel sure, however, that our readers will not hastily condemn the book on this score, but will rather judge the work as a whole, and if some inaccuracies are found, will, as in the past, lend us their valued co-operation in correcting the information in our hands, as well as by keeping us advised of changes of interest as such occur. Not only will such co-operation be most welcome, but will enable us to make of still more interest to all lovers of the King of Instruments our *Dictionary of Organs & Organists*, the *Second Edition* of which we herewith submit to the appreciation of our readers.

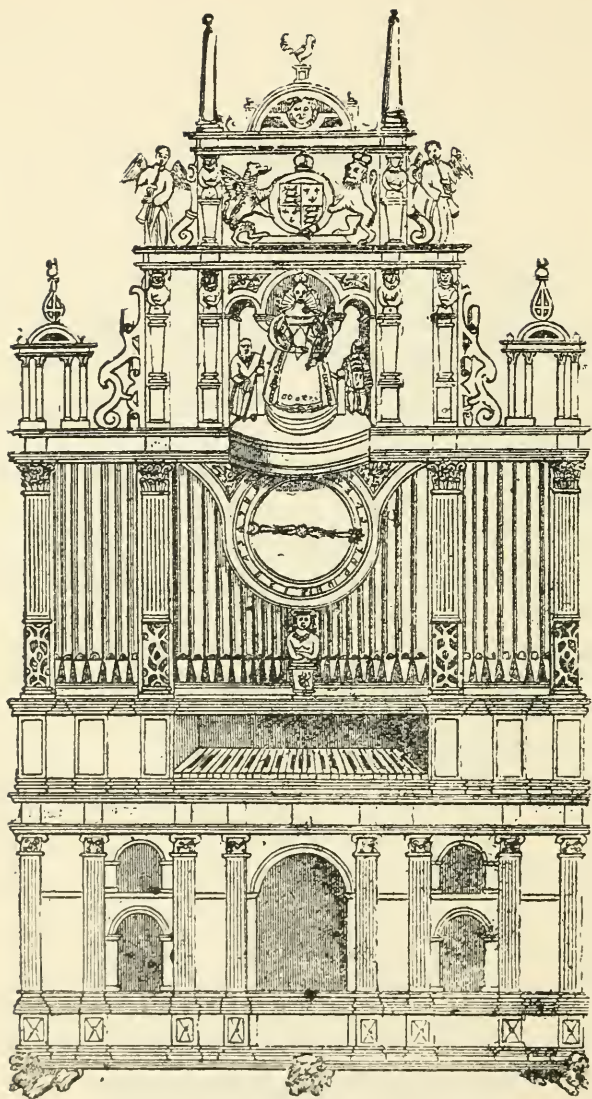

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THOMAS DALLAM'S TURKISH ORGAN.—Presented by Queen Elizabeth to the Sultan in 1599. It contained "five whole stops of pipes, viz., one open, principal unison, recorder, octavo principal, and a flute, besides a shaking stop, a drum and a nightingale." It contained also several curious mechanical devices, and could be played either by means of the keyboard or by a barrel. The latter was worked by clock-work, and was capable of continuous playing for six hours "without any intermission, or ceasing, or discord." The case was elaborately carved, painted and gilded. The cost was £550.

Under this title are here collected the names of a hundred and sixty-one persons who made, repaired, or tuned organs in various parts of the British Isles, for the most part in England, from the earliest times up to the Restoration of the Monarchy in 1660—together with as much information about them and their works as I have been able to gather, and the space at my disposal permits me to give.

The publication of church accounts and of other historical documents is productive of a constant stream of fresh *data* so that no list of this kind can ever be considered to be in any sense exhaustive. It is believed, however, that of its kind and for its period the one here given is the most complete that has yet appeared.

With the exception of a few families of organ-builders, notably the Howes and the Chappingtons, chronological order has been observed as far as possible in the sequence of names, the deciding factor in this arrangement being the earliest date at which the several builders can be shown to have been engaged in their calling. Since only those organs are mentioned which can be associated with a particular craftsman, many historic organs, including not a few which have survived to this day, are passed over as being outside the scope of this survey. Even with this limitation the organs in no less than a hundred and thirty-seven buildings are dealt with in their turn.

In order to limit to some extent the number of references, it should be said that, except where otherwise stated, all information here given as to the organs at Magdalen College, Oxford, is taken from Bloxam's Registers of that Foundation (Vol. ii.) ; as to King's College, Cambridge, from *The Ecclesiologist* for December, 1859 ; as to the two Salisbury churches of S. Edmund and S. Thomas from the transcript of their accounts published by the Wilts Record Society under the editorship of Mr. H. J. F. Swayne ; as to S. Andrew's, Canterbury, from Mr. C. Cotton's papers in *Archæologia Cantiana*, Vol. 32, pp. 1-62 ; as to St. Laurence's, Reading, and Holy Trinity, Coventry, from Histories of those churches written by the Rev. Charles Kerry and Thomas Sharp, respectively ; and as to Ludlow Church from the Transcript of the Accounts by Mr. Llewellyn Jones in the Shropshire Archæological and Natural History Society's Proceedings 1889-93. Where no reference is given, the information has usually been extracted directly from the original documents.

The following abbreviations have been used in the foot-notes, as well as a few others which need no explanation :—

H. & R. = *The Organ*, by Hopkins and Rimbault (3rd edition).

E.M.C.O. = *The English Mediæval Church Organ*, by Dr. Hopkins (a reprint of a paper in *The Archæological Journal* for 1888, Vol. 45).

M.T. = *The Musical Times* (year and page only given).

L.C.C. = *London City Churches and their Organs*, by Dr. C. W. Pearce.

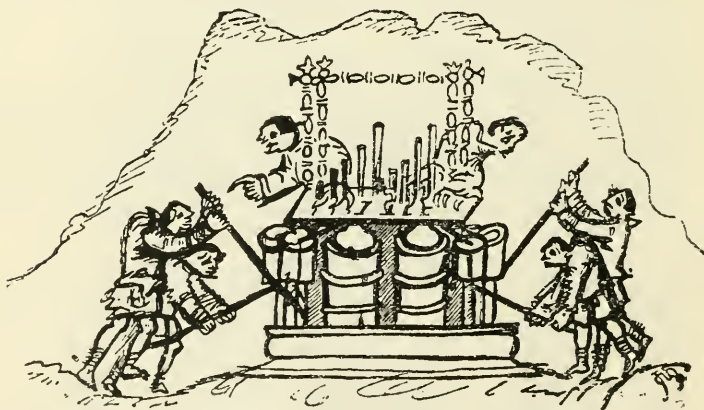
To all these sources, and to others mentioned later, from which I have freely quoted, I acknowledge my deep indebtedness.

1. SAINT DUNSTAN.

S. Dunstan, who was born at Glastonbury *c.* 924, seems to have owed his education in music, painting and the mechanical arts to the tuition he received from certain Irish monks who had settled in the Abbey of his native place. His career as Abbot of Glastonbury, Chief Treasurer of England, Bishop of London, and, finally, Archbishop of Canterbury, does not interest us here so much as his skill as a craftsman.

Dr. W. H. Grattan Flood* (quoting from Osbern's *Vita S. Dunst.* and Hook's *Archbishops of Canterbury*, Vol. I.) says that Dunstan was taught the art of organ-building "by Irish masters in Glastonbury." He is said to have erected, or caused to be erected, several organs in the West of England. As he was certainly a skilled artificer, there can be little doubt that some of them, at least, were the work of his own hands, whilst others were made under his immediate supervision.

Amongst the organs which he gave, and probably made, were those in the Abbey Churches at Glastonbury, Abingdon and Malmesbury. William of Malmesbury describing the last-named instrument, says:—"The wind, being forced out of the instrument by the violence of the *hot* water, fills the whole cavity of the instrument, which, from several apertures, passing through *brass* pipes, sends forth musical noises."†

The reference to *hot* water proves this instrument to have been a hydraulus, in which water was the means whereby a more or less constant pressure of wind was maintained. Slight overblowing at every stroke of the bellows levers was one of the inherent defects in all organs constructed on this principle. Since the overplus of wind had to make its escape by *bubbling through the water*, ancient writers, William of Malmesbury amongst them, thought that the water was *boiling*. At least that was how they described it, and the result was that the principle of the hydraulic organ was completely misunderstood until comparatively recent years.

Towards the close of his life Dunstan is said to have returned with renewed zest to the delights of his earlier years—the manufacture of bells and musical instruments. He died in 988.

2. SAINT ÆTHELWOLD.

S. Æthelwold was born at Winchester. He became a Monk at Glastonbury where Dunstan, under whom he probably acquired his skill in metal work and the allied crafts, was Abbot. He became Abbot of Abingdon in 955. Whilst there he restored the Abbey and "also made with his own hands an organ"* and other furniture for the Church.

He became Bishop of Winchester in 963 and died in 984—four years before his friend and patron, Dunstan.

3. HUGH LE ORGANER.

The Calendar of Patent Rolls records that Hugh was granted a pardon at Dunfermline on November 10th, 1303, for causing the death of William, son of William de Gunewardly. He has the distinction of being the first known lay organ-builder.

4. ROBERT ORGANER.

Robert lived at Spalding, Lincolnshire, in the early part of the 14th century. The Calendar of Patent Rolls, under date December 3rd, 1308, records a grant, at the request of Isabel, queen of England, and of Joan Wake, the King's cousin, to a large number of persons, amongst whom Robert is included, all "men of Spaldyng, and there dwelling, that they and their heirs dwelling in the said town shall be quit of paying tolls, pavage, pontage, stallage, lastage and murage from their own goods and merchandise in Spaldyng and through all Holand except the town of Boston during the fair of Boston."

5. PETER LE ORGANER.

Peter is also styled Peter le Organistre, so that he was in all probability both a maker and player of organs. The Calendar of Patent Rolls, under date June 14th, 1310, includes Peter in a list of persons who were pardoned "for entering the close of Thomas de Tydenton, late parson of the church of Pilardinton Hercy, at that place, breaking his doors and windows, and carrying away his goods." From a "commission of oyer and terminer," dated the 21st of the following August, we learn that amongst the delinquents were certain ecclesiastics who ought to have known better, since one was John de Derby, dean of S. Chad's, Lichfield, another John, Prior of Monk's Kirby, and a third, William, Abbot of Stoneleye.

6. THOMAS DE LEDENHAM.

"In the year 1311 a fee of twenty shillings was paid to Thomas de Ledenham, Vicar, for taking care of the organs, *blowing* and cleaning them."* This is the first reference to the organ at Lincoln Cathedral yet discovered in the Records.

7. WALTER THE ORGANER.

No specific organ can up to the present be credited to this craftsman. His one known *opus* is a clock : this he set up in S. Paul's Cathedral in 1344.†

8. JOHN THE ORGANER.

Master John the Organer repaired the organ which King John of France, while an English prisoner, took with him from Hertford to Somerton Castle, in 1359.‡

9. JOHN COUPER.

Couper was employed about the organ at York Minster in 1419, but, unfortunately, the only mention of him in the Fabric Rolls of the Minster is of an indefinite nature, leaving it uncertain whether he was an organ-builder or an ordinary carpenter :—

"For constructing two pair of bellows for the organ ... 46s. 8d.

For constructing the ribs of the bellows of the same organ,

by John Couper ... 12d."§

10. THOMAS SEYNTJOHN, OF LONDON.

This builder is from a list compiled by Dr. W. H. Grattan Flood from the Patent Rolls for the years 1429-1441.|| Thomas Seyntjohn, of London, "organ maker," was granted a "pardon" on June 29, 1430, but nothing is said as to the nature of his offence.

11. WILLIAM BARBOUR, of Brussels and Westminster.

12. LAWRENCE, of Nymmegen and London.

These two are included in an entry in the Patent Rolls, which shows that they were granted letters of denization on April 8th, 1436. This was in the form of a "Mandate to all bailiffs and others to permit . . . [name here] . . . who has taken an oath of fealty to inhabit the realm peaceably and enjoy his goods."

They are therefore the first two known foreign builders who became naturalized and plied their trade in England, though whether as master-workmen or as journeymen it is not possible to say.

13. JOHN HEMDEN.

On July 5, 1440, the Calendar of Patent Rolls records a Plea of debt of £10 to John Hemden, "citizen and organ-maker of London."

14. ARNALD ORGANER, OF NORWICH.

In September, 1442, this builder agreed to set up a new organ in the quire at Lincoln Cathedral, the work to be finished before the ensuing Christmas, and the cost to be five marks.¶

He may possibly be identified with the Arnald Mynhamber mentioned next below.

15. ARNALD MYNHAMBER.

16. JOHN ASHWELL.

These two organ-builders, both of Norwich, took up the Freedom of that City in 1446.*

17. SIR JOHN.

This person, who was a priest, received 12*d.* in 1444 "for the amendyng of the organs" at S. Mary's, Sandwich. He may have been the same Sir John who, in 1463, was paid 6*s.* 8*d.* "for hys playyng at organys" at the same church.†

18. NICHOLAS RAWNCE.

According to the recently published "Memorials of the Cathedral and Priory of Christ in Canterbury," by C. E. Woodruff and W. Danks, this builder received 66*s.* 5½*d.* for making "one pair of organs" for that Cathedral Church in 1447.

19. JOHN HUDENE.

Hudene built an organ for the Church at Saffron Walden in 1451:—

30 Hen. VI. p. costs & cariageo de organis & Johi Hudene organ maker & pro suo, viij s.

Mention is made at the same time of John Taylor who played on this organ (*p. luden. sup. organa*); John Janyn, "lokyer," who provided a key, hinges and lock (*p. clavis de organs, henges & loke*); John Dawis, "joynor" who raised it into its assigned position (*p. exaltacone organu*); and John Tracy who made a hole in the wall to take the beam to which it was fixed (for md of holis in ye walle p. pt. organ bem).‡

20. JOHN ROOSE, OR ROUSE.

Roose was a brother of the order of the Preaching Friars, which accounts for his exercising his skill as an organ-builder at places as far apart as Kilkenny and York. Mr. Abdy Williams§ credits him with the construction of an organ at the former place in 1450, while the Fabric Rolls of York Minster for 1457 record that he "repaired and restored the organ at the altar of the B.V.M. . . . and one pair of bellows for the same," for which he received 36*s.* 8*d.*

Another entry from the same Rolls probably refers to Roose:—

1469 "To brother John for constructing two pair of bellows for the great organ, and repairing of the same, 15*s.* 2*d.*||

An entry in the account books of King's College, Cambridge, dated 1501, quite possibly refers to Roose, but in this instance he is paid ijs. for playing the organs, not for mending them. ["Sol. in regardis datis Dno. Roose jubilanti in organis pro sex Septimanis, ijs."]

21. WILL.

"In 1453 the sum of 20*s.* was paid to 'Will, organ-maker, for mending the organs, with the bellows of the same,'" at Ripon Minster.¶

The following, from the Records of S. Margaret's, Westminster,** may possibly refer to this craftsman:—

1460-1 "Item rec' de Willo Orgonmaker die sepultur" [no amount given].

22. ROBERT HARPMAKER.

Robert was paid 2*d.* for repairing two of the keys belonging to the organs at S. Augustine's Church, Hedon (Yorks) in 1453.††

23. ARNOLD JOHNSON, OF GORLESTON.

This "Orggmaker" is mentioned in the Yarmouth Corporation Records of 1462-63, presumably in connection with the organ in the Parish Church of that town.*

24. JOHN DYER, OF OXFORD.

In 1469 the Churchwardens of S. Mary's, Thame, "payd Jhon Dyer organ maker of Oxford for mending of the Organts and makyng the belyis new for owr part vs. vjd."†

25. GEORGE, THE ORGAN MAKER.

"About 1470, George, the organ maker, set up new organs in S. John's Church, Glastonbury, and Stephen, the carver, helped him, and also made a canopy out of *wenscott* over the altar."‡

26. GEORGE GAUNTE.

27. RICHARD SOWERBY.

These two persons whose names occur in the Fabric Rolls of York Minster mended the organs of that church in 1470 and 1473 respectively.§

28. WILLIAM PLOMER.

29. WILLIAM SADELER.

The Churchwardens' Accounts of Andover Parish Church furnish the only reference I have so far come across to these two craftsmen:—

1471. "Unto William Plomer for amending of the organys, 1s. 0d."

1472. "To William Plomer and William Sadeler for amending of the wyndbagge of the organys, 6d. For a Skynne to the same, 3d."

Another item belonging to the latter year—"Unto William Plomer for workmanship of plomer's werk upon the Chyrch, and sowdyr 1l. 0s. 0d."—leads to the conclusion that neither William was an organ-builder, but that they were a plumber and a saddler, respectively, who were called in to render "first aid" in the absence of a professional builder. The inclusion of the two names in this list seems justified if only on account of the combination of trades, which is very suggestive.||

30. WILLIAM BELL.

31. JOHN GIBBES.

Of these two, Bell may have been an organ-builder proper. Gibbes appears to have been a sort of handy-man who had the organs at S. Edmund's, Salisbury, in his care for a certain number of years. The Warden's Accounts of this Church yield the following information:—

1475-6. "It'y paide to John Gibbes for his attendance to the orgayns, ij s. William Bell' for the amending' of the organs by diverse tymes, xd.

same John' [Gibbes] for his attendance to the orgayns, ijd."

1476-7. "John' Gybbes for amending' and clensying' of the church' and glase wyndowes and ye lytton at dyvers tymes xvd. the same John' for kepyng' of the Organs, ijs."

32. MYGHELL GLANCETS.

This maker built an organ for S. Michael's, Cornhill, in 1475, receiving 9l. and the old organ in payment.

As the whole of the three entries relating to the transaction are exceedingly

quaint and of no little interest, they are here transcribed from the Churchwardens' Accounts (published under the editorship of Mr. W. H. Overall).

" 1475. Receyved owte of the Church Ale y bagge ffor a peyre of new orgones as hyt aperyth in ye paymetes by ye wille of all ye pyshons [parishioners], ix*li*.

" Payd to Myghell Glancets organs maker ffor a pre of newe organes, and also bargayned wt hym ffor our olde organes to have them [in part payment] and besyde them, in money payd, sma ix*li*.

" Payd to Roberd Crossley, carpet [carpenter] ffor v gystes [joists] and c. burde [boards] ij felletes, and iij legges and for rebatying of ye seid burdes & workmashyppe of ye same in the Rodelofte to enhawse [raise] hyt & to make stondyng ffor the seyd orgones, sma vs vijd."

33. MIGHAELL GLOCETIR.

It is quite possible that this builder may be identified as the Myghell Glancets mentioned immediately above, for certain spellings of his name approximate to Glancets, as will be seen from the following extracts from *The Medieval Records of a London City Church* (S. Mary-at-Hill), transcribed and edited by Mr. Henry Littlehales.

The first entry refers to the repair of the organ:—

1477-9. "Item, for mendynge of the capis of the organs by Mighaell Glocetir, viij*d*."

The next two, from "The Rentall" of 1483-5, and of 1487-8, show that Glocetir at one time lived in the parish:—

" . . . lane. Gloucett organ maker, a house by yer, xxvjs."

"The costis of Gooslyn Chauntrye . . . Itm, vacacyon of the house that Mychael Gloucett occupied [o ?] q [quarter], iiij*s*."

34. JOHN LAWLESS.

Dr. Grattan Flood, in his *Irish Organ-builders from the Eighth to the close of the Eighteenth Century*,* says that Lawless settled in Kilkenny, where, "on December 29th, 1476, he was given many privileges by the Kilkenny Corporation."

35. JOHN ORGANMAKER.

36. EDWARD JONSON.

A new organ was set up in the church of S. Mary at Thame in the years 1477-80, and John Organmaker seems to have been the maker employed. Jonson may have been his partner, or his workman, or a local worthy of whose skill both John and the authorities of the Church thought it well to make use.

"Organmaker.

Itm payd John Orgaumaker ye firste tyme, xxvjs. viij*d*.

It payd ye same John Organmaker another tyme, x*s*.

* * *

Itm payd Edward Jonson for helpynge John Organmaker, xxvjs. ix*d*."†

It is quite possible that John Organmaker may be identified with John Dyer, of Oxford, who, as mentioned above, repaired the old organs in 1469. [But see below under John Orgaynmaker, of Leicester, No. 67.]

These old organs were sold about the same time for x*s*.

37. JOHN LONDON.

The Churchwardens' Accounts of Hythe Church ‡ contain the following:—
1480-1. "Paid John London for mending the organs, 10*s*. 2*d*."

38. ROBERT BORTON OF STOWMARKET.

The following entry is to be found in the Household Book of the Duke of Norfolk under date 1482 :—

"Item the xxi. day of March, my Lord payd Robert Borton of Stowmarket, the organ-maker, for mendyng of organys, vijs."*

39 I. JOHN HEWE [OR HOWE ?].

40 II. JOHN HOWE, OR HEWE [SON OF I ?].

41 III. THOMAS HOWE [SON OF II.].

The organs built or repaired by these three builders cover a period of eighty-five years—from 1485 to 1570. Before attempting any remarks, I will give a list of eighteen churches with which they had dealings.

1.—YORK MINSTER, 1485, 1531 and 1536.

1485. "To John Hewe for repairing the organ at the altar of B.V.M. in the Cathedral Church, and for carrying the same to the House of the Minorite Brethren, and for bringing back the same to the Cathedral Church, 13s. 9d." (Fabric Rolls.)

1531. "In part payment to John How, of London, organ-maker, for 'intronzacione' [tuning ?] of the organs in the Choir, xx*d*."†

1536. "John How, for mending the organs, xij*d*."‡

2.—LONDON—S. MARY AT HILL, 1500—1559.

From *The Mediæval Records of a London City Church* by Henry Littlehales :

1500-1. "Itm, to Iohn how, organmaker, for mendyng & makyng of new bellows for the organs, 5*m* xvs."

[After several items, in most of which no builder's name appears, while in two of them "Sir Willm Bryse" and "Mr. Northfolke" are mentioned, we again find reference to Howe —]

1535-6. "Itm, paid to Iohn Howe, orgyn maker ffor his fee, xij*d*."

Itm, paid to hym ffor a pype yt was brokyn xij*d*."

Itm, pd to hy[m] for medyng of ye bellows yt wer brokyn, xv*d*."

1553. "payed to Iohn howe for ye hoale yeare to looke and tune ye organs, both payre, iij*s*."

payed to Ihon howe for mendynge the great organs & mendynge the bellowes and for mendynge the lyttell organs, as dothe appear by a byll, vs. v*d*."

1556-7. "Itm payed to Iohn howe organ maker, the XXIXti daye of november for mendyng of bothe the payre of organs agaynst the Sumpcion of or Ladye, ijs."

1559. "pd to howe for iij spring for the regalles, xij*d*."

3.—LONDON—S. STEPHEN'S, WALBROOK, 1507 and 1548.

Two extracts from the Churchwardens' Accounts, now in the Guildhall Library§ :—

1507. "payde for mending of the Small Organs to John How, v*d*."

1548. "received of Master Howe Skinner for the orgayne pypys weighing vjxx (cwt. ?) xij (lb. ?) at v*d*. (per lb. ?)."

I fancy that the last extract indicates that Howe was a member of the Skinners' Company.

4.—COVENTRY—HOLY TRINITY CHURCH, 1526.

"Amongst the writings belonging to this Church is preserved a curious Agreement between the Churchwardens . . . and John Howe and John

Clymmowe, Citizens and Organmakers of London, dated 17th December, 1526, and endorsed 'The Indenture of the Newe Organs.'"

"By this Instrument, the parties above-named undertake for 30*l.* to make and set up in the Parish Church . . . before the ensuing Pentecost, 'A Peir of Organs, wt vij stopps, ov'r & besides the two Towers of Cases of the pitche of doble Effaut, wt xxvij pleyn Keyes xix musiks, xlvj Cases of Tynn, & xiiij cases of Wodd, wt two Sterrs, & the Image of the Trinite on the Topp of the sayed orgayns'; the carriage to be paid jointly, all damages in conveying the Organ repaired at the charges of the builders, and one of them undertakes at his own expense 'to come wt the sayd Organs, and sett them up Well, connynglie, Werkmanlie, ar thei owght to be.' Moreover they contract to repair, at their own charges, any faults in the said Organ, arising from 'lakk of good & true werkemanshipp, apon a lawfull warnyng,' until Pentecost, 1533."

This "greytt orggonll of bras in ye queyr," as it is called in the Inventory of 1558, came to a sad end. Its "balowes" were sold to a "glasier of stonley," in 1570, for v s, whilst its pipes, "wayeng eleven score & thirtene pound, at iiij*d.* halfe fardhing the pound," were disposed of to Richard Gosse, in 1583, for iiij*l.* *jd.**

5.—LONDON—S. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS, 1542—1569.

The following items are taken from the Accounts of the Churchwardens, 1525-1603, edited by J. V. Kitto:—

"1542-3. It'm pd. to John howe for his ffee for the Orgaynes, xij*d.*

"1544-5. Item payd to Mayster fortescewe for the Organys, Sum vij*li* xiijs iiij*d.*

"1563-4 It'm paide to John howe Organ maker for his Quarters wages Being dewe at mydsomer 1564, v*d.*

"1566-7. It'm paied the 25 daye of marche to John howe the orgayne maker for mendinge the orgaynes when they were broken, xij*d.*"

The accounts show that there was an organ in this church from 1525 (and possibly earlier). In 1542-4 a new loft was made "vnder ye organes" and the next year, as shown in the second of the above extracts, a new organ was procured at a cost exceeding £6. It is quite possible that Howe was the builder of it, and "Mayster fortescewe" the treasurer of the organ committee. [See below, No. 102]. Howe's name occurs 19 times in the books of this church between 1542 and 1569. His Christian name, John, is only once omitted.

6.—BLECHINGLEY CHURCH, SURREY, 1545.

"The Churchwardens' Accounts of Blechingley, Surrey, show that, in 1542, they bought a pair of organs at Lingfield, for £1 5s. In 1545 Mr. Howe, organ-maker, was paid, with his man for mending them—five days, 6s. 8*d.* Meat and drink for him and his servant, during the time, and for 'sawder,' 'lether,' 'glewe,' 'wyer,' and other things, 4s."†

A few years later—in the reign of Edward VI.—ijs. iiij*d.* was "paid to Mr. Hewes ffor mending of the organs."‡

7.—WANDSWORTH PARISH CHURCH, 1549-1565.

Howe's name is mentioned seven times between 1549 and 1565, in connection with the organ in this church—thrice with the Christian name John attached, and four times without. At first the fee for oversight of the organ was xij*d.*, but in 1561 it was doubled in amount. Occasionally he received extra payment for repairs.§

8.—LONDON—S. MICHAEL, CORNHILL, 1548-1560.

The Churchwardens' Accounts* of this church contain several references to the Howes, some of them being particularly interesting because they refer to *Thomas Howe* :—

- 1548. "Itm payd Howe for mendyng the Orgayns for his yeres wagys, ijs."
- 1549. "Itm payde to Howe the Organe maker for kepyng ye organs, ijs."
- 1551. "Itm payd to Mr. Howe the V daye of November for hys fee in kepyng the Organes thys yere, suma ijs."
- 1552. "Imprimis pd to Mr. Lowe [Howe ?] the Organmaker for kepyng the Organes, ijs.
Itm pd to Thomas Howe for mendyng the Organes, ijs."
- 1554. "Itm paide to Thomas Howe for his yeres fee for mendinge of the Orgaynes, ijs."
- 1554. "Itm paide to Thomas Howe for mendinge of the greate orgaynes and the small paire beinge broken, in the takinge downe, and for remeueinge of them ij tymes as Master Alderman Lodge makynge the pryse wt him, xxiijs.
Itm paide for new roopes for the orgaynes, iiij*d*."
- 1555. "Paide to Master How for mendinge of the Orgaynes, ijs."
- 1559. "Paide for tewninge the smalle orgains, v*d*.
Paide for removinge the smalle orgains and the Table that stode vpon the Hight Aulter, viij*d*.
Paide to Mr. Howe the Orginmaker for his fee, ijs."
- 1560. "Paid to Mr. Howe for mendinge the Orgins, xv*d*."

9.—LONDON—S. PETER, CORNHILL, 1548-9.

From the Churchwardens' Inventories and Accounts :—

- "1548-9. Item—paid to the organmaker for his fee ending at mighelmas for a yere (1550), 2s.
Item—paid to the goodman howe and his sonne to sell the little orgaines, 3s."†

10.—LONDON—S. DIONIS BACKCHURCH, 1551.

An inventory of this Church contains the following information :—

- 1551. "Item payde to Master Hewe for tewnyng of ye orgaynes, xxd."‡

11.—LONDON—S. MARY WOOLNETH, 1553-1562.

The following are extracts from the Churchwardens' Accounts :—

- "1553. Payd to Howe, the organ maker, for mending of the orgaynes, viijs. *id*.
- "1555. Item paied to How for mending of the springs of the basses of the organes and other things, xij*d*.
Paid for a case for the Keyes of the organs, viij*d*.
Paid for mending of ye bellows of ye organs, xij*d*.
Paid for mending of the organs, soundinge of the condytes and new clensynge of all the pypes against Witsontyde, vis.
Paid to Howe, the organ mender, for wyre and soder and other things layd owte aboute the mending of the organnes, ijs.
Paid to him more for mending of the bases, tuninge and makinge clean of the organs, xij*d*.
- "1562. Paide to John Howe, organ maker, for flowring of the organ pypes and mendyng some of them, iijs.

Paid to John Howe, organ maker, the 23rd day of June, A.D. 1562, for springes of Laten for the organs, and for his labour for putting them to, *xd.*"*

12.—LONDON—S. PETER'S, WEST CHEAP, 1555-6.

Extracts from the Churchwardens' Accounts† :—

1555. " It'm payde to Howe organ maker for his fee for kepyng the organs, ijs.

It'm to Howe organ maker for makyng sprynges to the doble regalls and for tonges of the ij regalls which is called the pryncypalls in the base regall, iijs."

1556. " It'm payd to Howe for ij new pypes for the organs and brasse to the regalls, ijs.

It'm for cordes for the bellows of the organs, jd."

13.—LONDON—WESTMINSTER ABBEY, 1558 (?).

The following items were included in the late Mr. F. G. Edwards' article on *Westminster Abbey*.‡ They were discovered by Sir Frederick Bridge, who is of opinion that they date from 1558, the year of Queen Elizabeth's accession. The first five items are from a receipt :—

" *Item.* Payed for 2 skins of leather for to leather the bellows of the grate woden organs and leathering the sou boords.

Item. Payed for latten wyre for to make springs for the grate bass and ten principalls.

Item. for sowder to sowder small pipes which were broken.

Item for my fee for the tuning of the organs that stand in King Henry the VIIth's Chappel.

Item for my fee for tuning the organs that standes over the quyre for a quarter ended now at Mychelmas.

by me John Howe, organ maker."

The next extract is probably a year or two later in point of date :—

" *Item* to the said John Howe for takyng downe the Organes in King Henry the VIIth's Chappell, mendyng the same and setting up the same in the quyre and mendyng the other organes."

14.—SHEFFIELD PARISH CHURCH, 1560.

From the Accounts of the Church Burgesses :—

1560. " 6th Nov. . . . payed to John Howe ye organe maker for a ful acquittance, xs."§

15.—LONDON—S. HELEN'S, BISHOPSGATE, 1564.

Ch.w. Acc. :—

" To Father Howe for his fee for the Organs for a hole year, 2s."||

16.—LONDON—LAMBETH PARISH CHURCH, 1567.

From the Churchwardens' Accounts :—

1567-8. Itm pd to father How for his fee for kepyng ye organs for one yere, xijd.

Itm to father How for mending of the organs the xix. of September, ij s.

17.—LONDON—S. ANDREW HUBBARD, 1568.

From the Churchwardens' Accounts :—

1568. " Paid to Hewe the organ-maker, for the kepinge of our organes, his fee, for ij yerres, vs."*

18.—LONDON—S. MARY THE VIRGIN, ALDERMANBURY.

Ch.w. Acc :—

1570. " To John Howe Organ Maker for his rewarde, ijs iiijd."†

One other matter should be mentioned at this point. In the Public Record Office is preserved a document dated 23 April, 1561, of which the following is a summary :—" Examination of Thomas How, organ maker, and servant to Dr. Freer, before Sir William Chester, Lord Mayor of London. Visit of his master to Dr. Martyn at Buntingford. Neither himself nor his master, to his knowledge, have received the Communion since the Queen's accession."‡

Disregarding the various spellings of the surname we find that it occurs 67 times in the above extracts, qualified as mentioned below :—

John Howe, 36 times between 1485 and 1570.

Thomas Howe, four times between 1552 and 1561.

Father Howe, thrice, in 1564 and 1568.

How and his son, once, in 1548-9.

Without Christian name, or other qualificative, 23 times between 1545 and 1568.

A careful perusal of the above facts and figures seems to suggest the following conclusions—that there were three generations of Howes, of whom the first (John) was working from *c.* 1485 till *c.* 1525; the second (John) from *c.* 1526 till *c.* 1570; whilst the third (Thomas), after assisting his father for some years onwards from *c.* 1548, abandoned his trade sometime between 1554 and 1561, in order to become Dr. Freer's servant. He was probably helped to his decision by the dismal fate which befell so many instruments during the early years of Elizabeth's reign, and the unsettled, even gloomy, prospect which seemed to be the lot of the organ-builder of that time.

As to which of the two last-named (the second John, or Thomas) was called *Father Howe* it is not yet possible to say for certain, but I think it more likely that the epithet was applied to the elder, in order to distinguish him from his son, than that it was prefixed to the son on account of his religious opinions.

NOTE.

Since the above was set up in type I have examined the original Account Books of a large number of London churches, including many not here mentioned, with the result that I have discovered nearly two hundred further references to John Howe [II.]

These various entries range between 1533 and 1570-1. Their evidence is more than sufficient to confirm the opinion that the second *John Howe*, *Father Howe*, and the *Goodman Howe* were one and the same person; it is, indeed, absolutely conclusive on this point.

John seems to have died in or about the year 1570-1.

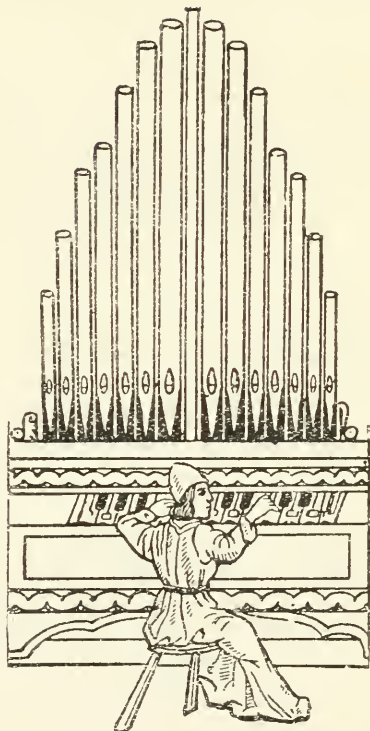

42. WILLIAM WOTTON.

This worthy is not only famed as the builder of the organs in two of the greater Oxford Colleges, but (if Anthony a Wood is to be believed) is of historic interest as the father of a pretender to the English throne. Wood's story, from his "Annals," A.D. 1486, tells that an Oxford priest contrived that one of his pupils, a son of a certain organ-maker of the University, should personate Edward, Earl of Warwick, son of the Duke of Clarence "to the end that he might be King, and that the House of York might again flourish." When the plot was found out, the priest confessed and was sent to the Tower. "Some report that the said youth was named Lambert Symnell, and that he was a baker's son in Oxford; but the priest's confession was the truest, viz., that he was the son of an organ-maker of the University of Oxford. And who that should be but one William* Wotton I cannot tell, knowing very well, from various obscure writs, that such an one, and nobody else, professed that art at that time in Oxford."†

The two organs built by Wotton were for Magdalen and Merton College Chapels. That for the first-named was built in, or before, 1486-7, for in that year he received £13 in part payment for one pair of organs. In 1488-9 he received a further sum of 40s. for repairs. In 1487

he agreed to make and set up in Merton College Chapel "a pair of organs lyke unto the newe payr" in the chapel of S. Mary Magdalen College, against the vigil of Whitsunday, 1489, for the price of £28.‡ The Merton instrument was exchanged in 1567 for two globes now in the College Library.§

43. JOHN (OF YARMOUTH ?).

This organ-builder is referred to in the Yarmouth Corporation Records of 1486-7.||

44. ROBERT, THE ORGAN-MAKER, OF NORWICH.

This personage did not confine his efforts entirely to organ-building, since he was fined in 1493 for selling beer within the town of Yarmouth "contrary to the assize."*

45. RICHARD GILBERT.

46. JOHN HARRIS, OF CHRISTCHURCH.

These two craftsmen may have been partners, for they were concerned in repairing the organs at Wimborne Minster at the same time. They share the following entry in the Churchwardens' Accounts of that place:—

1495. "Paid Rd. Gilbert for mending the organs in the chapel of St. Mary, and for 'nays, gymows, and glyw' (nails, hinges and glue), xivd.; and to John Harris of Christchurch for mending the said organs, xs.

Paid to Richard Gylbert keeper of the organs, ijs. viijd."†

47. JOHN COCKES.

The Churchwardens' Accounts of S. Ewen's, Bristol, refer to this personage in the following terms:—

1496-7. "Item, to John Cockes for lether and glewe and for his laboure to mend the organ belowes, vjs."‡

48. JOHN HAYNE, OF NORWICH.

All that seems to be known of this builder is that he died in 1496.§

49. WALTER.

There were two organs in the Chapel of Winchester College in 1498, one of which apparently dated from 1407. In 1498 both these instruments were extensively repaired as shown by this entry:—

"For the commons of Walter, the organ builder, and his men in repairing 2 pairs of organs with 4 sets of bellows, over eight weeks, together with 20d. for fuel and faggots and 12d. for candles, 19s. 8 d."||

50. RICHARD SAWTRY.

An "accout of the expenses" of S. George's Church, Oxford,—a conventual parish church "sometimes situated in the Castle"—which apparently belongs to the year 1502, contains the only record of Sawtry's work:—

"Item, solut Ricardo Sawtry pro reparacione organorum, 4d."¶

51. WILLIAM STROKE.

52. NICHOLAS STROKE.

These were organ-makers of Wirksworth, but their relationship does not appear. They are included with considerably over a hundred others of the town and district, many of them men of some substance and standing, in a "Pardon to Roger Vernon of Wyrkesworth, co. Derby, gentleman, of all trespasses, congregations, burglaries, and misdeeds for the taking, abduction or rape of Margaret Kebull, alias Kebell, alias Kebill, and also to his aiders and abettors in the same."

This Pardon was granted to the said Roger Vernon at Westminster on Dec. 9, 1503.**

53. JOHN CHAMBERLEYNE.

In 1508 the authorities of Magdalen College, Oxford, bought an organ from this person (who, according to Rimbault, was a London organ-builder), the price paid for it being £8. This instrument was probably an additional one to that constructed by William Wotton, already noticed, for there were at least two organs in the chapel in 1520. In 1509 Chamberleyne received £1 7s. 10d. for repairs.

54. THOMAS BROWNE. OR BROUNE.

55. BROWNE [THE YOUNGER].

Since the various works referred to below were spread over a period of upwards of half a century, it is at least likely (as here assumed) that two builders—possibly father and son—were concerned in them.

An abstract from *Early Chancery Proceedings* (Bundle 287, Nos. 44 and 45) communicated to *The Musical Antiquary* for April, 1911, by A. F. H., is here given. The Schedule attached to it is one of the most interesting and informing documents in connection with mediæval organ-building that has yet come to light.

"A.D. 1504-15. Bill addressed to William, Archbishop of Canterbury, by Thomas Browne, 'organ-maker.' Shows that complainant bought from one Robert Colyns, 'wyerseller,' ten parcels of stuff as appears by schedule annexed, for which he paid to the said Robert 26s. 8d. And it was agreed between them that complainant should instruct the said Robert 'to have the knowledge and kunnyng of and in the mystery and craft of organ-making, within the space of one hoole yere then next ensuyng, in and for full recompense and satisfaction of all the said parcelles.' Complainant states that he has always been ready to instruct the said Robert in the said mystery, but that he, the said Robert, now refuses to learn the same, and intends to 'recover' against complainant not only all the said parcels, but also the value of divers other parcels which never came into the hands of complainant, and has taken action of 'detyne' against complainant for the said parcels. As the said bargain and covenant between the said parties was not ingrossed in writing, complainant can make no defence 'att barre' and is likely to be compelled to redeliver the said parcels and pay certain money for other goods which never came to his hands. He therefore prays for a writ of 'certiorare' to be directed to the mayor and sheriffs of London, to certify the cause of his, the complainant's, arrest.

" SCHEDULE.

Imprimus, ij grete organ cacez with carven worke.

Itm, ij cobbordes for to ley in the belowes to the same casez.

Itm, ij smaller casez with carved worke and the song-bordes redy wrought to set in pypes.

Itm, xxviij of fyne tynne in plate redy wrought.

Itm, in ley metall, xiiij*lb.* weight.

Itm, in lede, iiij*lb.* weight.

Itm, a pytt of erthe to melte tyn inn.

Itm, iiij*xx* [*i.e.*, four score] pypes of tymber, the most parte redy made.

Itm, a stoke and a grete hammer for the same.

Itm, a longe planke for to plane metall uppon.

Itm, an organ case peynted grene, with keys and a song-borde redy made to set in pypes, with a case of white tymber therefor, redy made.

Itm, ij planes for to plane metall with, and the irons to the same.

Itm, iiij planes with irons to the same.

Itm, ij crest planes with irons to the same.

Itm, ii hollowe planes.

Itm, v gowges and formes and metall coffyns.

Itm, ij irons for to shave metall bright in square.

Itm, ii j mawndrells.

Itm, a grete knyff for to cutt lede with.
 Itm, iiij rowndes for to tune pypes with.
 Itm, iiij peces for to caste with metall.
 Itm, ij swages with branches and byrdes."

Here we have a substantial part of the plant and stock-in-trade of an organ-builder who was evidently in full swing at the very beginning of the 16th century. It includes no less than five organs in various stages of construction. There is metal, a "pytt of erthe" in which it can be melted, and a bench on which it can first be run into sheets and then smoothed and finished by planing. Of planes, both for metal and wood, there is a goodly assortment. Then there is a "grete knyff" for cutting the metal the required size, mandrels for rounding and shaping it into pipes, with cones for tuning the latter when, with others in wood (of which some four score are "redy made") they have found their appointed places on their respective soundboards.

Notice, too, the 28 sheets of "fyne tynne" and the reference to the cases. Not of "pitch-pine stained and varnished" are these latter. Four of them (two "grete" and two smaller) would surely be of some worthier substance since they are enriched with "carven worke," while the fifth is enticingly described as "peynted grene."

One would like to know the name of the craftsman to whom these and the other "parcels," whose contents are not specified, originally belonged; and how Robert Colyns, "wyerseller," came to get hold of them—whether he bought them at the sale of the effects of a deceased or retired organ-maker, or whether he impounded them in satisfaction for money advanced or goods supplied, or for rent which was in arrear. Then one would like to know how Thomas Broune came to be mixed up in the business. Was he already a master-builder with an establishment and *clientèle* of his own, or (as seems more likely) was this the occasion which offered, and which he seized, of setting up in business for himself? And if the latter, might he not have been connected in some way with the previous owner—as his apprentice, or workman, or foreman?

These and many other questions come into one's mind, but even a comparatively full and detailed document, such as is this petition of Broune's, is tantalizingly deficient in material for settling such questions when, as here, it stands by itself. It does not even tell us whether the petitioner was successful in his appeal to the Archbishop. It leaves us at the point where the proposed partnership in which Broune was to supply the brains and Colyns the capital had come to nought, and the organ-maker was being made to undergo the inconvenience and ignominy of arrest. But if he were the builder of the Henley organ of 1521 (as is likely), as he certainly was of the instrument at King's College, Cambridge, in 1508, the sequel would show that he had sufficient grit and determination to enable him to surmount this somewhat calamitous incident in his career.

The petition is more likely to date from the period 1504-8 than 1508-14.

Included in a long list of New Year's gifts to Queen Mary, in 1556, we find:

"By Browne, instrument maker, a faire lute, edged with passamayne of golde and silke."

This the Queen kept for her own use.*

1. CAMBRIDGE—KING'S COLLEGE CHAPEL, 1508.

In 1508 Thomas Browne received 33s. 4d. in part payment of *8l.* for making the great organs in the chapel.

2. HENLEY PARISH CHURCH, 1521.

The following memorandum explains itself :—

"That Rd. Brookham, Warden, payd to Browne the organ maker xiiij*li.* to be repayd agen of the churchmen and xx*d.* for the carriage whereof recd. viij*li.* xvijs. x*d.* ob."*

3. OXFORD—MAGDALEN COLLEGE CHAPEL, 1554 and 1559.

Browne was paid 12*d.* in 1554 and 3*s.* 4*d.* in 1559 for repairs to the organ in the above-mentioned building.

56. WILLIAM LEWKENORE.

The reference to this personage in the Accounts of S. Mary the Virgin at Thame† is unfortunately ambiguous. In 1501-2 we read that he was paid xiijs. iv*d.* "for the organs ye hole yere," but there is nothing to show whether it was for services rendered as performer or repairer.

57. SIR WILLIAM BRYSE, A PRIEST.

The Churchwardens' Accounts of S. Mary at Hill,‡ for 1509-10, record the payment "to s[ir] Willm Bryse for a Reward for kepyng the organs for a hole yere, besides his salary," the sum of 10*s.*

58. THOMAS SEXTON.

The Churchwardens' Accounts of the Parish Church at Kingston-on-Thames record the payment, in 1509 of vjs. viij*d.* to "Thomas Sexton for mendyng of the organs."§

59. ROBERT BARKBY.

The Churchwardens' Accounts of St. Laurence's, Reading, are very interesting and suggestive in so far as they relate to this builder. The items, though numerous, justify quotation in full :—

1510. "It. payd to Backebye vppon a bargaen of a peyr of orgaunce at the instaunce of the pisshe [parish] at ij tymes, iiij*li.*"

1512. "It. rec. for bryk and mort left at the makyng of the vovte [vault] for the belys of the organs, xxj*d.*||

It. paid to Robt. Barkbe organ maker, xiijs. iiij*d.*

It. paid to M. White for waynscott that he bought to the new organs, xxxjs.

It. payed to Robt. Turner for such stuf as he delyued to the same organs, xvs. x*d.*

It. payed for currying of the leder to the belys of the same organs, ijs. ij*d.*

It. payed to Ric' Turner & John Kent for the organ maker at one tyme, xxxjs. v*d.*

It. payed for vj waynscotts at London, xiiij*s.*

Charles Kerry, from whose book, "A History of the Municipal Church of St. Laurence, Reading," these particulars are taken, is of the opinion that the bellows were placed in a chamber below the level of the floor—as they are believed to have been placed at Fountains Abbey. I think it is much more likely that the wall immediately behind the organ was pierced, or partly cut away, for a few feet above the floor level of the organ loft, the recess so formed taking the whole or part of the bellows, which would project from the lower part of the back of the instrument. A similar arrangement was contrived at Old Radnor, where the instrument dates from about the same period. By this means the main portion of the instrument is materially decreased in depth.*

It. payed to Ric' Turnr & John Kent for the organ maker at a nothr tyme, is.

It. payed for led to ley vpon the belis of the organs, vjs. viiij*d*.

It. payed for a shepeskyn to mend the belis of the old organs* and for a *li* [pound] of glew, viij*d*.

It. paid to a fre mason that shuld have made the arch for the belis of the new organs for iiij dayes an di, by the day vid., ijs, iij*d*.

It. payed to Thomas Nycols for makyng of the same arch and for tyling of the same, viijs.

It. payed to a laborer to breke vp the wall to make the arch for iij dayes & a di, iiij*d*. sma — xiiij*d*."

1513. "It. payed to Hew Smyth for iron warke in the new organ loft, *xd*.

It. payd for ij lokks to the same organs, one for the stopps and the othr for the keyes, *xjd*.

It. payed to Robte Barkbe organ maker for a reward, vs. iiij*d*.

It. payed for ryding to Windsor to set Mr. Wod [Wood] to se the new organs, *xd*.

It. payed to the same M. for his costs at his comyng, vjs. *xd*.

It. payed Ric. a Woods costs when he came to se the organs, viij*d*. (1512).

It. payed for a lok to the organ lofte dore & for iron warke to the same loft, *xjd*."

It is probable that the organ was not satisfactory, and that Richard a Woods, who was possibly the organist at St. George's Chapel, Windsor, was called in to give expert advice. At any rate, legal proceedings were taken in the following year, as will be seen from the extracts next given.

1514-5. "It. payd for a man & a hors to London for a wryt for Barkbye, iijs. iij*d*.

"It. payd to Willm Edmonds for makyng a Ire [letter] to barkbye, *jd*.

"It. payd for expens to barkbye at the same tyme, vjs. viiij*d*.

"It. payd for a pece of waynscote for mendyng of the stoppe of the same organs, iij*d*.

"It. Sum of expenses touching Rob. Barkeby, xiijs. iiij*d*.

Barkby's organ lasted only till 1519-20, when another builder, one Segemond, under whose name we shall pursue the history of the organs in this church, was called in to effect a complete rebuild. It will be seen that Segemond's instrument was equally unsatisfactory, that proceedings were instituted against him, and that his services were thenceforth dispensed with. [See No. 74.]

The only other mention of Barkby's name, so far as I have been able to find out, is in connection with the *little* organs at Magdalen College, Oxford, which he repaired in 1520. His name is here spelt Barbbye.

60. GILLEAM.

The Treasurer's Books of the Household of James IV. of Scotland contain this item:—

1511. "to Gilleam, organist, maker of the Kingis organis, for expens maid be him at the sayd organis, in gait skynnis, and parchment for the belles, in naillis and sprentis of irue, in glew, papir, caudill, coill, &c., viij*li*. iijs."

1513-4. "It. payd for mendyng and grownde pyunnyng of the posts vnder the organs, iij*d*."

The organs referred to were those in the Chapels Royal at Stirling and Edinburgh.*

61. SIR WILLIAM WRIGHT, A PRIEST.

From the Churchwardens' Accounts of S. Martin Outwich, London:—

1510-11. "Also to s[ir] William, for playing atte organs, iiij quters, vs."

1511. "Paid to William Wright, morrowe masse preste, for his wages for halfe a yere ended at midsomer, xxxiijs. ivd.

Also, to the same Sir William, for kepyng of thorgans the same half yere, vjs. viijd."†

62. THOMAS SMYTH.

From the Churchwardens' Accounts of S. Margaret's, Westminster:—

1514. "Item, paid to Thomas Smyth, organe-maker, for mending of the grete organes, xjs., & for the small organs, vs., in toto xvjs."‡

63. WILLIAM LEWES.

William received the appointment of "keeper and tuner of the King's instruments" in 1514 at a salary of 100 shillings *per annum*.§

64. SIR THOMAS COBBE.

"Syr thomus Cobbe," who was, of course, a priest, received "our olde organs and V mark of money of the cherche money and gaderyde of the pyssh" for a new, or second-hand organ which he either made for or supplied to the Church of All Hallows, London Wall.|| This was about the year 1515.

65. JAMES DEMPSEY, OR DEMSSEY.

Dr. Grattan Flood¶ tells us that the Earl of Kildare presented a hackney to his "organ-maker," James Dempsey, in 1515, and further, that the fame of his workmanship led to his being invited to England in 1528. In 1560 he settled in Doncaster, where, as the Registers of the Parish Church record, he was buried on July 27, 1567. He built organs for:—

1531. Ripon Minster, at a cost of £4 8s. 4d.

1561. Doncaster Parish Church.

66. JOYCE.

In 1517-18 the Churchwardens of S. Andrew, Canterbury, "payed unto Joyes orgaynmakyr in parte of payment for a new payer of small organes called portatyfs besyde the stuff off the olde organes to hym delyvyd, xxiijs. vd."

This smaller instrument was placed in the quire of the Church. A larger one, built in 1512-13, at a cost of xiiij*li*, which had been brought by "water and by lande," stood in the Rood-loft, the entrance to which had to be guarded by a new door.

In 1518-19 it was found necessary to fit another door "for to shett before the bellowys of the organys." In the same year we read that xxs. was "paied . . . to Symon Gyllert for a bargayne made wt Joyce, organmaker, that was due to the seid Symon."

It seems probable that Joyce built the larger organ as well as the smaller one, but the references are not quite definite enough to say so with absolute certainty. Moreover, another builder was on the scene in 1520-1, namely Anthony [Duddynton], and this larger organ may just possibly have been his. [See No. 71 below.]

67. JOHN ORGAYNMAKER, OF LEICESTER.

From the Chamberlain's Accounts of the Borough of Leicester we learn that xiijs. iiij*d.* was received for the year ended Sept. 1518 for "ij tenements at the high crose late in the holdyng of John Orgaynmaker."* [See also above under No. 35].

68. SIR WILLIAM ARGALL, A PRIEST.

The Churchwardens' Accounts of Lambeth Parish Church record the following:—

1517-18. Imprimis payd to S[ir] wyllm Argall ffor the organys, xs.

Argall's name occurs many times in the Lambeth Account Books between 1515 and 1521, but only this once in connection with the organ. He was one of the assistant clergy of the Church. He may have come of a Lambeth family, for there are references to a certain John Argall as well as to "the goodwyffe Argalle" in the same book about the same period.

69. WILLIAM BETON, OR BYLTON, OF KING'S LYNN.

There is little doubt to my mind that Bylton of King's Lynn (*c.* 1531) is identical with "William Beton, organmaker," who purchased his freedom of the same East Anglian town in 1518-9 for the sum of 40*s.* Certainly some of the variants of the name Beton (they undoubtedly refer to the same builder) approximate quite as much to Bylton as to Beton. For the sake of comparison they are set down here:—

Byttn. Bytt. Betton. Betyne. Beyton. Boton.

The Calendar of the Freeman of Lynn, 1292-1836, published by the Norfolk and Norwich Archæological Society contains the names of three assistants of "William Beton, organmaker" who were admitted to the Freedom of the Borough by apprenticeship, namely:—

1526-7. "James Croxston, app. of William Beton."

1536-7. "William Beton, son and app. of William Beton. William Bull, app. of William Beton."

The testimony of the Lynn Records is that "Beton" was the authentic form of the name, and that the variants are due to the idiosyncracies and infirmities of less careful scribes.

We next hear of this builder in 1537 when he is in receipt of a salary of £20 as organ maker to Henry VIII. His name is here given as William *Betton*.† Later on, in the *Privy Purse Expenses of the Princess Mary* (ed. Madden, 1831) we find that vijs. vjd. is paid to *Betyne's* servants for mending the regals of that Princess—in January 1542-3.

His name is also found twice amongst those forming the musical establishment of Edward VI. In the first "Among Quarter's Wages for Midsomer" 1547 he is set down as "William *Beyton*, organ maker, 100*s.*" while in the second, the list of the "Musitions and Plaiers" for 1552, he is coupled with another with whom we shall proceed to deal almost immediately:—

1.—CAMBRIDGE—CHRIST'S COLLEGE CHAPEL.

In 1530 work was done to the organ in Christ's College Chapel, Cambridge by this builder, where his name, as given in the Account Books, "reads very

nearly, but not quite like 'Beton'."* Later on, in 1532-3, we get two versions of the patronymic in connection with the definite information that he had recently built a new instrument for the chapel:—

"*Expense infra sacellum.* Item paid to Byttn the orgayne maker for ye residew of hys bargaen of ye newe orgayns, viij li."

"It expended upon bytt the organ maker, iiij d."†

The organ here referred to seems to have lasted till 1705, or even till 1733.

2—ELY CATHEDRAL.

3—LOUTH PARISH CHURCH.

Another instrument of this craftsman's, that at Ely Cathedral, brought him no little renown, and was the means whereby he was chosen to construct one for the Church at Louth. Both are mentioned in the following extract, which is dated 1531.‡ The Ely organ was, of course, erected before that year:—

"Mr. Richard Taylor, Priest & bachelor of laws, then abyding w'tin the dyocess of Norwiche, . . . offered for to cause them [to] have a payre made of a c'unyng man in Lyn, that should be exampled by a payre of the same man at Ely, who was called Mr. Bylton, whiche then had a singular prayse, for the sum of xxij pounds, whereof he pr'mysed to giff thereto xi pounds. . . ."

It is satisfactory to know that this instrument quite came up to the expectations of the good people of Louth.

4.—KING'S LYNN—S. MARGARET'S CHURCH.

Dr. Mann tells me that in Jan. 1543 vii s. vid. was "Paied to Betynes servante for mending the Regalls" in this church. This is apparently the only time Beton's name has been discovered in connection with S. Margaret's organs, but it is hardly likely to have been the only occasion his skill was required.

5.—LONDON—OLD S. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL.

Rimbault credits Beton with the construction of an organ for Old S. Paul's, and says it was the one which was destroyed in the Great Fire of 1666.§ If this were so it would be the one depicted in Hollar's well-known engraving of the interior of this church. Unfortunately Rimbault gives no authority for his statement.

70. SIMON, THE ORGAN-MAKER.

All there is to say concerning this worthy craftsman is contained in an extract from a rental of the Parish of S. Peter-in-the-East, Oxford. It is dated Sept. 29, 1519, and is to the effect that a house whose yearly value is xxs. lately in the occupation of the widow of Albertus the Hangman was formerly in the occupation of Simon the Organ-maker. (xxs. *Nuper relicta Alberti carnificis; dudum Simon organ-maker.*)||

71. ANTHONY DUDDYNTON.

1—LONDON—ALL HALLOW'S, BARKING.

Only one organ by this builder is known for certain, that built for the Church of All Hallows, Barking. The contract is dated the 29th day of July, 1519, and the receipt of Duddynton for £30 (part payment of the £50 agreed upon as the price to be paid for the instrument) is dated the 22nd of March, 1520. Both documents are given in *extenso* in Hopkins and Rimbault (page 56), and

also Dr. Hopkins' comments thereon. Though extremely interesting, reasons of space compel me to abbreviate the indenture and the comments.*

Duddynton, who is described as "Citizen of London, Organ Maker," agreed to make an Instrument, "that ys to say a payer of organs for the foresed Church, of dowble *Ce-fa-ut* that ys to say, xxvij playne kayes, and the pryncipale to conteyn the length of v foote, so following wt Bassys called Diapason to the same, conteyning length of x foot or more : And to be dowble pryncipalls thoroweout the seid instrument, so that the pyppes wt inforth shall be as fyne metall and stuff as the utter [outer] parts, that is to say, of pure tyn, wt as fewe stoppes as may be convenient." [Dr. Hopkins thought there were but

three stops, a Diapason and the two Pryncipalls, and that the compass was from EE (sounding CC), up to the C above the treble stave, 4 octave range (short compass).] Duddynton was also to "convey the bellows in the loft abowf in the said Quere of Alhalowes, wt. a pype to the song bourde." This may mean that the bellows were placed in the rood-loft while the organ itself stood on the chancel floor, but the language used is too vague to allow this to be said with certainty. The provision of bellows-room was clearly a problem to the organ-builder of these early days, as we have seen in the matter of Barkby's organ at S. Laurence's, Reading, and also at Old Radnor.

It has been said that only one organ is *known* to have been built by Duddynton, but it is almost certain that the "Antony" referred to in the accounts of the two churches below named is the same Anthony Duddynton, and no other.

2.—CANTERBURY—S. ANDREW.

1520-21. "Itm paid toward the mending of the orgaynes in the Rood loft to Anthony the orgayn maker of London, vjs. viij*d*."

When dealing with Joyce [see No. 66, above] it was said that the credit of building this organ in 1512-13 can in all probability be assigned to the said Joyce or, failing him, to Duddynton.

3.—LONDON—S. MARGARET PATTEENS, ROOD LANE.

1523. "Paied to Antony for mending of the newe organs, and for sellyng of the olde organs, xs."

These "newe organs" were made in 1516, so that we may assume that Anthony was their maker as well as repairer. They were sold in 1549 for 40*s*. The "olde organs" had been "solde into the countrie in 1518 for 46*s*. 8*d*." †

I endeavoured to find some mention of Duddynton in the Calendars of Wills at Somerset House. Though my efforts were unsuccessful in so far they relate to the organ builder, I came across the wills of others of the same name and date. They are (amongst others) those of Antoni Doddington, or Duddington, of the town of Northampton, whose will was proved in 1503; John Duddynton, of the parish of S. Stephen's Walbroke, and of Walworth, Surrey (1508) and of Antony Duddynton, or Dodington, of the parish of S. Stephen's Walbroke (1530). The last-named was a haberdasher.

72. WILLIAM.

The two items which follow are from the Accounts of S. Andrew's Church, Canterbury, in 1521-22 :—

"Reparacons of the small organes. It paied to Willm, orgayn maker, for mending of the small orgaynes in the quyer, vjs." These organs were the ones constructed by Joyce, or Duddynton, in 1517-18.

"It payed to Danyell Lokyar for the making of iij stoppys of iron for the same organes, xij, *d*."

73. WINSBOROUGH, A MONK.

In 1521 the churchwardens of St. Mary's, Sandwich, "Paid Winsborough the Monke of Crists Church [Canterbury] for mendying the grete organys iijs. ivd."* I think we may assume that Winsborough found occasional and congenial occupation in looking after the welfare of the organs in Canterbury Cathedral.

74. SEGEMOND, OR SEGESMOND.

With this builder we take up the tale of the organs of S. Laurence's, Reading, which commenced and left off with our account of Barkby [No. 59 *q.v.*] and his dealings with that Church.

The chief defect of Barkby's instrument seems to have been in the pipe-work, which, to judge by the next three entries, was probably of inferior metal and of faulty construction.

1519-20. "It. of Segemond the organ maker for the grete organs CC di xi li [211lbs.] of led, ijli.

1520. "It. paid to Segemond the organ maker for transposing of the grete organs as apperithe by a bill thereof made, vjli xxd.

1521. "It. payd to Segesmond by thadvse of the pysh tansposyng & new castyg ye for fronte of the organs and setting yn ye new stope, xiijs. iiijd."

Segemond's name occurs once and only once more, and that in connection with more litigation.

1522-3. "It. payd for a pcesse mayd agaynst Segemond viijs. vd."

After repairs executed by another builder named Baynton (see later) in 1524, and a further expenditure of *ijd.*, in 1531, "for mendying the stopps," this organ, the successive work of Barkby and Segemond was sold to "the freres in Oxford" for *xij li. x s.*, in 1533. But here again the church was unfortunate, for the last *ijli. xs.* of the amount was never paid, the Friars being amongst the first victims of Henry VIII's greed.

Before leaving this builder it may be said that a certain Mistress Edyth Segemond (also spelt *Sygemond* and *Segesmond*) is mentioned in the accounts of St. Mary-at-Hill, London. A sum of money, ten pounds or more, which she had lent to that church in 1518 was subsequently paid back to her in instalments. Possibly some reader of these notes may be able to tell us if these two people were related to each other in any way.

75. ROBERT (OF SALISBURY?).

Amongst the receipts "ffor the settes [seats] in the Church" of S. Edmund, Salisbury for the year 1523-4 was "Roberte Organmaker—wifes, iiijd.," from which we may perhaps conclude that the said Robert was domiciled in this city for at least one year in his career, and possibly for several. I have not yet met with any mention of any work which may be assigned to him.

76. JOHN SMYTHE.

This builder may have been related to Thomas Smyth alluded to above. His name occurs in the Accounts of St. Peter's, West Cheap in 1524:—

"It'm payde to John Smythe organ maker for mendynge of the bel-
lowes of the organs, v.s."†

Other repairs executed about the same time, but to which no maker's name is appended, may possibly have been entrusted to Smythe.

77. JOHN NORTHFOLKE.

Northfolke's name occurs frequently in the Accounts of S. Mary at Hill,‡ of which church he was for a time organist. In one entry (of 1524-5) it appears that the organs were mended "according to the Minde of Mr. North-

folke and at his devyse," and that, I take it, was his customary share of organ restoration work: but the item given next below suggests that he was able to tune as well as play his instrument:—

1523-4. "Paid to Iohn Northfolke for a Rewarde for keepyng the quere and the Orgons all the xijc [*sic*] days in Cristemas, vjs. viij*d*."

78. SIR RICHARD BAYNTON, A PRIEST.

This clerical craftsman was "ower Lady Masse priest" at the Church of S. Laurence Reading, as will be seen from the second extract given below. After their unsatisfactory transactions with Barkby and Segemond the authorities were doubtless relieved to find that a member of their own staff was a capable mechanic. In the accounts of this church we read that in 1524 iijs. was "payd to Sr. Ric. Baynton for mending the grett organs at ij tymes."

The records of the Parish Church at Henley-on-Thames * yield the following:—

1526. "Indre witnesseth that the warden and Bridgmen have bought a payer of organs of Sr. Richard Haynton [*i.e.* Baynton] Clerk, and ower Lady Masse priest in the Church of St. Lawrens at Reading under manr and forme following, that is to wyt: the sayd Sr. Richard byndeth hymself in iiij marks sterling for the keepyng of the sayd orgayne in tewin by the space of vii yere next following."

The same person (his name this time spelt Beynton) was called in to mend the bellows of the organs in the quire of Magdalen College, Oxford, in preparation for the Feast of the Dedication of the Church in 1532, and in 1535 an agreement is made with him (this time he is spoken of as Richard Baynton) for repairing two pairs of organs.

79. RICHARD BODYE.

It is by no means certain that this person was an organ-builder, but he may be given the benefit of the doubt since the inclusion of his name serves as the excuse for the introduction of six more short entries from the Accounts of S. Laurence's, Reading. All of these refer to a new organ, probably of quite moderate dimensions, and all are for the year 1524-5:—

"It payd for karyeing the new organs from the watr [*i.e.* river] to the church, xv*d*."

"It. to Troll for grownd pynnyng the org., ij*d*."

"It. for tymber & bords to the same, iijs. ix*d*."

"It. for makeyng the paysses for the organs, j*d*."

"It. to Ric. Bodye for workmanshypp, iijs."

"It. for brede drynk for the organ maker whylls [whilst] he entewyned [tuned] the org., iiij*d*."

This organ was, as can be seen by comparing the dates, in addition to the Barkby-Segemond instrument about which so much has been said. It seems to have lasted till 1578 when in consequence of the advance of Puritanical prejudice it was "agreed that the organes in St. Johns chauncell for that they shoude not be forfeited into the hands of the organ takers shoulde be taken downe and solde."

80. JOHN CLYMMOWE.

Clymmowe was for a time in partnership with John Howe [*q.v.*, No. 40, under Holy Trinity, Coventry, which organ was their joint work in 1526.]

81. PERROTT.

Mr. Audsley names this builder as working in 1526.†

82. JOHN DE JOHN, OR SIR JOHN.

The name of this builder is included in the list of the Musical Establishment of Henry VIII. for 1526, while the King's Household book, under date May 2, 1531, records the payment to Sir John, the organmaker, in rewarde, by the King's commandement xls." * From entries in the Exchequer Q.R. Accounts for the years 1529 to 1532, (in one of which he is described as " John de John, priest, organmaker,") we find that his wages were 50s. a quarter.†

83. MIGHEL, MERCATOR, OR MARCATOR.

This builder is also included in the Exchequer Q.R. Accounts for the years 1529-1532, when he is styled " organmaker." His wages were 22*l.* 10*s.* a year—more than double those of his colleague, John de John.‡

84. HALYAR, OF BRISTOL.

The Churchwardens' Accounts of Yatton Parish Church contain the following items under date 1527-8:—

" Payd to ye organ maker at Bristow, xxs.

„ in expenses for bringyng home ye organs, and to ye seyde Halyar of Bristow, vijs. *ob.*

Payd to ye organ maker, £xij.

Payd in expense for ye organ maker, and for hys compene that gefe attendance with him to helpe him, viijs. viij*d.*

„ to ye organ maker when that he was last payd of hys pay, for a reward [i.e. a gratuity], xvij*d.*§

The editor of the above accounts thinks that " Halyar " stands for " Haulier "—that is for the man who brought the organ from Bristol. But the context seems to suggest that the more natural explanation is that it is the name of the organ-builder.

85. JOHN HANSON.

" The organs of the desks " at Magdalen College, Oxford, were repaired by Hanson in 1529.

86. JOHN SHOWT, OR SCUTE.

In 1529 this builder was employed about the new organs at Magdalen College Chapel, Oxford, and in 1530 he repaired the organs in the quire.

87. JOHN BADCOCK.

From the Ch. w. Acc. of Wye Church (Kent):—

1530. Item to John Badcock, for mending the bellows of the grete organe, ij*d.*

The pipes of this instrument were sold as old metal in 1571 for 45*s.* 4*d.*||

88. JOHN WENSCHOTT.

From the Exeter Receiver's Rolls for 1530:—

It payd to John Wenschott the organ maker for makyng of the orgonesse in the joressens of Master Martyn, vii. xvij*s.* iiij*d.*¶

whose records cover a period of eighty-four years—from 1536, when we come across the first mention of Richard, to 1520 the year that Ralph died.

Except in the case of John and Ralph, who were brothers, the exact relationship between the four cannot be given for certain, but material and dates which have come to hand up to the present suggest that Hugh was the father of John and Ralph, and the son of Richard.

So far as present information goes, the entries which concern Richard range between 1536 and 1539; those which concern Hugh, between 1567 and 1574; John, between 1571 and 1606 (the year of his death); and Ralph, between 1609 and 1620. Two entries without Christian names (Exeter, 1554 and Woodbury, 1560) have been set down under Hugh, as I consider it more likely that they refer to him than to Richard.

Richard and Hugh seem to have lived all their lives at South Molton, but John and Ralph, though both were in all probability born in the same Devonshire town, afterwards migrated, the one to Winchester, and the other to Netherbury in Dorsetshire.

There is little doubt that the "Mr. Hugh Chappington, Attorney," whose name I have met with several times in the Account Books of S. Martin-in-the-Fields, between 1683 and 1686, belonged to the same family. He was paid varying amounts "for presenting severall suits of Law against the officers" of neighbouring parishes over disputed boundaries.

Other members of the family remained in and near their ancestral home, as proved by christenings, marriages and burials all duly recorded in the register of South Molton Church. As the earliest register dates only from 1601 it gives us no information relating to the four organ-builders in whom we are specially interested, but it shows that the Chappington family were domiciled at South Molton as late as the middle of the 18th century. The name seems to be unknown there at the present time.*

89. RICHARD CHAPPINGTON.

At least two new organs can be placed to this builder's credit:—

1.—EXETER—S. OLAVE'S CHURCH, 1536.

The agreement between the parishioners and "Richard Chappyngton, of South Molton, organ maker," dated 10th August, 1536 "for the new organ for this church is still in existence.†

2.—WOODBURY CHURCH, DEVON. 1538–9.

From the Ch.w. Acc.:—

1538–9. "Item to Richard Chapendon ffor a new peire of Orgons & the olde Organs geven wt all yn exchaunge. *vli. xiijs., iiijd.*‡

90. HUGH CHAPPINGTON.

The overlapping of the names of Hugh and John from 1571 to 1574 seems to indicate that the elder man was then nearing the end of his career as an organ-builder and in the course of relinquishing it entirely into the hands of John. He is described as "of Southe Molton in the Countie of Devon, organ-maker." Beyond that fact and the extracts given below I have no information. At least three instruments can be assigned to him, besides works of reparation:—

1.—EXETER CATHEDRAL, 1554.

Though no Christian name is given, I think the following extract from the Fabric Rolls of Exeter refers to Hugh.

1554. "Clapington granted office of Organ mender and Repairer, and 13s. 4d. for safe custody of said organs."§

2.—WOODBURY CHURCH, 1560-1.

In 1560-1 "Chapingdon" enters into an agreement that "he will yerely during his lyeff repare and alway amend the same organs for the yerely flee of ijs. viiij*d*."

Here again, though the Christian name is lacking, I feel confident that the reference is to Hugh. The organ had been built some 22 years previously by Richard Chappington (*q.v.*).

3.—SALISBURY—S. EDMUND'S CHURCH, 1567.

Though lengthy the following extracts from the Wardens' Accounts are, I trust, of sufficient interest to justify their inclusion in full:—

"1567. Charges layd owte by John Robyns & Robert batchat for ye makinge of a new pere of organs be gone the xxij of Awgust in the yere of or lord 1567 and fynyshe the same yere the vj off November as folloyth. Jn prymes bowght of hary bekingame iij skore fote of elmy n borde to make the byllos for the Organs iijs. Jt'm payd for a hondred of nayles vjd. Sacke of Colles, iij*d*. Robert Penyngton' for a hondred of tyn' & a hundred of led iiij li—viij pownd of tyn, vs—iiijlb. of tyn glasse vjs—hondred vj peny nayle vjd—hondred of nayles ijd.—iij hondred smali nayles viij*d*.—xiiij pounce of glue for the organs iijs. iij*d*.—gevy n' to ye orgen maker by the appoyntment of ye masters iij*d*.—packthrede j*d*.—ij yerdes of Jene fustyan' and ij yerdes of pampyllon to cast ye pypes vpon' ijs. vjd.—pownd of brasell iij*d*.—iij. sack of Coll xij*d*.—hondred nayles vd.—iiij ownsys of byse ijs. iij*d*.—Collars to paynt wt all vjd.—paynters oyle iij*d*.—a pan' to make fyre in j*d*.—hundred of small nayles iij*d*.—paynters platte vjd.—iij sacks of Colles xij*d*.—nayles vijd.—iij skore foote of Borde iijs. vjd.—xxx fackettes xvd.—iij quyer of browne paper iij*d*.

Sm' totalys vii xvijs. viij*d*.

Jt'm for iij sacks of Colles xvjd.—hondred viij peny nayle viij*d*.—dry wood xxd.—small corde vd.—ij dosyn of shepes skyns & iij Calves skyns xijs.—yron work for ye organs vjs. xjd.—pownd of wyer xiiij*d*.—halfe a hondred of dry Borde iijs. iij*d*.—ij hondred of nayles xij*d*.—a locke & a key and ij Jymos [hinges] ijs. iij*d*.—powd of wyer xjd.—xli pownde of led to make ye payses of ye organs way halffe a hondred a pece vs.—xij nayles ijd.—ij hondred of golde xijs.—synyper lake iijs.—a pownde Coper plate xij*d*.—

Sm' liiij*s*.

Jt'm—viij dry quarters xxx and v yerdes vs.—hundred and xv fote of sybynge borde vs vjd.—Mr. John Capplyn' for vij wenscottes xxx iijs.—ye porters for lodinge of them iij*d*.—ye Caryenge home ye wenscottes to water Ovell iijs.—at ye gate for Costome vjd.—ij planks of xvj fote longe xij*d*.—a whyte wyne Caske to make ye pypes ijs vjd.—xxiiij fote of syllinge borde xvjd. Richard batten' & John' hangod for one days worke for making' of ye fote pace before ye organs xxd.—iij skore fote of borde to make ye fote pace iijs. vjd.—hondred and a halfe of nayles ix*d*.—iij wenskot bordes ijs. ijd.—newe deske for ye bybyll iijs. Sm'totalys iij li. vs., ijd. Jt'm payd to ye Orgen' maker for makinge of ye organs xij li.—the organ' makers by the appoyntment of the masters for there Rewarde xxs. Sm' xiiij li. Sm' totalys layd owt a pon ye organs xxiiij li. xvjs. xd. More by robert hart xls. So the sayd accountant have layd out apon' the churche & ye organs by sydes robert hartes xls. xxvii. xijs. xd. So ye sayd' accountant standes in detted to ye churche xliijs vijd."

A detached fragment from the Accounts of S. Edmund's, which I came across in the Record Office, refers to this "newe payre of organs & money begged towards them" and tells us that "the whole charges of the new organs came to 37*li.* 12*s.* 10*d.*"*

That Hugh Chappington was the builder of this instrument is proved by a memorandum of 1569, the first portion of which is here given:—

"Mm. that Hughe Chappington of Southe Molton in the Countie of Devon' organ'maker for a yerelie fee of vjs. vii*d.* to be paied vnto him During' all his liefe, Dothe bynde himself to repaire thorganes newly by him late made in St. Edmundes in Sarum. . . ."

4.—SALISBURY—S. THOMAS, 1568–9.

In 1561–2, 9*s.* 2*d.* was expended upon "taking' downe of the roode lofte and organs," but in 1568–9 the churchwardens received "dyverse somes of moneye" from the parishioners "towards the makynge of the newe Orgaynes." The amount spent on the instrument "as appeareth by a byll" was £35 5*s.* 6*d.*

The bill seems to have been found subsequently to the publication of the accounts of this church. It shows that the above-mentioned amount was handed to "Hugh Chapson," the builder, in 1569.†

The fee for keeping the organ for three years, namely £1 10*s.*, was paid to John Chappington in 1571–2, but Hugh's name occurs again in 1572–3 and in 1573–4. The latter item was for 10*s.* for "keping ye orgeynes and Chymes allways in tune."

An item of 1571–2 mentioning the expenditure of 2*d.* for a "lyne to drawe the curteyn afore the fronte of thorganes" directs attention to a very usual practice of the period whereby the whole organ was enveloped in a big curtain when not in use. The object was, of course, to keep out the dust.

5.—BRAUNTON—S. BRANNOCK, 1569.

A new organ.‡

6.—STORE—SS. JOHN AND GEORGE.

7.—STORE—S. BRANNOCK.

These last two churches are not mentioned in modern clergy lists so I presume that they have been destroyed. Mr. J. Frederick Chanter says "There are several references to this Hugh Chappyngton, of South Molton, organ maker, and his men, in the Accounts of the Wardens of St. John and St. George's Store, Branton, and also in the accounts of the Wardens of St. Brannock's Store, a fee of six and eightpence being paid to him for several years for keeping the organs."§

91. JOHN CHAPPINGTON.

From the will of "John Chappington of Winchester, co. Southampton, organmaker" dated 26 June, 1606 and proved 4 July following, we find that his death occurred between the two dates given. We also learn that he was born at South Molton, to the poor of which parish he bequeathed £5. He also remembered the poor of Winchester and of the neighbouring parish of Soake. Other bequests included 20*s.* each to the cathedral churches of Winchester and Sarum and the same sum to be divided amongst "the singingmen and choristers" of Wells Cathedral in which church he expressed his desire to be buried. One clause of the will reads—"If I die in Winchester or Sarum I give to the bellringers of the same 10*s.* & for my grave there in the Church 10*s.*," which leads the writer in "The Musical Antiquary" to conclude that he was buried at Winchester, where he died, and not (as stated in *Grove*) at Wells.

There are other legacies, chiefly to relatives, one of which may be quoted—"To William Mandfeilde my apprentice 10*s.*" If we ever come across Mandfeilde's name as a builder or repairer of organs it will be of interest to remember him in connection with the worthy craftsman who taught him his trade.

John, himself, probably gained his knowledge of the art of making organs in the workshop of his relative Hugh, to whose business he seems to have succeeded about 1574. The fact that 2s. was given to "amessenger that went to Winchester" in 1599-1600 to request his attendance at Salisbury, suggests, though hardly proves, that at least the last six years of his life were spent in the former city.

His name can now be associated with the instruments in seven buildings :—

1.—SALISBURY—S. THOMAS' CHURCH.

The item "J. Chappington fee for 3 yeres £1 10s.," in 1571-2 is the earliest mention of this builder that I have yet met with. The organ was quite a new one, built, as previously said, in 1569 by Hugh Chappington. The above extract shows that Hugh was assisted in his task by John.

We may also take it for granted that it is John who is referred to in the following item for the year 1579-80—"Chapperton mendinge the organs by commaundement of Mr. Mayeor, 13s. 4d."

2.—ASHBURTON CHURCH.

Mr. J. H. Butcher's "*Parish of Ashburton in the 15th and 16th Centuries*" contains the following :—

1575-6. To Mr. Chapynton for mendyng of the organs, iijl. vjs.

For ij peces to staye the organs, viij*d*.

For nayles to nayle ytt, ij*d*.

For a workman to doo ytt, iij*d*."

This organ was taken down from the rood loft in 1579-80, when the loft itself was removed.

3.—MERE CHURCH (WILTS). 1578.

There are many references to organs and organ-builders in the Accounts of this church from 1556 onwards, but no name occurs till 1580, when we find that xs. was "paied to John Chappington for two yeaes for the organs."

Four years later, in 1584 we find—

"For mending the organs

Item to Chaperton for mending the organs xlvjs. viij*d*.

Item to a Carpenter for casing the billowes xij*d*.

Item for nayles about the same vd.

These are the only times he (or any other) is mentioned.

The "last state" of this organ is related in an Inventory of 1636.

"Itm in the lofte over the northe Ile one payre of olde decayed Organes wth xxvj Orgayne Pypes of the greater sorte in them besides the three Pypes hereafter chardged, beside a quantite of small pypes wch were not numbred and were in the pype case.

In the Treasury Lofte over the Northe Porche theise goods.

Three Great Pypes of the Organes."*

4.—SALISBURY—S. EDMUND'S CHURCH.

From 1587 till his death in 1606 John Chappington was paid 6s. 8*d*. almost every year for looking after the organ in this church, indeed his name occurs in the accounts for 1606-7 but the amount "6s. 8*d*." has been erased.

We shall not be far wrong if we conclude that John did his share in the making of this instrument which, as we have seen, was built by Hugh Chappington in 1567.

5.—LONDON—WESTMINSTER ABBEY.

It is assumed that John Chappington built an organ for the Abbey shortly before 1596, for in that year he sold the old organ to the Churchwardens of S. Margaret's, whose record of the transaction is given below. It is, of course' very unlikely that the Abbey instrument would have come into his hands except as part-payment for a new one.

6.—LONDON—S. MARGARET'S, WESTMINSTER, 1596.

The authority for the above is preserved in the following memoranda—

1596. "Paid to Mr. Chappington for the organs of the colledge, xiiij*li*. xij*ss*. iij*d*. and the old organs [built by Broughe in 1590—see

below] do remayn in the parish church to be sold by the churchwardens for the best benefit of the said parish church."

In 1600-1, the above organ was either superseded by a new one, or (more probably) extensively repaired and renovated, as shown by the following excerpts—

"Item for breade and drinke for the workemen aboute the Organs, xvij*d*.

Item for vj laborers for the mountinge of the Organ case, ijs. *xd*.

Item paide to John Chappington organ maker, for settinge up of the organs and tuninge of them, xxxs.

Item paide to William Percy for paintinge ye organs, xxxvijs. *vjd*.

Item for three ponde of leade and halfe a daies worke to soder the Organs, xij *d*.

Item for a houlde faste and nayles for the organs, iij*d*.

Item paide to John Clarke Joyner for waynescott for the Organs as appeareth by his bill, iiij*li*. iijs.

Item paid to Robert Yorke Carpenter for makinge of the Organ lofte as appeareth by his bill, . . . *li*. iiij *s*.

Item paid to Mr. Manne for nayles of diverse sorts and for Bordes quarters and lathes for the Organs as appeareth by his bill, xxvijs.

Item paid to Symon Alley for Tenne daies attendance att the settinge up of the Organs, iijs."*

1600 "The charge for the organs, in all, xvij*li*., ijs., vij*d*."†

7.—OXFORD—MAGDALEN COLLEGE CHAPEL, 1597.

This organ was either built or rebuilt by Chappington in 1597, the amount of his charges being 3*l*. 13*s*. 8*d*. In the following year he received 2*l*. for repairs either to this or to some other organ belonging to the College.

Dr. Bloxam considered that "the old organ" which was sold by the authorities to "Mr. Collyns of Whitney" in 1685 was this organ of Chappington's, while Dr. Rimbault, held that the Chappington organ "remains to this day"—on the south side of the Quire at Tewkesbury Abbey. It is not possible to settle this point for certain, except to say that though the Tewkesbury *case* may have been made to contain Chappington's instrument in 1597 (it may have belonged to an even earlier organ) none of the pipes and mechanism are likely to be older than 1637, the date when Harris, grandfather to Renatus Harris, built the organ in question, then at Magdalen. [See also under Harris, No. 158 below.]

92. RALPH CHAPPINGTON.

"My brother Raulfe Chappington shall not have to doe with any goods I haue for he is very troublesome." So spoke John Chappington, as his Will testifies, shortly before his death, though he left twenty pounds apiece to two of his brother's daughters.

In his own will, dated 7 June, 1619, and proved 5 May, 1620, Ralph describes himself as "of Netherbury, co. Dorset, organist." After expressing his "desire to be buried in the church or churchyard of Netherbury," and his wishes as to the disposal of his property, he concludes with a list of debts owing to him by the following six churches:—

1. Salisbury —Church of Our Lady, 13*s*.
2. " —S. Thomas, 10*s*.
3. " —S. Edmund, 10*s*.
4. Bristol —S. Augustine, "for two years wages, 20*s*."
5. Wedmore Church (co. Somerset) "for 3 years ended at Midsummer next, 15*s*."
6. Bridgewater Church, 10*s*.‡

Confirmation that the above money was due to Ralph for his oversight of the organs in the various churches named, is available in the Accounts of the two Salisbury churches so often referred to in this notice of the Chappington family. Thus at S. Edmund's he was paid 10s. no less than seven times between 1609 and 1620, the usual entry being "Ralfe Chappington for his Organn' fee." In 1617-18 the notice of him is longer—"Ralffe Chapintonn' for keeping the Organ in tune, 10s., mendinge one of the maine pypes of the Organ, 6d." The S. Thomas' Accounts mention him thrice only, each time without the Christian name:—

1608-9. "Mr. Chappington mending the Organs, £3 10s."

1613-14. "Mr. Chappington. Organs, 10s."

1619-20. "Chapington Organes, 10s."

One other church which employed him can be cited:—

7.—SALISBURY—S. MARTIN'S CHURCH.

1611-12. "Mr. Champingtonne for kiping the Organes, vs."*

From the situation of the localities above mentioned, it is evident that Ralph had an extensive and lucrative connection as a tuner in the West of England. Some, and probably most of this came to him upon the death of his brother John in 1606. The two older members of the family were builders of repute whose fame spread beyond the borders of the West Country—no small testimony to their skill.

93. THOMAS FOUNTAYNE.

I am indebted to Mr. H. T. Lilley for the following information. It will be seen that Fontayne combined the two arts of making and playing organs.

About the year 1539 the Church of S. Thomas (Portsmouth Parish Church) possessed two organs, both of them in a somewhat decrepit state. On Christmas Eve, 1531, "John Erney and William Bodye, officials and Wardens of the Church and Parish of Portsmouth, came complaining against Thomas fountayne lately of the aforesaid Parish Horgan-player concerning a transgression and thereupon demanded vli." It was agreed, however, "that the seyd thomas schall have the ij olde peyre of organys to repare the one for the usse of the parysche aforesyd so that the one be sufficiently made and set uppe in the churche aforesyd." in the course of the next nine months, and pay 2s. 6d. before Midsummer for the concession.

94. WILLIAM TREASORER.

Until quite recently little was known of this organ-maker beyond an entry above quoted in connection with Beton (*q.v.* No. 69 above) which shows him to have been "Regall maker" to Edward VI. at a salary of £10 per annum, and a portion of a summary of a curious and quaint document appended to it as a footnote.† This document is given at greater length in *The Musical Antiquary* for January, 1912, together with some very interesting biographical details.

The said document is a renewal by Queen Elizabeth for twelve years of a licence which had been granted to Treasurer by Mary and Philip for eight years, from 1553. It was addressed "to all Mayres Sherifes," etc., and explained that as Philip and Mary did "lycense and authorise their late s[er]vaunte and now ours William Treasurer the maker of their muscicall instruments," his servants, assigns or executors "to buye in anye place or places of their saide Realme of Englande the nombre and Quantitie of one Hundred thousand Lasts of Asshes and foure Hundred thowsand dozens of old worne Showes And . . . to freight and lade as oft and when theye shoulde thinke goode in any shippe . . . And . . . conveighe the said Asshes and olde Shooes at all tymes at their Lib[er]tie within the space of eight yeres . . . into the Parties beyonde the Seas there to vtter sell and distribute the same to his or their most profit," so "in consideration that the said William

Treasorer hathe devised and gen[en] vnto vs a newe instrument Muscally geving the sound of Flutes and recorders And Lykewise hathe promysed and taken vpon him at his Laboure Costes and charge to re[pa]ir and amende before the Feast of Saincte Michael thar[changel] next ensynge the Date hereof owre great Organes stand[ynge] in owre Chappell within our manoure of Greenwich, . . . the licence is extended for a further period of twelve years on the same terms as before.

From seven extracts taken from Volume 10 of the Huguenot Society's Publications, and ranging from 1549 to 1582-3, (also given in the above mentioned issue of "The Musical Antiquary") we gather that Treasurer was a German who came to England about 1540, that he became a naturalized Englishman, that he lived in the Parish of Christ Church, Newgate Street from the year 1549 till his death, that he carried on there his trade of virginall maker, and that his servant, Jasper Blankard (to whom we shall refer later on) lived with him for at least some years. Both Treasurer and Blankard attended the Parish Church.

In these extracts Treasurer's Christian name is given variously—William, Guillam, Guyilam, Gyllam, and Gyllyam.

The Registers of Christ Church, Newgate Street contain the following reference to his burial:—

1584. May 1. Mr. Gyllyam, organ maker & servant to the Queen's Majestye.

It is curious that so little is known of the organs built and rebuilt by Treasurer, for he must have done a good deal of work of this kind during his long residence in England, helped as he was with the patronage of Edward VI., Mary, and Elizabeth. Yet beyond the invention of a musical instrument and the reparation of the organ at Greenwich already referred to in the Royal Licence no organs seem to have been referred to him as maker or repairer.

If fancy, however, that the following extract from "The Early Minute Books of the Dean and Chapter of Canterbury" refers to Treasurer.* In 1573 it was agreed to

"disburse to the quenes orgayne maker beyng sent for to viewe and mende the greate orgaynes for his costs as well at this tyme as at an other tyme before this and for mendyng of the lesser orgaynes in the quyere six pounds thyrtyne shillings and four pens."

The fact that Jasper Blankard was employed on the same organs in 1578 may be taken as confirmation of Treasurer's engagement in 1573, for Blankard seems to have left his old employer and set up for himself some time between these two dates. [See below, under Blankard, No. 110].

It is also possible that the builder mentioned next but one below was none other than William or Guillam Treasurer.

Treasurer's name is found amongst the lists of new year's presents given to and by Queen Mary in 1556:—"By Guilham treasurer, a peire of virge milles" [virginalls]. This instrument the queen reserved for her own use, giving him in return "oone guilt salte" weighing 13½ ounces.†

95. BETTS, OF WETHERDEN.

I am indebted to Dr. Mann for the following items from the Churchwardens' Accounts of Boxford Church, Suffolk:—

1541. "p. to bettys for mendyng of the organs, vs.

1548. "Item pd to Betts of Wetherden for removynge of the orgaynes, vs. iiijd.

The following, from the Churchwardens Accounts of S. Mary the Great, Cambridge,‡ may, or may not, refer to the same individual:—

1564. to betts ye synggeman for mendyng ye orgaynes And makyng newe pypes, xijs.

96. GYLLAINS.

In his "Mediaeval Church Organ" Dr. Hopkins gives the following from the Records of All Hallows, Barking :—

1542. "Item to Gyllains, the organ maker, for making of the Orgons in the Roid lofte Dabbyll se fautt (Double c-fa-ut), and the Regalls, xjs."

Can Gyllains be identified with either Gilleam (who was at work as early as 1511) or William (Guillam) Treasour (who died in 1584) both of whom have been mentioned previously? The long lapse of time between 1511 and 1584 precludes the possibility that all three names can refer to one man.

97. WHYTE, OR WHITE.

This builder's name occurs several times in connection with the organs at Magdalen College Chapel, Oxford, between the years 1531 and 1545. In 1531 (where he is styled *Magister Whyte*) he repaired the two pairs of organs in the quire at a cost of £1 8s. 4d., and in 1532 he repaired the great organ. He was again employed by the college to execute various repairs in 1539, 1542 and 1545.

Another church where he was employed was S. Michael's, Bishop's Stortford. The Churchwardens' Accounts show that vs. was "pd to Whyte of London for mendyng of the orgons" here in the year 1532.*

We next hear of him, in 1553, in connection with the Church of S. Andrew, Holborn, where the Churchwardens' Books contain the two following entries† :—

"I Mary [1553] The parish gave young Whyte £5 for ye great orgaynes which his father gave to† ye church.

"1572. Md yt ye sayd Langston [churchwarden] without leave of ye parishioners or consent of ye Vestry & clean against ye mynd of ye parson solde awaye ye great orgaynes given by Mr. Whyte & for wh. ye parish payd v£ to young Whyte, & was at greater charges for a loft to sett them upp on not long before. He puled down ye loft & sold these fayre Orgaynes & excellent Instrument for xl. xs. unto ye Deane of Westminster & ye Mynster Church ther where now they stand & cannot be bought for any money so highly are they esteemed for their goodness."

It was at one time thought that White, the elder, was the celebrated composer, Robert White, but it is now known that this cannot have been the case. It is, however, extremely likely that the organ-builder was Robert White, the father of the composer, and this conjecture receives substantial confirmation from the fact that the composer was Master of the Choristers at Westminster Abbey from 1570 to 1574, and that his father was then living with him. Moreover among the Westminster Abbey Muniments is a bond dated Dec. 29, 1572, which is connected with the sale of the organ of S. Andrew's, Holborn, to "Robert Whyte," gentlemen of Westminster, who must have been either the father or the son. The elder White survived his son, the latter being carried off by the plague, which raged at Westminster in 1574, together with his wife, and three of their five daughters, all within the space of a few weeks.‡

98. JOHN VAUCKS.

The name of this builder is found in connection with the Churchwardens' Accounts of Wimborne Minster, as under || :—

1531. "Payd for mendyng of the organs to John Vawckes, xijs.

The charges of the new organs, ijli. viijs. vijd.

for making of a bar and a hanging lock and a key to the lyttyll

organs, viij*d.*; an iron bar for the shalms, viij*d.*; for ratsbaan, and dressing of it, iv*d.*: for setting up of a bar to the great organs, x*d.*

For carving of weynscot, ix*d.*

For a shepe skyn and a pound of glu, viij*d.*

To the organ maker for his labour, ijs.

To the bed man [bedes man] for blowing of the organs."

1534. "To John Vaucks for mendyng of the great organs, &c., ixs. iij*d.*"

1535. "Paid for mending the bellows of the great organs and for new ropes for the said bellows, viij*d.*

Pd. to John Vaucks for mendyng of the gret organs, xxvs. iv*d.*, for hys bord, ixs. viij*d.*, and to Thomas Wever to serve the said Vaucks, ixs. iij*d.*: for cools [coals], iij*d.*, for mending of a stop and a new lock, viij*d.*, for allome, iv*d.*, for shepe skynnyys, xxd., for glu and small nayls, iv*d.*, for nayls for the skaffold, iij*d.*, and for tallow candells, iij*d.*—total xljs. v*d.*"

There is also a memorandum to the effect that "In 1533 a pair of organs were set up by John Vaucks, and paid for by the parish."

Vaucks' organ seems to have lasted till the year 1643 when it was damaged ("pd for sum of the organ pipes, 6*d.*"). The remainder of the pipe-metal was sold in 1651 and subsequently.

99. SIR THOMAS BRABANT, A PRIEST.

We meet with this builder's name in the Accounts of Wing Church, Bucks:—

1538. "In primis, payd for the organs and the ornaments that cayme from Woburne, ix*li* [probably from Woburn Abbey, at the Dissolution of that house].

Ite for meyte & drink when we went for the orgayns to Woburn, & for workemen, ijs. vij*d.*

Ite to Sir Thomas for setting of ye organs, vs.

Ite to Sir Thomas for kyppling ye organs, vs."

1539. M.D. that I Sr Thomas brabant haue recd. of the Cherchemen for my halfe yere wagys fro' mydsomr to Crystmas, xs. [This memorandum is in a different handwriting from the other entries—evidently the priest's own hand].

a pekke of colles [peck of coals] for the ioiner when he did mend the orgayns, iv*d.*

It payd to Sr Thomas for setting home of ye organs fro Langley, iij*js.* iij*d.*" *

100. EDMUND POPINJAY.

The name of this builder is found in the Accounts of Winchester College, for 1542, he being paid 17*s.* 8*d.* "for various work upon the organ and bellows." †

101. BUTSON.

All that is known of this person is that he repaired the organs in the quire at Magdalen College, Oxford, in 1543.

102. FORTESCEWE.

I believe that the "mayster fortescewe" to whom *vjli* xiijs. iij*d.* was paid by the Churchwardens of S. Martin-in-the-Fields in 1544–6 "for the Organys Sum" was not the builder of the new organ then set up but a person of authority entrusted with the payment of the builder, who was, in all probability, John Howe. [See above under John Howe, No. 40, and S. Martin's Church].

103. SIR WILLIAM CORVEHILL, OF MUCH WENLOCK.

Sir Thomas Butler, last Abbot of Shrewsbury and then parish priest of Much Wenlock, speaks most highly of the skill and worth of Sir William Corvehill, who had been a monk of Much Wenlock Abbey until the Dissolution, when he became "responsible for the daily Lady Mass in the parish church." He was "excellently and singularly expert in divers of the seven liberal sciences . . . and few or none of handicraft but that he had a very good insight in them, as the making of organs: . . . and no instrument of music being but that he could mend it, and many good gifts the man had, and a very patient man, and full honest in his conversation and living." * He died c. 1544.

If Dom William was all this he was a most delightful person.

104. SIR RAFE (A PRIEST).

The Wardens' Accounts of the Parish Church of S. Michael, Bishop's Stortford, † contain the following information under date 1547:—

"Item pd. to Syr Rafe for mending of the Orgons, vs."

105. JOHN BOSTEN.

In *The Musical Times* for December, 1913, Dr. Cummings tells us that Bosten was co-organist at Waltham Abbey with Thomas Tallis. After the Dissolution of the Abbey in 1540 Bosten seems to have been kept on as organist by the Parishioners. In 1546 he was paid "twentie pence" for mending the Organs.

106. HAMME.

Our knowledge of this worthy is derived from the account books of S. Edmund and S. Thomas, Salisbury. He was apparently one of the officials of the latter church. The possession of a certain amount of mechanical skill was a source of additional profit to himself, as witness the following excerpts upon which his claim to inclusion in our Records is based:—

1548-9. "Mr. Hamme for his wayges, vli. xs. & vnto hym for glewe & v skynnes for mendinge the orgaynes, ijs. ijd. and for his ffee in keypyng the organs, iij. s. iiij. d."

1549-50. "Mr. Ham' for his hoole yeres waiges, viijli—hym for his ffee in keypyng of the Organs, iij. s. iiij. d."

Mr. Ham' for his ffee in keypyng of the Organs, iij. s. iiij. d."

1551-2 "to Mr. Ham' for his quarters wayges due at Mydsomer, xls."

2.—SALISBURY—S. EDMUND.

1552-3 "to ham' for mendinge off ye organes, xls."

107. ROBARTT, OF CREWKERNE.

This "orgyn maker:" seems to have made a business of letting out organs to churches by the year. For one such instance, in 1551, he was paid by John Hassard, Mayor of Lyme Regis, "his year's rent, 10s." ‡

108. JAMES HEWET.

Hewet was a regal-player, and possibly also a regal-maker. At any rate his instruments and his services were in request, as witness the two following extracts from the accounts of the *Weavers' Pageant*, performed at Coventry:—

"1554. Payd to James Hewet for hys reygalls, viijd."

1556. Payd to James Hewet for playing of his regals in the payggeant, viiid." §

109. THOMAS TUCKER.

Tucker was paid iij*s.* *xd.* in 1557-8 "for kepyng of the orgaynes and the chauncell" at S. Edmund's Salisbury for iij quarters.

110. JASPER BLANKARD.

We have met with this person before when dealing with William Treasurer. From information there given or referred to, we find that he was of German birth, that he came to London about the year 1566, that he lived in the same house as Treasurer, whose servant he was from 1568 till 1571, if not longer, and that both of them attended their parish church—Christ Church, Newgate Street. His name is given at different times as "Blanke," "Blankard" and "Blanckerd." A fourth variant of it is found in the last notice we get of him, in 1582-3—"Jasper Blanchart, virginall maker, of the Englishe Church. Living in the Ward of Allgate."*

One organ at least was rebuilt by him, and his work must have given considerable satisfaction to the Dean and Chapter of Canterbury, by whom he was employed, in 1578, for they paid him "xx*li.* ouer and besides the bargayne and agrement made with hym for the amending of the greate orgaynes." It was also agreed that he should have "a fee or rewarde yerely to thys ende that he shall twyse everye yere make hys repayre to thys church to see to the sayd orgaynes and amende the same if neede so requyre."†

Blankard probably attracted the notice of the Canterbury authorities in 1573 when he assisted Treasurer "the queenes orgayne maker" to repair the organs in their Cathedral church—for I have no doubt that it was Treasurer who did this work. Blankard left the house and service of Treasurer and started in business on his own account sometime between 1571 and 1576.

111. WYLLYAM SQUYER.

On August 8, 1564 Wylllyam Squyer was paid 4*s.* 4*d.* for "mending" the organs at S. Edmund's, Salisbury. "When he set in ye pypes" he required the services of an assistant, one John Atkins, who was paid v*jd.* "to blo ye organs."

112. CUTHBERT SWYNBANKE.

Shortly after the accession of Queen Elizabeth [1558] one Cuthbert Swynbanke was paid £5 6*s.* 8*d.* "for mending $\frac{3}{4}$ ths (*trium partium*) of the organs n the quire and the chapel of S. Mary," at Chichester Cathedral.‡

113. JOHN TYSDALE.

In 1567 this builder was paid iij*s.* iv*d.* "for mending ye organs and for stuff" by the Church Burgesses of Sheffield Parish Church, and in 1570, for exactly similar work "and for ys meals and drynke as doth appear by certayne bylls, x*xs.* iv*d.*"§

In all probability he was the "Mr. Teaysdall" on whose behalf the Churchwardens of Ecclesfield Church expended 4*d.* in 1572 "for his dynn" when he came to wayt off *thorganes*." There was more feasting "when we went to Thos. Cutts to let Mr. Taysdall trye the organs." On this occasion the amount was iij*d.*, and it was "spent off us churchwardens."||

114. FENTON.

According to the Churchwardens' Accounts of Doncaster Parish Church, Mr. Fenton was paid "13*s.* 4*d.* for an organe case" in 1569. Dr. Rimbault

said that the organ was in all probability the work of James Dempsey* [*q.v.* No. 65 above], but Fenton's claim to be the builder ought not to be passed over lightly. Moreover James Dempsey was buried on July 26th, 1567, and *his* organ had been built in 1561.

115. LODOVICUS THEEWES 1579.

The remains of an old organ formerly in the Chapel at Ightham Moat House, Kent, but now in the Victoria and Albert Museum, South Kensington, bear the inscription "Lodowicus Theewes me fecit 1579." The date of this instrument was at one time a matter of controversy, the late Dr. W. B. Gilbert considering it to be of no greater antiquity than the middle of the eighteenth century.† On the other hand Dr. A. G. Hill describes it as "one of our earliest examples" though "scarcely of the church type."‡

It is really a combination of an organ and a harpsichord, playable singly or in combination from a single keyboard. The harpsichord, which is of the usual wing-shape, lies along the top of the organ, the cover of the latter being cut to fit the base of the former. There were apparently three stops to the harpsichord (two on the left hand and one on the right) and ten (five on either side) to the organ. The latter were almost certainly half-stops.

Both instruments are in an extremely defective condition. Only a single key (a parti-coloured sharp) now remains, and only one pipe.

The case-work is of oak, constructed in panels separated by pilasters, decorated with colour and stucco ornament, stamped and gilt. Strap-work, and medallions containing two armorial shields and two crests, are a noticeable feature of the design.

116. ROBERT.

Here is another instance of a maker of organs known to us by a single reference. He was paid xxs. "for repayringe of thorgans" of S. Margaret's Westminster in 1583-4.§

117. EDMOND SCHETZ.

Schetz was the official "Maker, Repairer & Tuner" to Queen Elizabeth and James I from 1587-8 to 1600-1. His salary was £50 per annum. The Declared Accounts of the Audit Office for these years make only one mention of him in connection with organ-work, namely in 1592-3, when we read of "charges of himself & others employed diverse days in repairing of Her Majesty's organs & other instruments at Hampton Court and other places"

118. ANDREW, THE ORGAN MAKER.

The Corporation Records of Yarmouth show that an order was made in 1588 for the payment of 2s. 6d., to "Andrew, the organ maker" the sum being "due to him for six years; and that the same be paid yearly by the churchwardens."¶

119. BROUGHE.

From the Churchwardens' Accounts of S. Margaret's, Westminster:—

"1589-90. Payd to Mr. Broughe, for changeinge of our Organns for a payre of his, viij*li*."**

This organ seems to have been superseded in 1596 by another one which had done duty in the Abbey. [See above under John Chappington, No. 91]. It apparently remained in the church till 1600-1 when it was "soulde by the consente of a vestrye" for vij*li*. iijs. iiij*d*.*

120. WILLIAM SMYTHE.

William Smythe, minor canon, and afterwards (from 1594 to 1599) organist, of Durham, was also endowed with a fair amount of mechanical skill, as the following letter testifies:—

"Payd xxviijs Septebris 1589. To the right worshipfull Mr. Doctor Pilkington vicedeane And the chapter of Durham.

May it please yow to vnderstand right worshipfull that whereas yow have one pare of Orgaynes wch standeth above the Quere doore, & haith not bene played vpon thes many yeres for lacke of mendinge, I have bestowed a weekes labour in mendinge the sownd boord, the wynd stopp, the spring wyers, and in tuninge the pipes, so that I have mayd them in that good order as now they will much delight bothe the auditorie and the player because they yeld the most principallest and imperiall sound of all the rest. And if it seame strainge vnto yor worshipes that I have tayken in hand to doe it, yow shall vnderstand that I have had some practise in mendinge of an Instrument, and also I have geven diligence in markinge men of greater skill that haith bene here in tymes passed when they have been recompensed five markes or fortie shillings for lesse paynes than I have taken (wch I referr to the quere) so that now I leve my paynes to yor good considerations, for because I did not so much seeke after the recompence of rewarde as I did the excellencie of the Instrumente regarde, and also that yow should see my redinesse & good will to indeavour myselfe in what soevr I may to profit or Church.

Vors in whattsoevr he is able,

Willam Smythe pettica'no'.†

It is pleasant to add that Smythe received 30s. for his trouble.

121. JOHN SYLFESTER.

"For mending the Organs" at S. Edmund's, Salisbury, Sylfester received 2s. in 1590-1. The work was probably done when John Chappington was not available, for the latter had charge of the organ here for this year and for many years both before and after.

122. E. HOFFHEIMER.

A very beautiful Positive Organ, owned by Mr. W. H. Head, was on view at the Music Loan Exhibition in 1904. It was built by E. Hoffheimer in 1592. Every pipe is of wood, those which are seen being most elaborately carved to resemble, as far as possible, the Scotch thistle. (The organ appears to have been made for an Earl of Montrose, for his arms and monogram form a prominent feature in the decoration). The compass of the instrument is from E to C, 45 notes, and the stops are "Stopped Diapason," "Flute," and "Regal." There is also a Tremolo which, used in conjunction with the Regal stop, is said to give the effect of a Vox Humana. The stop knobs are placed at the side of the instrument, where they act directly upon the sliders. A photograph of the instrument was reproduced in *The Musical Times* for August, 1904.

The dimensions of the instrument are 5ft. 9in. high, by 3ft. 6in. wide, by 1ft. 9in. deep.

It is sometimes known as "Queen Elizabeth's Organ," but there is no evidence that it ever belonged to a member of the Royal Family.

123. HUGH ROSE.

In 1593-94 this organ-builder was paid *vjl. xiijs. iiijd.* for the Organ (probably for repairs) at Trinity College Chapel, Cambridge, a new case being at the same time provided by Andrew Chapman, the carpenter, at a cost of *xxiiijl.* This organ had probably been in use in the old Chapel of King's Hall, which had served the college for some years until the new chapel was built in 1555-67.*

124. HENRY NUGENT.

Dr. Grattan Flood mentions this organ maker as resident in Dublin in 1595.†

125. THOMAS DALLAM.

Of Thomas Dallam, the first of a distinguished family of organ-builders who flourished during the 17th century, we know so much and yet so little—so much about one episode of his life, so little of the rest of his career. The episode to which we refer is his voyage to Turkey in charge of a mechanical organ he had constructed—a present from Queen Elizabeth to the Sultan, Mahomed III.‡ Dallam recorded his adventures and experiences at some length in a Diary which has been published by the Hakluyt Society under the editorship of Mr. J. Theodore Bent, and the reader who would make its acquaintance is referred to this work (vol. lxxxvii., issued in 1893), or to the extensive and well-chosen extracts from it which will be found in *The Musical Times* for October, 1905. Dallam set out from London on “the nynthe of Februarie 1598 [1599], being Fridaye,” and was absent on his mission for fourteen or fifteen months.

The family came from Dallam, a hamlet near Warrington, Lancashire, of which place Thomas was in all probability a native. Assuming him to have been about 24 years of age at the time he undertook his voyage to Turkey, the date of his birth would be *circa* 1575. He served his apprenticeship in London—presumably to an organ-builder—after which he was admitted a liveryman of the Blacksmiths' Company. When warmly pressed to stay amongst the Turks, Dallam excused himself by saying that he had “a wyfe and childrin in Inglande who did expecte my returne. Than they asked me how long I had been unmaried and how many children I hade. Thoughe indeede I had nether wyfe nor childrin, yeat to excuse my selfe I made them that answeare.” Shortly after his return to his native country he made good his deficiency in both respects, for his son Robert was born in 1602 or early in 1603, as we learn from the inscription on the latter's tomb-stone.

The last unmistakeable reference to Thomas is found in the Minute Book of the Blacksmiths' Company under date Sept. 29, 1627. Here is recorded his payment of 5*l.* and his offer to pay the remainder of the 10*l.* fine (imposed upon him the previous year for refusing the office of steward of the company) by yearly instalments of 1*l.*, 2*l.*, and 3*l.* His signature appended to the agreement shows that the correct spelling of his name is Dallam, and not any of the variants sometimes met with—Dalham, Dallum, Dallan, Dallans, Dalhom, Dullom, and Dallom.

Since Robert was certainly at work at his trade in March, 1632 we may, I think, presume that Thomas either died or gave up active work in his son's favour between 1626 and 1632. The respective ages of father and son would, in 1630, be about 55 and about 27.

During some thirty years of effective work, Thomas must have built and repaired many instruments in different parts of the country but in addition to the mechanical organ above mentioned only six can be referred to him

with any degree of certainty, and with these six I intend to deal as briefly as possible.

1.—CAMBRIDGE—KING'S COLLEGE CHAPEL.

"The charges about the organs, &c., from the 22nd of June, 1605, to the 7th of August, 1606," consisting of upwards of a hundred items, and amounting to about £370, are given in full in Hopkins and Rimbault, pages 64-67, being an almost verbatim reprint of a portion of the Rev. J. Brocklebank's Paper on the organs of King's College in *The Ecclesiologist* for December, 1859. From these charges we find that Dallam and his men came down from London to Cambridge with many of their tools (a good many of the larger implements were made for the purpose in Cambridge), that bedding was hired for his men for the whole year and for himself for the first quarter, after which he lodged at three different houses in the town, and that the whole establishment was boarded in the College Hall during their stay at Cambridge. We learn also that the instrument consisted of "Greate" and "Chayre" organs with their separate cases decorated in gold and colours and the front pipes not only coloured and gilt but embossed as well. Only one stop is mentioned, namely "the shaking stoppe," the "brasse" for which cost iij*s*.

The College accounts for 1607 record the payment to him of xxx*v*s. for tuning the organ, besides a like amount received by the sale of surplus tin which was not required for the pipes: those for 1617, that he was paid £10 for repairs. Payments made to Dallam in 1638 and 1641 were, I am confident, for reasons already stated, made to one of his sons—almost certainly Robert, who did much work in Cambridge at this time.

It should here be stated that no Christian name occurs in any of the Dallam entries in the books of this College.

2.—HATFIELD HOUSE.

The organ in the Summer Drawing Room was originally placed in the Chapel. It is contemporary with the House, and is thought to have been a present to Robert Earl of Salisbury the builder of the House. There is a record of a payment to Thomas Dallam for "setting up and perfecting the great wind instrument at Hatfield" in 1611. The somewhat indefinite nature of this notice leaves us in doubt whether the organ was built in that year or whether it was removed here from elsewhere. In the latter event the original builder may not have been Dallam.

The manual, stop-knobs, and (of course) the pedals are comparatively modern, but the original case remains intact. This, as can be seen from the photograph, is very beautiful. It is elaborately inlaid and exquisitely decorated in gold and colours. The cornice projects considerably beyond the body of the case, so that the pillars which support it stand quite clear of the front. The (modern) music desk is the only blemish.

There are six stops—*Open diapason*, *Stopd. diapason*, *Principal*, *Fifteenth*, *Cornett*, *Sesquialtera*, also a Shifting movement and a Foot Blower. Compass: *Manual*, GG (without GG sharp) to F, 58 notes; *Pedal*, G (no GG sharp) to G, 12 notes, attached to Manual.

3.—WORCESTER CATHEDRAL.

"A.D. 1613. All the materials and workmanship of the new double organ in the Cathedral church of Worcester to Thomas Dallam, organ-maker, came to £211." So runs an extract from the archives of this cathedral.

Habington in his "Survey of Worcester" speaks of it as "a most faire and excellent Organ adorned with imperiall crownes, red roses, including the white flowre-de-luses, pomgranades, being all Royall badges." From an inscription on the case, quoted by Habington, we learn that the organ was set up largely owing to the exertions of Thomas Tompkins, then organist. John Tompkins, who was organist of King's when Dallam's organ was set up there, was brother to Thomas Tompkins.

4.—OXFORD—MAGDALEN COLLEGE CHAPEL.

The name Dalham occurs in the college accounts at various times between 1615 and 1637. Here again no Christian name is given, but I have little doubt

that the entries for 1615 and 1624 (when the costs of certain repairs were £4 and £2 respectively) refer to Thomas, and the entries for 1632, 1637 and 1661 to Robert.

5.—EDINBURGH—CHAPEL ROYAL, HOLYROOD PALACE.

Dr. Rimbault, quoting from a letter written by John Chamberlain to Sir Dudley Carleton, Dec. 7, 1616, mentions this organ "that cost above £400, besides all manner of furniture for a chapel, which Inigo Jones tells me he hath the charge of," but he did not know who had built it.* It was my good fortune, when searching for documents referring to Dallam and other old English organ-builders to come across the "Warrant for 300*l*." for this organ which shows that it was built by this maker. This document,† which so far as I know, has not yet been printed, I here give in full:—

JAMES R.

James etc. to the Treas. and undertreas of or Excheqr for the tyme being greeting; whereas by or commaundement and upon or special direcon in that behalf given, or trusty and well beloved chaplaines the Reverend fathers in God James Bishop of Bath and Wells, deane of or chapple and Richard Bishop of Lincolne clarcke of or closet have bargained and agreed with Thomas Dallam of London organ maker for the making of a faire large and verie serviceable double organ to be set up in or Chapple Royall at Edinburgh in Scotland, the charge whereof will amount to the some of three hundred pounds of lawfull English money according to the effect of certaine Articles indented, concluded and agreed upon in that behalf between the said reverend fathers on the one part and the said Thomas Dallam on the other part; These are therefore to will and require you out of or treasure remayning in or Excheqr to paie or cause to be paid to the said Thomas Dallam the said some of three hundred pounds without accompt imprest or other charge to be set upon him for the same or any part thereof and these etc. given etc.

Warrant for 300*l*. for the Organ for Edinburgh, 4 July 1616.

6.—LONDON—S. MARGARET'S, WESTMINSTER.

From the Ch. w. Acc. for 1617–8:—

Paid to Mr. Dalham for mending of the Organs as by his acquittance appeareth, xv*li*.

This is the only mention of Dallam, but I have no doubt that he was the builder employed in repairing the organ in 1613–4, and in making "twoe paire of new Bellowes to the Organs, and for amending the same Organs the sixth. of December 1615."

The last item cost v*li*.‡

Two other organs have been connected with his name by the late Mr. F. G. Edwards—those in the Cathedrals at Canterbury and Gloucester.§ Mr. Edwards states that in 1573 the Queen's organ maker was sent for to examine and repair the great organs of the first named church and adds that "this Queen's organ maker was doubtless Thomas Dallam." The date 1573 is not altogether impossible to reconcile with known events in his career, though it would assume his birth before 1550, his marriage at the age of over 50, and would make him over 76 years old in 1526 when we last hear of him for certain. But altogether apart from the improbability of his holding the royal warrant when so young—and the older he was then, the older he would be at the time of his marriage—there is not only no mention of him in connection with this position in any of the official lists, but the post is known to have been held by others at this time—by William Treasurer and Edmond Schetz. It may here be remarked that certain holders of the official position cannot with accuracy be described as organ builders: they gave the work out to capable

builders for whom they themselves were responsible. Schetz may have been such an official, but if he ever employed Thomas Dallam to do his work for him it must surely have been considerably later than 1573. My own opinion is that the Canterbury repairs of 1573 were done by Treasurer, and that the organ which was erected there in, or shortly after, 1564, was the work of either Beton or Treasurer.*

The authorities at Gloucester wished to have a new organ in 1617 but they do not seem to have obtained it till 1640. As I have shown before, it is exceedingly improbable that Thomas could have built the organ of 1640: since this instrument was built by a Dallam it can assuredly be ascribed to Robert.

Of the six above-mentioned instruments, only the first two now remain—the Hatfield organ, almost intact, and the exquisite case of the instrument at King's College Chapel Cambridge. The Worcester organ, which was taken down in 1644,† seems to have been set up again at the Restoration. When a new instrument was built by Thomas and Renatus Harris, in 1666, the old organ was repaired and removed to another part of the church. Here it remained till 1715 when, as recorded in a chapter minute of April 15 of that year, it had got into a state of shameful neglect.‡ This is the last reference to it known to me.

It only remains to be said that Thomas Dallam's three sons, Robert, Ralph and George, and two other members of a younger generation, John and Touissaints, all followed the same calling. Robert is mentioned below. The others belong to a later period.

126. STEPHEN BRETTON, OF NORWICH.

Bretton was another East Anglian organ-builder. In 1598, on "The xjth of September, Mr. Carleton [Vicar of the Church of S. Stephen, Norwich] had for Stephan Bretton, an organmaker, xxxs."§ He may probably be identified with the Stephen Britaine who, in 1615 and again in 1621, was employed in repairing the organ at Trinity College, Cambridge.|| [See No. 135.]

127. EDMUND HOOPER.

Hooper is supposed to have been the first regularly appointed organist of Westminster Abbey. Born at North Halberton, Devon, he came to London and obtained the positions of Master of the Choristers at the Abbey in 1588 and Organist in 1606. He is also said to have been a Gentleman and Organist of the Chapel Royal. In addition to his work as a composer of Church Music he found occasional employment in "pricking new song-books" and repairing the Abbey organs.¶

In his capacity as organ-mender, Sir Frederick Bridge tell us ** that in 1603 there were payments to him "for the mending the bellows and organs, with tunings of them, and for 4 pairs of hingells [hinges] for the bellows, also for a shooting-plate for the organ loft door." He died July 14, 1621, and was buried in the Abbey Cloisters.

128. WILLIAM MAYE.

Maye is included in this list on account of certain repairs he effected in the organ at Hartland Parish Church, but the extracts which follow †† show that

he was a carpenter and amateur musician rather than an organ-builder in the strict sense of the word.

1605-6 "Paid to William Maye for amending the billowes and certaine pipes of the organs, xij*d*.

Given to Mr. Maye's sonnes for their attendance in singing in the church, xij*d*."

1624-5 "Paid to William Maye for setting up of the King's name in the pulpit and for mending the north church doore, ijs. vj*d*."

It is interesting to notice that a few years later John Loosemore [see No. 154 below] did work in this church on several occasions, not all of it being in connection with the organ.

129. GEORGE PENDLETON.

Pendleton was another builder who effected repairs in the instrument at Westminster Abbey. Sir Frederick Bridge mentions two items from his account for 1605:—

"For 4 pounds of tynne to foot ye great bass pipe.

To a porter to help carry the pipe to my house and back again after it was new footed."

The second of these two items seems to suggest that Pendleton lived at no great distance from the Abbey, otherwise it would surely have been more convenient for him to have brought his tools to the church.

On March 20, 1605, Pendleton was paid xs. "for removing and tuning the Instrument against the funerall of the King's daughter"—in all probability the child of James I. who lies buried in the north aisle of Henry VIIIth's Chapel.*

130. ANDREA BASSANO.

131. ROBERT HENLAKE.

132. EDWARD NORGATE.

I have placed these three names together to save repetition and, possibly, confusion. We find in the Audit Office, Declared Accounts, Bundle 37, No. 40, that Bassano and Henlake were appointed makers, repairers and tuners to the court in 1603, "at 30*li* a year, due for $\frac{1}{2}$ year ending Mich. 1603, by letters patent dated 27 June, 1 James."† Their predecessor in the office had been Edmond Schetz.

These two continued to hold the office jointly until 1609-10, after which year Henlake's name disappears and Bassano draws the full salary of 60*l*. per annum.‡

On November 25, 1611 there was a "Grant, with survivorship to And. Bassano and Edw. Norgate, of the office of Tuner of his Majesty's virginalls, organs and other instruments," (James I., Sign Man., Vol. I., No. 105) but Norgate does not appear to have enjoyed the emoluments of the office, nor is his name included in the Declared Accounts, until the death of Bassano in 1626. The Audit office accounts for this year (Bundle 392, No. 65) speak of Norgate "succeeding the said Andrea Bassano (by letters patent 30 Dec. 9 James I.) the first payment to begin from the death of the said Andrea Bassano.§ Norgate held the office throughout the reign of Charles I. He died at the Herald's College in 1650, and was buried in S. Benet's, Paul's Wharf. Nicholas Felton, Bishop of Ely, was his step-father.

I am not in a position to say whether Bassano and Henlake were organ-builders in the strict sense of the word, as up to the present few, if any, records of work done by them, or under their supervision, have come to light. Of Norgate much is known, so that we are safe in saying that he was a court official and not a builder. Consequently, it will not be in accordance with our

present plan to refer to the many documents which tell of work done under his superintendence, even though the records are themselves interesting.

Fuller says that Norgate was "the best illuminer and linner of his age. . . . He was an excellent herald, and, which was the crown of all, a right honest man."

His son, Arthur, was granted a patent as "Master of the organs and virginalls" on June 9, 1660, but retained the place for only a few weeks. His successor was John Hingeston.*

133. JOHN YORKE.

The earliest mention of this builder yet met with is in 1610, when he is paid *xlii.* for making "a newe chaire orgaine" for Hugh Rose's instrument at Trinity College Cambridge.†

A few years later he is at work on the organs at Magdalen College Chapel in the sister University. Here he receives 2s. 6d. for repairs in 1616, 10s. in 1617 and 8s. in 1622. In 1634 he is paid 2s. for tuning the organ and a like amount in 1635, while in 1638, 1639, 1640 and 1641 he receives payment for repairing certain musical instruments which were then in use in the chapel. In 1637 he shares 2*li.* 7s. 6d. with Dallam (in all probability Robert, *q.v.*) which seems to suggest a combination of the two builders at this time, or at least upon this occasion.

134. THOMAS HAMLYN.

In July 1613 Hamlyn received 60*l.* "for enlarging with three sets of pipes the new organ at S. James's, and for making the same one note deeper."‡ The presumption is that the organ above referred to was in the Chapel Royal.

135. STEPHEN BRITTAINE.

Some work was done to the organ in Trinity College, Cambridge by Brittain in 1615 and in 1621.

See above under Stephen Bretton, [No. 126].

136. WILLIAM WARD.

In the "Old Cheque Book" of the Chapel Royal, we find that on November 5th, 1615, "William Ward . . . was sworne Groome of His Majestes Vestery Extraordinaire for the tuning and mendinge of His Majestes Organes when he shalbe thereunto required by those that have the charge thereof: And it is a parcel of his othe . . . not to sue or claime any place to attend in his Majestes sayd Chappell or Vestrie, otherwise then for the service above expressed. . . ."§

Here, then, we find a capable man appointed to do work which was apparently beyond the powers of Bassano and Norgate.

In all probability this person may be identified with the Ward who was employed to repair the organ at Rochester Cathedral in 1631.||

137. GIBBS, OF ST. PAUL'S CHURCHYARD.

Alley, the founder of Dulwich College, records in his Diary that on April 27, 1618, he "bought a p: orgaines for ye chapell off mr. gibbs of powles, 08.02.0." and "water to feche them & feeld yt Helpte to carie them 00.02.03." It is said that a portion of the case of this organ is still preserved in the Chaplain's house,¶ but I was told by the late Chaplain that this is quite conjectural, the remains (if such they are) being merely some old wood worked up into the form of a piece of furniture. Gibbs may have been only a music and musical instrument dealer, in which case the instrument in question may have been the work of the builder mentioned next below.

138. JOHN BURWARD, BURRARD, OR BURRETT.

This person seems to have had rather a good reputation, for though only four organs can be coupled with his name, either as repairer or maker, they are for important clients and some distance apart.

1.—DULWICH COLLEGE CHAPEL, 1618–20.

On May 27, 1618, Alleyn records that he “pd Mr. burward for tuning ye orgains 00.02.06.” This was for the organ in Dulwich College Chapel which Alleyn had bought one month earlier. In the following year he paid 5*l.* 10*s.* “to Mr. burett for a dyapason stop to my organe & other allteracons.” On May 13, 1620 we find another entry in Alleyn’s diary :—“pd. mr. burett for mending ye bellows & tuning ye orgaine & making ye Conveighaunce for ye starrs turning.”* This seems to mean that the stars were set in motion by the action of the bellows.

2.—LONDON—WESTMINSTER ABBEY, *c.* 1625.

The following is a transcript of a bill † for work done here *c.* 1625 :—

It for metle to lyne on[e] of the great pips	vs.

The bill is endorsed :—

Mr. Ierland I know this bill to be very resonable for I have alredy cut him off ten shillings therefore I pray despathe him for he hath delt honestly wth ye Church Soe shall I rest yr serfant

3.—CHIRK CASTLE CHAPEL, 1631–2.

The full text of “Articles of agreement Indented concluded and agreed upon the last daie of februarie 1631 Betweene John Burward of London Organ maker of the one partie And Sir Thomas Middleton of Chirke Castle in the Countie of Denbigh Knight of the other partie” will be found in the report of a paper by Dr. Hopkins in the *Archæological Journal* for 1894, pp. 125–8. In this agreement, Burward, “in consideration of the somme of one hundred and fiftie poundes of lawfull money of England,” undertakes that he will “trulie and sufficientlie make furnish and fynish for the said Sir Thomas Middleton one good and perfect Organ of such proporcion trynning and scantling as is hereafter mencioned. That is to say The case of the said Organ to be in height twelve foote and a halfe In breadth nyne foote and in thicknes sixe foote and a halfe having nyne Towers vizt att each end one round Tower One square Tower in the middle one half round on each side of the said square Tower and fower flatt Towers according to a modell or draught now shewed forth by the said John Burward ‡ . . . with decent and fitting carved worke pendentes fynishinges guildinges and payntinges and all other thinges fitting for the same.

Item the said John Burward is to place within the case of the foresaid Organ two settes of keyes and two sound boordes and tenne stoppes all of good metall pipes namelie to the upper sett of keyes to be fitted, one stopt diapason, one open diapason from gamut upwards one principall for the fore front paynted, and guilded workmanlike, and inwardlie a Recorder, a small principall, a fifteenth and a two and twentieth : for the lower sett of

keyes, three more of metall, one diapason, a principall and a small principall, and that the said Organ shall have three bellows with two sound boordes conveyances, Conduittes Ironworke and all other thinges fitting for such an Organ well and workmanlike wrought and performed. . . ."

The organ was to be finished by the "feast of the nativite of our Lord commonly called Christmas" 1631, and to be paid for in instalments of £40, £30, and £80. John Burward acknowledges the receipt of the last named amount, together with an additional £10 (making £160 in all) on 31st Jan. 1632.

It is unfortunate that the design for the case has not been preserved for the organ has long since perished—probably during the Civil War, for both sides successively held the castle.

4.—ROCHESTER CATHEDRAL.

In 1637 the sum of £2 was paid "to Mr. Burward, the organ maker, his fee." *

139. EMANUEL CRASWELL.

The Town Council of Ludlow meant well by the organ in the magnificent church of their town though the resolution passed by them at their meeting on February 19th, 1619 is not a model of lucidity.—"It is at this day ordered that where the great paire of organs wth in the p'ish Church of this towne are now much decaied that the Churchwardens & sidesmen doe send for an experienced & skilfull man for that purpose and to cause the same organs to be well amended at the charge of this towne and upon Knowledge of the Charge that shall arise for the doing thereof a seessment to be made accordingly."

The sequel is found in the Churchwardens' Accounts for 1620-1.—

"Item payd to Emannell Craswell for mending the great organs by the appoyntement of Mr. Walter Langford and Mr. Tho. Edwards then Baylieffis, viij li."

A further sum of vs. was handed over to Craswell the same year.

Evidence of the increased care taken of the newly-repaired organ is afforded by two other items from the accounts of the same year. These record the expenditure of lijs. vjd. on "one doore made newe to the organ Loft and a locke and key for the same" and of xijs. xd. "for dornecks [a kind of linen] to make the Curten of the great organs."

It has already been pointed out that it was a usual thing at this period to cover up the organ with a curtain or cloth when it was not in use.

140. HAMDEN.

This builder received 15s. in 1622 "for mending ye orgaynes" at Dulwich College Chapel, and for "making 3 or 4 newe pipes for a dyapason." †

141. JOHN RAPER.

In 1622 the Archbishop of York, writing to his "very loving friends, the mayor and aldermen of Kingston-upon-Hull," recommended that an organ should be erected, and that the work should be entrusted to one John Raper, who "being a man of known quality and skill in the making of musical instruments, and well approved of for his honest performance in matters which he undertaketh, is authorised and hath a grant from me under my hand and episcopal seal to make and repair organs in all churches within my diocese where in former times they have been used." ‡

The organ in this particular church (Holy Trinity, Hull) did not materialise owing to the lack of response to an appeal for subscriptions.

142. MARMADUKE PARDOE.

All that can be said of Pardoe is that he was paid 1s. 6d. in 1624-5 "for mending the organs" in Ludlow Church.

143. THOMAS CRADOCK.

In searching amongst the Domestic State Papers in the Public Record Office I came across the following notice of this builder, dated May 8th, 1626 :—

"A fee of 20*li.* by ye yeare, graunted to Thomas Cradock his Ma[jestijes organ maker, during his life, for the oversight, and tuning his maes organs at St. James', and in the privy lodgings at Whitehall. Subscr. by order from the Lord Chambelaine, procured ut supra." *

Cradock's successor in the office of "organ maker" was James Farre, who was appointed in 1660.†

144. BISHOP.

145. BULL.

Both these persons were employed on the organs at Magdalen College, Oxford—Bishop repairing the bellows in 1628 and the organ generally in 1642, while Bull, in 1633, received £2 for tuning.

146. ADAM TOCLESSE.

Dr. Rimbault says that one Adam Fortess built an organ for S. George's Chapel, Windsor, in 1635 at a cost of £140,‡ but I have shown § (I think, conclusively) that Fortess is a misreading of Toclesse, that the date was 1628, that the organ was placed in the King's Private Chapel (which is also dedicated to S. George), and, finally, that Adam Toclesse was in all likelihood an official entrusted with the selection of the builder and the supervision of the erection of the instrument, he himself not being an organ-builder at all.

147. SMYTH.

The sum of xxvs. was paid by the Churchwardens of Ludlow Parish Church in 1630–1 "To Mr. Smyth for his Paynes and others to helpe him in setting the organs in Tune." Smyth may have lived at Hereford, for a messenger was paid 3*s.* 6*d.* "to goe twise to hereford about the Repayringe of the organs in 1632–33, in which year 3*li.* was "pd. Mr. Smyth for his workmanship and materials in repayringe" the same. A tuning contract was drawn up between Smyth and the Church authorities. In 1635–6 xls. was "paid Mr. Smith for Repayringe the organs."

148. J. BURTE.

The Churchwardens of S. Edmund's, Salisbury, had their instrument thoroughly overhauled by this builder in 1633–4 since they paid him £10 "in full of his Byll for repayreng the organs." The work was done under the supervision of "Mr. Tocker of the Close who received £3 6*s.* 8*d.* "in full for his paynes aboute the Organs." An item of 2*s.* 6*d.* for "three keyes, newe locke, & mendinge of two lockes for ye Organs" at this time is suggestive of more care in the future than in the past.

Can "J. Burte" be the Salisbury scribe's rendering of John Burward, whose name is also written Burrad and Burrett? [See No. 138 above].

149. ROBERT DALLAM.

From the inscription on this builder's tomb-stone "of white free-stone, laying before the west door leading into the Chapel" at New College, Oxford, we learn that he was the son of Thomas Dallam, of Dallam in the County of Lancaster, and that he died on May 31, 1665 in the 63rd year of his age.|| We gather, therefore, that he was born on or between June 1, 1602 and May

31, 1603, and we shall not be very far wrong in assuming that he was the eldest son of his father, since, by his own confession, Thomas was not married until his return to England, in 1600, after his mission to Turkey.

According to the Dictionary of National Biography, Robert built an organ for Durham Cathedral between 1624 and 1627, which instrument "remained there till 1687, when Father Smith, after putting in four new stops, sold the chaire organ for 100*l.* to St. Michael le Belfry's, York, where it remained till 1885." There are several inaccuracies here. To begin with, the organ at Durham was built in 1621,* so that if it were built by one of the Dallams it must have been the handiwork of Thomas—I have already given reasons (which I admit are not quite conclusive) for believing that Robert did not start on his own account till *circa* 1630—while we are distinctly told that "on Midsummer Day of that year, [1641] and not till then, did they [the Scots] use any violence or harm to the organs in this church; but then they fell on and broke them, and tore up all the keys of the great organs. . . . But to prevent further mischief to the organs, the General of the Scotch army advised Mr. Blades (steward to Dean Balcanquhall) to take the pipes out; and at night they did so in order to save them. But afterwards the said two cases—to wit, that of the white organ (on the South side of the church) and that of the great organ (over the quire doors) being standing in the church the 11th September 1650, the Scotch prisoners to the number of about 4,500 taken at the fight of Dunbar, being brought into Durham and put into the Cathedral, which was now made a prison to keep them in, they, the said prisoners, did burn all the said two cases, and all the seats and wainscott, and all the wood they could find in the said Cathedral church aforesaid."† Robert may have built the "pair of little organs that cost towards 80 pound, that came from London" in 1661,‡ but it was his brother George who built the new "fare double organ," part of which was sold by Father Smith to the Popish Chapel at York, whence, some time before 1733, it had found its way to the church of S. Michael le Belfry in the same city.§ Some of the pipes of 1621 might have been used up by George Dallam in 1662, that is all.

I have dwelt somewhat at length on this organ because it is of general interest to clear up doubtful points such as this in connection with historic organs and their reputed builders.

This brings us to organs actually made or repaired by Robert :—

1.—YORK MINSTER. 1632–4.

Articles of agreement || were "indented, made, concluded, and agreed upon, the one and twentieth day of March, anno dmi 1632" between the Dean and principal officers of the cathedral church of the one party, and Robert Dallam, "citizen and blacksmith, of London" of the other. By these Dallam undertook to complete the organ according to the subjoined specification "before the feast of the nativitie of Saint John Baptist," 1634, the cost to be £297 with £5 more for his journey to York :—

"The names and number of the stoppes or setts of pipes for the said great organ, to be new made; every stoppe containeing fiftie one pipes; the said great organ containing eight stoppes.

It will be noticed that there were nine, not eight, stops on the Great. The "small principall" on both manuals was of 2ft. pitch, and (judging from the prices quoted) the Diapason on the Chaire was a stopped one, and the Flute of 4ft. pitch.

This organ was placed on the north side of the quire, which position it occupied when heard by Mace, who was shut up in the city during the siege of 1644. He speaks of it as "a most excellent-large-plump-lusty-full-speaking-organ."

One of the instruments that was fortunate enough to escape destruction during the Puritan *régime*, it yet came to a violent end, being burnt during the night of Feb. 1, 1829, by Jonathan Martin, a lunatic. At the time of its destruction the instrument occupied a position on the screen, where it had been placed in 1690.

2.—OXFORD—MAGDALEN COLLEGE CHAPEL, 1632–61.

I have already given reasons for assuming that the repairs executed by Dallam subsequent to 1630 were done by Robert. We find he was paid 2*l.* 13*s.* for tuning the organ in 1632 while in 1637 2*l.* 7*s.* 6*d.* was paid to Dallam and Yorke for repairs. [See John Yorke, No. 133].

It was probably Robert who received 25*l.* for repairing one of the organs in the chapel in 1661, but the entries for 1664 and 1665 must refer to one of his brothers, since Robert was then dead.

3.—CAMBRIDGE—JESUS COLLEGE CHAPEL, 1634–8.

This organ cost 200*l.*, and was built in 1634. "In the agreement . . . he is called 'Robert Dallam of Westminster.' In 1635 he added pedals to this organ for 12*l.*, and in 1638 was paid 5*s.* for tuning it. It was taken down in 1642–3, but again set up at the Restoration, and was either replaced by a new one or eventually restored beyond recognition by Renatus Harris in 1688. The remains of this organ were given to Old All Saints Church, Cambridge, in 1790."

I have nothing to add to the above, which is from Mr. Barclay Squire's account of this builder in the Dictionary of National Biography, except to say that when the *Old Church* of All Saints was destroyed about the year 1864, and the new one built, this interesting relic with its folding wings or shutters was done away with. The mention of pedals is of course most remarkable. I cannot help thinking that the pedals were used to work "shifting movements"—the earliest attempt at solving difficulties of stop control.*

4.—CAMBRIDGE—S. JOHN'S COLLEGE CHAPEL, 1635–8.

As I have written at some length on the instruments that have been housed in the former and present chapels of this foundation,* I will content myself by saying that this one, according to the agreement of July 28, 1635, was to cost 185*l.*, to be completed before July 1, 1636, and "to conteyne six senerall stoppes of pipes euery stoppe conteyning fortynine pipes," as follow :—

"One diapason most part to stand in sight,
One Principall, of Tynne,
One Recorder of Wood,
One small Principall of Tynne [Fifteenth]
One two and twentieth of Tynne."

If there were actually six stops (the names of five only are given) the other one was, in all probability, a Stopped diapason.

Robert tuned and repaired this organ in 1636 and 1638. It was preserved through the Commonwealth by being taken down. A few of Dallam's pipes are said to be still in the present instrument, while the beautiful and stately case now adorns the Church of S. Mark, Old Bilton, near Rugby.

5.—LONDON—LAMBETH PALACE CHAPEL, 1635.

The following is Robert Dallam's Bill for "Work Done for my lord's Grace of Canterbury for his Orgayne in his Chapell at Lambeth"—which I found in the Public Record Office (S.P.Dom : Car.I. Vol. 301, No. 68) and which I do not remember to have seen in print before.

6.—CANTERBURY CATHEDRAL, 1635.

Mr. W. Barclay Squire, in Grove's Dictionary (Vol. I. p. 654), says that Robert Dallam built an organ for Canterbury Cathedral, but gives no authority for the statement.

7.—LICHFIELD CATHEDRAL. 1636.

A new organ was built in 1636 by "Robert Dallam, of Covent Garden and cittie of Westminster." The agreement stated that every stop was to consist of 51 pipes, and that the cost was to be 315*l.*†

This instrument was destroyed by the Puritans, its value being then estimated at £200.

8.—CAMBRIDGE—TRINITY COLLEGE CHAPEL, 1637.

Here again, in spite of the absence of the Christian name, there is no doubt that Robert Dallam is meant in the only reference to repairs by any builder of this name yet found in the College Accounts‡ :—

"26 July 1637. Agreed that Mr. Greeneberry and Mr. Knuckle shall have for the paynting and guilding of the Organ 50*li.*

Item that Mr. Hallam [Dallam] shall have for the mending and the tuning of the organ xx*li.*"

9.—CAMBRIDGE—KING'S COLLEGE CHAPEL. 1638–41.

Repairs to T. Dallam's organ in 1638, costing 28*l.* The name occurs for the last time in the College accounts in 1641. No Christian name is given.§

10.—GLOUCESTER CATHEDRAL, 1640-1.

An entry in the account books of 1640 records the payment of 6s. "for a messenger to Worcester severall tymes to Tomkins about the agreem't with Dallam for the new organ," and in the following year 2s. was paid "to Dallam's man for blowing the bellows of the new organ att the assizes and other tymes," and 2l. 8s. was expended on "entertainment of Mr. Tomkins of Worcester when hee came to approve the new organ."*

The organ seems to have been saved from destruction during the Great Rebellion, it having been purchased by Yate, Sheriff of Gloucester, from whom it was bought back for 80l. at the Restoration. It was soon superseded, however, being sold to Mr. Deane, organist of Bristol Cathedral, for 65l., in 1663. At Bristol it did duty for about another 20 years.†

It is almost certain that the case, or at least a part of it did not go to Bristol, but remained to form the still-existing choir-case. Mr. Hill says that this very beautiful feature of the noble organ front at Gloucester is of earlier date than the rest, it having been made in 1579.‡ If this is so Dallam must have used it up in his organ of 1640-1.

11.—OXFORD—NEW COLLEGE CHAPEL. 1663.

This organ was finished in 1663. The cost was to have been £350, but this was increased to £420 to cover the additional expense of Trumpet and Cornet stops. It was placed on the screen and the case was made to "open in the midst to let in more light from the Western window." Some of Dallam's original pipe-work is still to be found in the organ of to-day.§

12.—OXFORD—MUSIC SCHOOL.

Rimbault ascribes this organ to Robert Dallam,|| while Sir John Sutton (giving Anthony a Wood as his authority) says it was the work of Robert's brother, Ralph.¶ In Wood's time this organ contained four stops: in Sir John Sutton's (c 1847) it contained six. Miss Rachael Poole says the organ was sold in 1884 and after changing owners once or twice was bought by Mr. Broadley of "The Knapp," Bridport, in whose possession it still remains.**

13.—LONDON—S. MARY WOOLNOTH.

Ascribed to Robert Dallam on the authority of the Dictionary of National Biography [no date given]. "It was so much injured by the Fire of London that in 1681 it was replaced by a new instrument by Father Smith, who, however, used some of Dallam's stops."

14.—LONDON—OLD S. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL.

Dr. Rimbault says—"According to Saunderson's M.S. collections for a history of Durham, Robert Dallam built organs for the Cathedrals of St. Paul and Durham.†† These instruments were similar to that at York." I think this is nothing more than a misreading (either by Saunderson or by Rimbault) of the following passage from "The Rites of Durham," circa 1593. Speaking of the Durham organs of that date the writer says—"there was but 2 paire more of them in all England of the same making, one paire in Yorke and another in Paules."‡‡

150. HEYWOOD, OR HAYWARD.

151. ROBERT HAYWARD, OR HAYWOOD.

Here again it is difficult to apportion the five instruments to these two

makers (for I feel sure there were two because of the long interval—over fifty years—which separates the first recorded work from the last).

It is quite probable that they were father and son, respectively, and that the elder worked as late as 1664.

Here are their organs :—

1.—COVENTRY—HOLY TRINITY CHURCH. 1632.

The City MS. Annals record that an organ was set up in this Church in 1632, and as Heywood was paid xjs. vjd. for mending it in that year it is quite possible that he supplied it.

In accordance with a resolution of the vestry this organ was taken down in 1641, and, in 1642, was sold to Sir Henry Willoughby.

2.—SALISBURY—S. MARTIN'S CHURCH. 1637.

From the Churchwardens' Accounts :—

" 1637 Paid Mr. Hayward for mending the Orginns, 10s." *

3.—SOMERTON CHURCH (SOMERSET).

1641. " Itm. to Mr. Squier for amending the draughts [bellows] of the organe, 1s. 7d.

" Itm. to Mr. Hayward of Bath for making the organe musicall, £1 10s. 0d." †

4.—WIMBORNE MINSTER, 1664 and 1670.

From the Churchwardens' Accounts ‡ :—

1665 " William Frampton and John Ansty, Churchwardens, did with the assistance of the parish Anno Car. II. xvii, erect and set up by Robert Hayward of the City of Bath orginmaster, a payre of organs in the Church, by indenture dated September 10th, 1664."

This organ cost 180*l*. When it was finished it was examined and approved by Mr. Tompkins and Mr. Silver, who came over from Salisbury for that purpose, and received 5*l*. for their trouble.

In 1670 Hayward executed a few repairs.

Parts of this organ are, I believe, incorporated in the instrument in use at this day.

5.—COVENTRY—HOLY TRINITY CHURCH, 1684.

The sum of 120*l*. 16s. was collected towards the cost of a new organ in this church in 1684, of which amount 42*l*. 16s. was given by the Parishioners, 20*l*. by the Corporation, and 58*l*. by the Sheriffs "for several fines received by them, upon convictions of Conventicles, being the King's & informers parts."

Of this sum 100*l*. (less 2*l*. deducted for tuning and mending which was done by another person) was "paid to Mr. Robert Haywood, of the Citie of Bath, Alderman, for the Organ he set up in the Chancell," while 17*l*. 10s. was paid to Thomas Holtham "for gildeing & painting the organ."

This instrument remained in use till 1732 when Thomas Schwarbrick took it in part payment of the new organ which he constructed and set up in its place.

152. EDWARD STANLEY.

Stanley was not an organ-builder but an organist who made a "composition" with the Churchwardens of Ludlow Parish Church "that hee shall keepe the organs in Repayre for the somme of five shillings yeaerley to be payd upon St. peeters day for which Edward Stanley hath sealed a bonde of xxli., and articles of agreement bearing date the xxvjth day of June in the eighth Yeare of Kinge Charles." This would be in 1632.

153. SAMUEL LOOSEMORE.

154. JOHN LOOSEMORE.

Very little is known of Samuel Loosemore except that he was paid 15*l*. for

repairing the organ in Hartland Church in 1633-4. He seems to have lived at Bishops Nympton where John, who was in all probability his son, was born in 1613-14, and where some of their descendants reside and own property to this day.

As Bishops Nympton is so close to South Molton it is extremely likely that Samuel learnt his business from John Chappington, and even that he succeeded to the business on Chappington's death in 1606—especially when we remember that the latter held his surviving brother Ralph in poor repute—he "shall not have to doe with any goods I haue for he is very troublesome."

The Loosemores were a well known Devonshire family. In the Calendar of Domestic State Papers we find mention of a certain John Loosemore, mariner, of Tiverton in Devon, who returned from Vigo, in Spain, with important information about Spanish garrisons, ships, etc. Sir Matthew Arundel and Sir Ralph Horsey provided him with a letter of introduction to Secretary Cecil, and allowed him "licence to take horse, and other necessaries for effecting a speedy journey" from Poole to London. The statement which he made in London is "signed with the mark of the declarator, which he says is very well known in Devonshire." This was in Jan. 1597.

An earlier "John Lousemore" was paid *vijd.* in 1552 "for ye mending of ye pulpyt" of Morebath Church, Devon, and, four years later, *vijid.* "for mending of ye bell."

To return to John Loosemore the organ-builder. It will be seen below that he did other work besides organ-building when he was a young man. At least he did other work in Hartland Church, and while employed there was also paid for services rendered in playing the organ. A pair of virginals enclosed in an oak case, painted in oils on the inside, and signed "John Loosemore fecit 1655," now preserved in the Victoria and Albert Museum at South Kensington, testifies to his skill in yet another direction.

According to a lease preserved at Exeter and dated 1660 "John Loosemore, of Exeter, organ-maker" was at that time living in a house "lately erected upon part of the Cloysters in the Close."

Another document, dated 1674, is sufficiently interesting to be quoted at greater length. It is an Agreement between John Loosemore, of Exeter, organ-maker, and John Shearne, of the same, organ-maker, in consideration of the marriage to be had between the sd J. S. and Joane L., the daughter of the said J. L., that the said J. L. hereby sets over, etc., to the sd. J. S. "the tenement wherein he now lives excepting one lodging-room, and also yt part which is in ye possn. of William Bearde, tailor," and the sd. J. L. further promises to the sd. J. S. "that he shall have the use of all his working benches, and all ye tools that belong to ye sd. trade." *

Loosemore would be just over 60 at this time. He lived six or seven years after his retirement from active work, dying, as his epitaph in Exeter Cathedral records, on April 18th, 1681, in the 68th year of his age. (This would place the day of his birth somewhere between April 19, 1613 and April 18, 1614).

When he was engaged to build the new organ in Exeter Cathedral he made a special journey into Cornwall "to make choice of Tyn," and another to Salisbury "to see the organ there, the better to inform himself to make the new organ in this Church." †

The organs made and repaired by John Loosemore included the following :—
1.—HARTLAND CHURCH, NORTH DEVON.

1635-6 Paid John Loosemore for his fee to keepe the Organs, 00.05.00.
(The same amount was paid him for a similar service in the following year.)

1637-8 Pd. John Loosemore for setting of ye organs upon
ye roudeloft 04.00.00.

The other work which he did for this church included "setting upp 6 sentences in the Church & on ye porches & for playing ye organs." For this he

was paid £1 in 1634-5, in addition to £2 5s. "for worke about ye pulpit & Mr. Churton's seate."

The following year he received 5s. "for a diall for ye Church." *

2.—BLAIR ATHOLL CASTLE, N.B., 1650.

This instrument is illustrated and described in the Rev. F. W. Galpin's "Old English Instruments." The pipes are all of wood, the compass four octaves (short), and the stops (which draw in halves) as follow:—

Stop Diapason, Principal, Twelfth, Fifteenth, Trumpet.

The sliders which control these stops project from the ends of the instrument: they are drawn by means of cords.

The ornamental part of the case-work has disappeared.

There are two bellows at the back: on them are painted the initials I. L., and the date 1650, from which and from the general appearance of the instrument, Mr. Galpin concludes that the maker was none other than John Loosemore.

3.—EXETER CATHEDRAL, 1660.

This was apparently a temporary organ. We read that on November 30, 1660 £5 was ordered to be paid to Loosemore "towards the making of a sett of pipes to ye organ which is to be used in this Church." In February following a further £5 was ordered to be paid to him "towards ye repairing of ye organs."

This instrument was taken down in May, 1665.†

4.—EXETER CATHEDRAL, 1665-6.

Here was a masterpiece of which any builder might be proud! Until 1823, when the organ at York Minster was provided with two Double Diapason (to FFFF, 24 feet) Loosemore's organ contained the largest pipes to be found anywhere in England.

These belonged to the Double Diapason on the Great, of which the longest pipe (GGG) was 20 feet 6 inches long. There was no treble to this stop: it consisted of fourteen pipes only, grouped in two separate towers at either side of the screen, right away from the main case of the organ. These towers were unfortunately done away with when the organ was rebuilt in 1875, but the rest of the fine old case was preserved.

The total cost, after deducting certain items for which Loosemore was paid, but which had nothing to do with the organ, was £677 7s. 10d.

The original specification as given in Grove's Dictionary was as follows:—

5.—SIR GEORGE TREVELYAN, NETTLECOMBE COURT, 1665.

This organ had eight stops (including a shaking stopp—which Mr. C. A. Edwards tells us affected only the lowest octave, it being confined to one stop which met the “trumpett”), and the price was 100*l*. Two gilt stars revolved in front of the case when the bellows were blown—a device we have met with before, at Dulwich College Chapel. [See under John Burward, No. 138].

I believe this organ is still in existence at Nettlecombe Court, though not now quite in its original condition, which was as follows:—

6.—EXETER CATHEDRAL—CHORISTERS' SINGING SCHOOL.

This organ has, or had (for I am unable to say whether it still exists) six stops:—

Open diapason, Stop diapason, Principal, Flute, Twelfth, Fifteenth.

All the pipes made of wood: the compass from CC (short octave) to C in alt.*

155. THOMAS COATS, OF STAMFORD.

This person was, in 1635, granted a pension of 40*s*. per annum “for repairing and keeping in order and tune the organs” in the Cathedral Church at Lincoln.†

156. ADAM FORTRESS 1635.

See Adam Toclesse, [No. 146].

157. BARROW.

In 1637 a Mr. Barrow repaired the organ at Winchester College Chapel for which service he was paid 80*l*. 12*s*. 6*d*. The organ was at the same time “beautified externally.”‡

158. HARRIS (GRANDFATHER OF RENATUS HARRIS).

This builder is frequently endowed with the Christian name of *Thomas*. This may have been his rightful name, but I am inclined to think its bestowal due to either a careless reading of certain documents or to mere guesswork. All that we really know of him is that he was the father of Thomas Harris and the grandfather of Renatus, and that in 1637 he received the sum of 40*l*. from Magdalen College, Oxford, “*pro ecclesia*,” “evidently,” adds Dr. Bloxam, “for the purchase of a new organ.” We may accept the testimony of Renatus which shows that his grandfather actually built this organ. (Renatus wanted to repair the organ in 1686 “because his grandfather made it first, and he was sufficiently known to be as skilful an artist as any in England”) but we can be quite sure that the organ was never built for 40*l*., if only by comparing the original specification with that at York, built in 1632, which cost £302 without the case.

The Magdalen instrument had the following stops:—

GREAT ORGAN (8 stops).

Two diapasons
Two principals
Two fifteenths
Two two-and-twentieths

CHOIR ORGAN (5 stops).

Stopped diapason
Two principals
Recorder
Fifteenth

My own belief is that if the instrument were built in 1637 it cost much more than the sum of £40 above mentioned. The probability is that the case of a former organ was used up. Judging from its style—it is one of the most

beautiful of the pre-Restoration survivals—it is much more likely to date from *c.* 1580 than 1637.

This was the organ which was removed to Hampton Court by Cromwell sometime between July 1654 and his death. In 1660 it was taken back to Oxford and again set up in the Chapel where it remained till 1637. In that year it was sold to the authorities of Tewkesbury Abbey Church where it can still be seen and heard.

The following is of interest in this connection * :—

27th Aug. 1660 Whereas Wee are informed that the Organs belonging
Whitehall. to Magdalen Colledge in Oxon are in your Custody.

These are to require you to deliver them to Mr.
Nathaneel Chyles for the use of the said Colledge. And for soe doeing this
shall be your sufficient Warrant.

Given at Whitehall this 27th of August, 1660.

To Mr. Richard Marriatt,
his Matys Housekeeper
at Hampton Court.

159. HENRY JENNINGS.

On Nov. 11, 1640–1, 2s. 5d. was paid " to Mr. Henry Jennings for mending the organs " at Jesus College, Cambridge.†

The same person received £2 in 1642–3 for taking down the organ at King's College Chapel, Cambridge. The name is here "*Magistro Genuynge*"—a disguise which is easily penetrated.

160. GEORGE LESLIE.

Leslie was a Scotchman who seems to have settled in France sometime during the first half of the 17th century. It is not known whether he practised his trade on this side of the Channel, indeed his only known work was the organ he built in 1640 for the Church of Saint-Godard, Rouen.‡

161. CHRISTIANUS SCHMIDT.

Speaking of Father Smith's two nephews, Christian and Gerard, Dr. Rimbault adds this footnote :—These two young men, in all probability, were the sons of *Christian Smith*, one of whose organs, with the date 1643, is in the possession of a gentleman at Norwich. All the pipes are of wood, and the date and name of the builder, *Christianus Schmidt* are inscribed in three places in different parts of the instrument. Query—did Christian accompany his brother to England ? " § The gentleman referred to was a Mr. Bray.|| Where is this instrument now ?

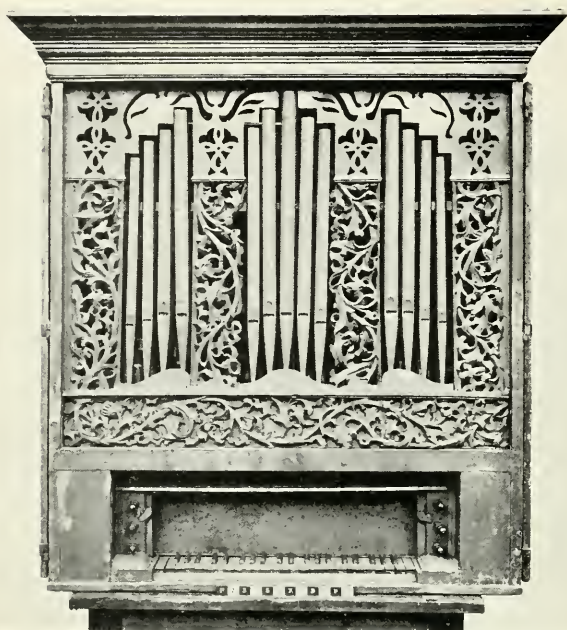

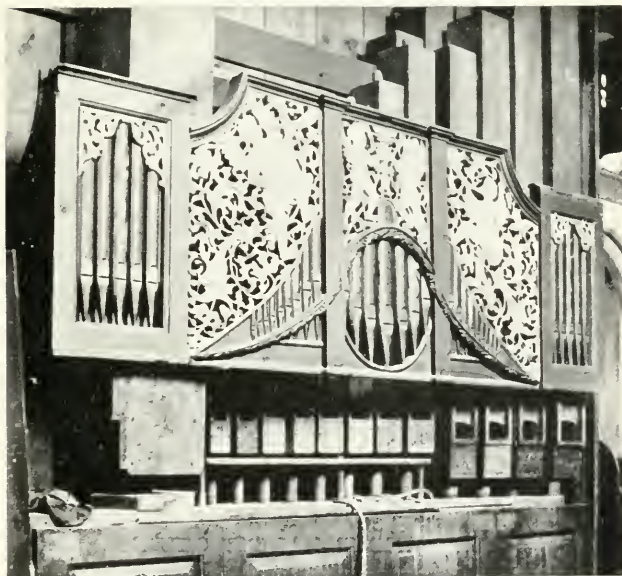
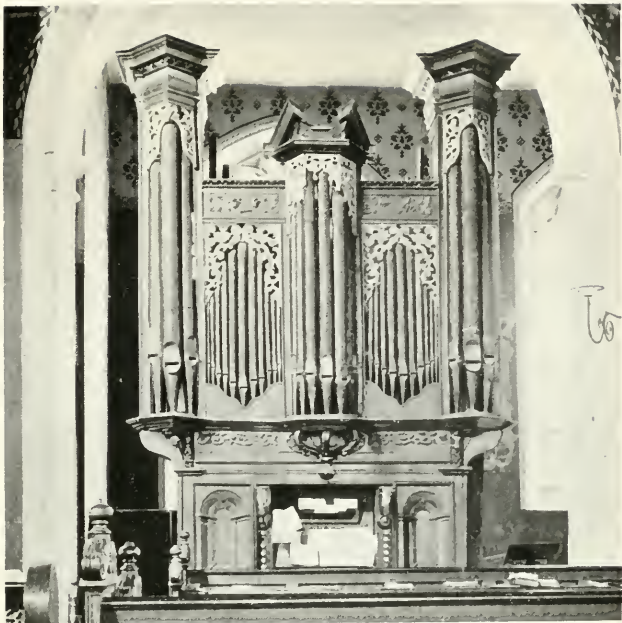
OLD RADNOR.

Repaired by Thamar in 1674, removed to Framlingham in 1707.

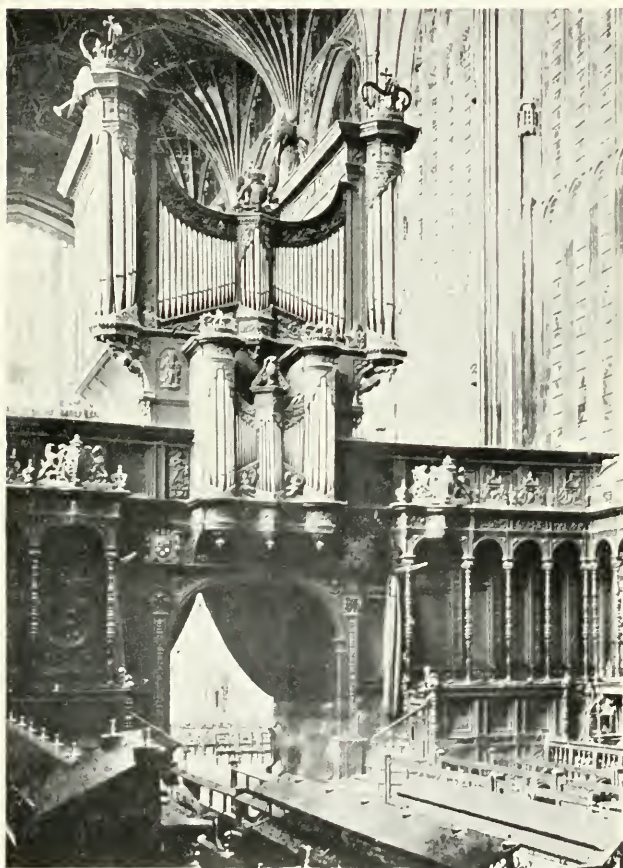
The lower view shows part of a previous organ in the Church. For some years it was used as a screen to the player but is now nailed on to the back of the organ

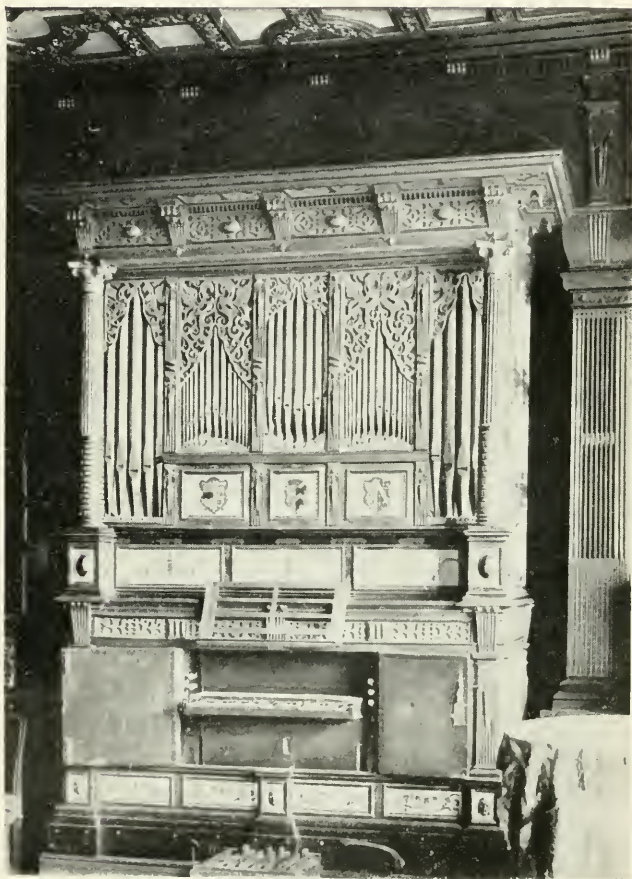

The Study of Church Music

Music is practically a necessity in all churches to-day. It is hardly possible to point to any religious sect which debars music from its service or ritual.

It is equally true that the directing musician is likewise a necessity in all churches, whether he be amateur or professional. One cannot imagine music without the musician. What then is the *function* of the music which is so much a necessity of church worship? Shall we be content with Plutarch's saying, that the Greeks required the assistance of music in order "to form and compose the minds of youth to what was decent, sober and virtuous," or that of Mr. Spencer defining music as the "comment of the emotion on the propositions of the intellect." Shall we not rather say that music holds its prominent place in the service of the church because it is a most powerful means of lifting the soul beyond the cares and snares of this life to the plane of the eternal? And if the divine art, as it has been truly named, is of such transcendent importance in the functions of the church, is it not worthy of serious study by those who make themselves its interpreters?

To these latter questions there can only be one unanimous yes. The necessity is self-evident. And yet how many of our Church Organists, who officiate in the various "persuasions" to which they are attached, have studied the rationale and historical development of the art as practised in the Church universal. No doubt the Organist of some primitive church, where hymns only are used, will question in his limited outlook, how the historical and critical study of church music can benefit *him*. To this query we can reply—First look at the authorship of the hymns you use. Beginning with the Eastern or Greek church (as the first organised development of Christianity), you have in your hymn book well known hymns translated from those in use in that church, you have also a contingent of hymns from the Latin from the fourth century downwards, hymns from the Bohemian forerunners of the Reformation, from the German Lutheran Church, and from both High and Low, from Roman, Anglican and Nonconformist writers in our own land. Our student organist may here avow that he is not specially interested in the *words* of the hymns he accompanies. Well! he certainly *ought* to be. How can he interpret well the spirit of these hymns unless he has a thorough grasp of every word and phrase and of the intention of the author. Shall we not say with George Herbert that

"The fineness which a hymn affords
Is when the soul unto the lines accords."

And if this reply is self-evident to any thoughtful reader, how much more is the *music* of those hymns which he accompanies of vital importance. For if the words of the hymns are garnered from every age, from every church and Christian persuasion on earth, the music in its origin is not less cosmopolitan and pan-evangelical. The tunes he plays range through old mediæval and wayward plain song, through ponderous German Lutheran Chorales, majestic old English psalm tunes, to the animated Wesleyan Revival and English Church part song tunes.

Each of these classes of tunes has its own style of rendering. It is obvious, therefore, if he is to interpret each tune in the best possible manner, that he must have some insight into the development and meaning of these different styles. How is he to attain this? Can he master it by visiting churches of various persuasions and listening to the efforts of those organists in charge? He may certainly thus acquire valuable experience. Unfortunately musical matters are not what they should be in many churches. In some, the books in use are not what they ought to be. As Archdeacon Gardner says, "In the Anglican Church, at present, our hymns and their music are often not edifying," and speaks of "their unreal expression of piety." In others, clergy with perverted ideals, insist on music or renderings which do not commend themselves to educated musicians, not that a high and dry attitude is necessary, for in this age undoubtedly, the people must come first. Except in cathedrals and most "Roman" churches the music in the main is, or should be suited for the comprehension, and especially for the participation of the people—who are the church. Clergy and church members sometimes speak of the *tyranny of the choir*. Possibly there is truth in this in some instances where enthusiasm on the part of those responsible for the music outruns discretion. In the Anthem the congregation can learn by listening—as they do, it is hoped, with the Sermon. Beyond that the query must always be. Can the congregation join in this? This again depends on the class or education of the congregation. How many congregations can join in the chanting of the psalms (from unpointed prayer books)? Probably not many. How many can join in the Te Deum setting by Smart, Hopkins or Jackson. Probably far more, though they won't take the trouble to acquire copies and, the churches do not generally, as yet, provide them.

It follows from the above that the student organist with ideals will not necessarily be rightly enlightened by visits to other churches, and he must perforce then turn to other sources. What are these sources? To answer this is the purpose of this article.

In the first place the Organist-Choirmaster is naturally, and above all, interested in *Choral* music. The music of the church is essentially *choral* and he should, therefore, turn to some general History of Choral Music. His best selection for this purpose would probably be Arthur Mees' *Choirs and Choral Music* (Murray 1901). From this he may learn how the Hebrew choirs—in whose musical resources lay the origin of Christian music—"chanted or sang antiphonally—while the multitude from time to time joined in refrains to the accompaniment of instruments, singers and players, moving about in the measured steps of a pantomimic dance." Little, indeed, is known about the chants used in the services of the Temple, but it has been shown that there is some resemblance between the inflections used for the cantillation of the Law and the Prophets and the earliest known Christian melodies. (See Mr. A. M. Friedlander's "Notes on Facts and Theories" etc., in *Musical Times*, January 1914, and a recent Lecture at King's College. See also D. A. de Sola's *The Ancient Melodies of the Spanish and Portuguese Jews*, London, 1857; and C. Engel's *The Music of the Most Ancient Nations*, London, 1864.) It is interesting to find that the Hebrew inscription to some fifty-seven of the Psalms reads "A Song to be sung to the orchestral accompaniment of the Temple," and if the student is led further into this byeway, he should refer to the chapter on the "Vocal Music of the Hebrews" in Stainers's *Music of the Bible*.

Meanwhile it is essential to study also the literary side of our Church services and perhaps the most readable and interesting account of this is to be found in Welsh and Edwards' *Romance of Psalter and Hymnal* (Hodder & Stoughton 1889), in which some ten chapters, ranging from "Songs of a Shepherd" to "Pilgrim Songs," describe the *Psalms*. The rest is taken up with classification of *Hymns* into Sermonic, Introspective, Sensuous etc., and further, into Early Christian Hymns, Hymns from the Cloisters, and so on down to modern times. The writer's articles on the "Hymnody of the Church," *Musical News*, 1918, are also available. As regards the *Psalms* alone,

there are many works, such as that by Perowne; but Murray's *Origin and Growth of the Psalms* (Scribner) is perhaps the most interesting.

Despite the conquest and dispersal of the Jews by the Romans, the music of the Temple still survived to some extent. It was found for instance in the monastic sect of Essene Jews and as described by Philo (20 B.C., A.D. 410), they used two choirs, one of men and one of women, singing "Hymns to the praise of God, composed in different kinds of metre and verse, now with one mouth, now with antiphonal hymns and harmonies." These antiphonal methods were introduced later on from the East, (i.e., from the Greek church—as the heir of Early Christian and Jewish worships), into the Church of Milan.

As the earliest liturgies were in Greek, probably *Greek Melodies* (from the Greek church) were also introduced, but they were unaccompanied, as the early Christian Fathers shunned Greek instrumental accompaniments as savouring of paganism. The Greek Church melodies were florid in style like the Hebrew cantillations and Alleluia flourishes or *pneumae* introduced into the Latin Church.

With the advent of Russia into the Great War of 1914–1919 interest in musical circles became centred to some extent in the *music of the Russian Church* as the principal branch of the Original Greek and Eastern Church. Judging by the series of Russian church compositions such as the 4 to 10 part Cherubim Songs, the 6 to 8 part motets in use and the accounts of their rendering in Russian Churches without instrumental accompaniments, but with the help of cavernous Russian basses (singing an octave below the ordinary bass part), the music of the Russian Church is as wonderful and up-to-date as that of the German State Lutheran Church is backward.

The *music of the Greek Church* in Russia until about the year 1700 A.D. was traditional in origin and neums were in use—the 5-line plain song notation not being introduced till later—but much may be learned from the following works.:

A. Pougin's "A Short History of Russian Music" (L. Howard) 1915; Rebour's "Traité de Psaltique"; Curwen's "Studies in Worship Music" Vol. II., p. 44; S. G. Hatherly's "Byzantine Music," London, 1892; H. J. W. Tillyard's "Greek Church Music" in *Musical Antiquary*, March 1911; and W. H. Freres' "Notes on Russian Church Music," in *Cathedral Quarterly*, Christmas, 1914. See also Stanley's *Lectures on the Eastern Church*, 1861.

No doubt the music of the original Eastern Church was primitive in both character and tonality. Though florid examples of medieval plain song are said to have been of Eastern origin, and that the Latin Church preferred terseness and conciseness, the Eastern origin is difficult to prove, and, of course, much of Latin so-called "Plain Song" is more florid than plain.

At various stages in the history of Church Music and in the various churches there have been *waves* of florid and overflowing complexity which have existed for a time till checked by the hand of the Reformer. The musician in his enthusiasm forgetful of other peoples' limitations will outrun the capacity and patience of his hearers, until reminded that Art must not be selfish. At the same time the man in the church must be educated to share and take part with the musician. *Educate*—educate—educate has been the cry of the ages in music, as it has been in other learning. One of the earliest attempts was the foundation of singing schools at Rome by Pope Sylvester in 314. Similar institutions were also in existence in the Greek Church during a similar period—and from thence for well over 1,000 years every monastery became a school of music and practically monopolised musical as well as general education.

In the services of the Primitive or Eastern Church it had been found necessary to have a settled order of proceeding in worship, and thus the earliest Liturgies arose. The *Council of Laodicea* (341–381) settled the priests' part by allowing only appointed singers to "sing from the book," and thus arose the organ of the "office" of the Church.

The Psalms had been the foundation of Hebrew worship, both for praise and for prayer, and as mentioned, were continued as such in the Early Christian Church. Doubtless the Hebrew tradition of the cantillations had suggested melodies for chants, and, as these were in the primitive and vague modes of the day, *Antiphons* were introduced, probably in the fourth century or earlier, in order to give the sense of finality otherwise lacking.

St. Ambrose seems to be the first enthusiast to have acted the part of Editor by collecting and classifying in the fourth century the "Tones" or Tunes which were already attached to the Psalms, and later in 604 A.D., St. Gregory is credited with further classification of the modes, as they were termed. Antiphonal Song was in use and was still further fostered by Leo the Great (440-461) in the school of Plain Song established by him in Rome. The further compilation of church melodies, according to Gevaert, was carried on by the Greek popes about 200 years later. The form of the mass and Antiphonarium was fixed by about 700. Its form was of slow growth as it gradually accumulated Introits, Graduals, Offertories, etc.

It is interesting to learn that in 790 A.D. two monks arrived from Rome at the Monastery of St. Gall, Switzerland, in possession of the Gregorian Antiphonary and that this M.S. is still in existence. The evidence of this MS., according to Mr. Mees, is "proof conclusive that the Gregorian chant as originally sung, was not plain." At the same time we must remember that the *florid* chant probably owes its origin to the lack of instrumental accompaniment, which was tabooed, not only in the Eastern Church, but in Italy also. The natural tendency of solo voice or instrument (as flute or violin) is towards floridity, and the monks who had only themselves to consider, also naturally would as "singers so trained from youth up, could not but attain to a high degree of proficiency, and it is not difficult to understand that Gregorian music, homophone though it was, performed by a choir of such singers," would satisfy "the highest artistic requirements."

Plain Song has been divided into (1) simple syllabic melodies, and (2) florid, or melismatic song—the latter of course a contradiction in terms.

In point of time it has been divided into periods; (1) of the first six centuries, (2) from the seventh to the fourteen centuries. Its decline, however, begins at an early date with the introduction of *organum*, a primitive accompaniment of the ninth century. As with early folk song, it was constructed without accompaniment, and its character would naturally alter with accompaniment. The debased period is said to begin with the sixteenth century, which again is only natural. Plain song was the outcome of a primitive era and one that tried to express itself musically under very primitive circumstances and before the sense of key or tonality had developed. It is almost as akin to the art production of the twentieth century, as the drawing of the bushman in his prehistoric cave is to the artistic effort of to-day, but all the same the germ is there. As a means of *contrast*, set off against sensuousness and mere prettiness, Plain Song is valuable. Its exclusive use under the original conditions for a period would be the surest antidote for those misguided church enthusiasts who believe in all that is mediæval and misjudge the rest.

The High Church party in this country has, since the Pusey revival, pinned its belief to the Communion Service as *noted* by Merbeck shortly after the Reformation. They acclaim it as Plain Song. In one sense it *is* plain—but not otherwise. Only the Kyrie and Credo display any sufficient turn of melody—and that Elizabethan. That to the Kyrie is highly appropriate—but the Credo setting is somewhat lugubrious, sounding more of the lament or as an apology instead of a bold triumphant confident setting of the earnest belief of a Christian.

So-called Plain Song varies extremely, but some fine melodies have survived the test of time for the Psalms, Hymns and Responses. We should test and try and eschew the rest.

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The introduction of *organum*, or rigid accompaniment of 5ths and 4ths on the primitive organ of the seventh century, initiated by a select body of voices against the mass of monks' voices—varied now and then by a drone effect (which is still kept up in the Greek church), was the beginning of the *Era of Polyphony* or the art of weaving the voices in accordance with the laws of harmony. The devices of vocal imitation "the redoubling of voices, repetition of phrases, and clashing of voices" as John of Salisbury protested in the twelfth century, all took their rise from the primitive organum, and as was natural in men's communities the melody was soon assigned to the highest (or tenor) voices amongst the monks, the lower voices singing bass; a comparatively small choir of boys' voices completed the harmony in the upper parts so that the tenor part always had the melody. This false bass or *Faux bourdon* arrangement, natural enough where men's voices were largely in the ascendant, is now being revived, but mostly under circumstances which is not practicable from a congregational point of view. This *revival of descant* reminds us that history repeats itself and however interesting the issue of the recent "Tenor Tune Book" is from a musically educative point of view, it is like the passion for all things medieval (however crude), a vain attempt to put back the clock—i.e. for *mixed* congregations.

It should be noted that in the *original* form of Descant, i.e., in two parts, the *heavier* voices took the melody, while a few lighter voices sang the descant above. In like manner it can be heard now in country districts where young men meet together, where the "seconds" part is sung *above* the melody. This arrangement must have been intended or understood when it is said that in Russia in the eighteenth century part singing became popular, but with the theme placed in the *Bass*. In the church the upper descant parts were usually extemporised, firstly by men and later by trained boys. A passion for descanting arose with embellishments, and then in three and four parts. The inevitable resulting confusion hastened the invention of proper notation and measured time, and the introduction of written compositions.

BIBLIOGRAPHY NO. II.

To understand the era of Polyphony as the foundation of all organised church music, it is necessary that the student should refer to and digest the main lines of the History of Church Music. For this *Stewart's* concise "Music in the Church" 1914, and *Dickenson's* "Music of the Western Church," 1902, should be thoroughly digested; also, as a general guide, the author's article on Music (Christian) in Vol. IX. of Dr. Hasting's *Encyclopædia of Religion and Ethics*, 1916.

At this time, i.e., from the eleventh to the fifteenth century, the composers task was not by any means easy. The many and various clefs used—the indefinite square notes, the ideas of key, the old modes, and the strictly

limited modulation under the hexachord must have often discouraged the enthusiast of those days. Ingenious monks introduced the mathematical element in the combination of notes and of various rhythms, and the reading of the result became a perfect puzzle. Ingenuity, misplaced as it was, evolved the art of counterpoint, which largely mechanical at first ultimately reached its climax in the grave, spiritual and dignified unaccompanied (a capella) church compositions of *Palestrina* (1526-1594), in which every voice or part is a melody individually expressed. (For *Palestrina* see *Grove's Art, Rockstro Hist. Ch. VII., Hullah p. 87*).

Looking down the centuries one must realise the immense labours on the part of numberless votaries of the art to reach perfection in this phase of musical art—one now largely lost sight of.

The Carol deserves special attention here as one of the earliest forms of Church music, i.e., as a festal hymn written in metrical form. The ancient Church Fathers advocated the singing of carols at Christmas in memory of Christ's birth. The fourth century "Corde natus" and the fifth century "A solis ortus cardine" attest the great antiquity of the carol. Charlemagne encouraged the use of carols and they were introduced into the early miracle plays in the thirteenth century. For the interesting history of the Carol see *E. Duncan's "Story of the Carol 1911,"* with Bibliography of the subject.

To revert to the more artificially worked out church song, we must not forget that before *Palestrina*, English church composers of Church Masses and Motets were pre-eminent from about 1530 to 1561, though the Flemish *Okeghem* (c. 1513) and *Josquin des Pres* (d. 1521) had previously led the van. Our three great pre-Reformation church composers were *Tye* (d. 1572), *Whyte* (c. 1574) and *Tallis* (d. 1585), whose compositions reached a very high level in the style of the period. It is interesting to note that choral works of our pre-Reformation Church composers are now being unearthed and published.

Lack of the emotional and interpretative effect was the weak point of the *A Capella* school, and the development of modern harmony proved the means of its decay. Other factors there were too.

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The Reformation introduced the chanting of the Psalms in English and the noting of the English prayer book responses to fragments of old church or plain song. The democratic "Choral" appeared in Bohemia in the hymn book of the Bohemian Brethren (1505), and was fully made use of by Luther in Reformed Germany. The Scottish and English and Huguenot refugees in Geneva followed suit and invented or adapted tunes to the metrical versions of the Psalms which had been made for the benefit of the Congregations, who hitherto in the music of the churches had been ignored. They had been "sung to" and "sung at," but so far they could not take their part in the music of their church.

Unfortunately the melody of the Choral was still in the tenor and the playing of the upper or descant parts so upset the congregations that the organ was banned for a century or so (till about 1650) as an accompaniment, in the Lutheran Church. For the same reason the organ was banned altogether in the Genevan and Scottish till the middle of last century. Thus the non-recognition of the fact that congregations must perforce follow the higher part as the melody in other words—the bogey of descant (which modern enthusiasts wish to revive) threw back the development of music for centuries.

Luther's first collection of metrical chorals appeared in 1524, *Calvin's* Strassbourg collection in 1539, *Coverdale's* Psalmes in 1539 and *Sternhold's* in 1549, *Bourgeois'* Huguenot Psalter of Geneva in 1542, Scottish Psalter 1564.

The singing of *metrical* versions of the Psalms proved to be the sign of the Reformation, and the people in this country especially revelled in their new found expression of Religion and Music in one. In England it has lingered to within memory of those still living, only to be extinguished, in spite of protests for many years, by the Anglican chant introduced or re-introduced by the Oxford or High Church movement. It is only fair to say that the same movement introduced or made popular the "merely human" hymns which are our staple fare to-day. Thus what was lost in one way—for the chanting of Psalms cannot be said to be congregational in aspect so far—has been gained in another. Human nature is naturally conservative in habit (whatever it is in politics) and we are not surprised that the introduction of chanting, responses, and the revival of settings of the canticles was greeted as "Popery." Now, however, we are beginning to recognise that the congregation must be considered and the problem is, while presenting the music of the services in artistic form, to consider the capacity of the particular congregation and give them their due share.

A very curious craze set in about the middle of the seventeenth century, and that was a passion for ornamenting the melody with shakes, turns, slurs, etc.; while extinct in this country the ornamentations of Psalm Tunes still exist in the Highlands of Scotland with the effect of almost complete transformation. I am inclined to think the idea had its origin in florid plain song, where certain notes are accented and the rest form a kind of arabesque—the effect in execution is not unlike.

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Notwithstanding some excesses resulting in the destruction of organs and singing books, the course of the Reformation in England was comparatively restrained. After a time the monastic cathedral services were resumed while in Parish churches the simpler service with metrical psalms ran concurrently.

The abbeys which had acted as Song Schools were dissolved and choirs were dispersed for a generation, but ultimately matters were re-organised and the Cathedral Service remained a model for the improvement of the Parish Church Service. It was then that arose our famous and unequalled school of Cathedral composers beginning with *Tallis* (d. 1585) specially known for his faux bourdon or festal setting of the Responses, and *Farrant*. In the

Elizabethan and Stuart periods lived *W. Byrd* (d. 1623), *T. Morley*, *Tompkins. Gibbons* (d. 1625), (the English Palestrina) and *Batten*.

After the Restoration Charles II. tired with "grave and solemn way" of Tallis, Byrd and Gibbons, ordered ye composers of his Chappell to add symphonys, etc., with instruments to their Anthems—"after ye French light fantastical light way;" (T. Tudway, 1730). Hence in the works of *Humphreys* (d. 1674), *Blow* and *Wise* and *Purcell* (d. 1695), we meet with a more modern, dramatic and energetic style inspired largely by the Italian School which at that time was in the ascendant.

Not to enumerate all, *Clark, Croft* and *Greene* (d. 1755) are prominent as showing more modern feeling in the 1700-50 period, while *Boyce, Naves* and *Battishill* (d. 1801) are conspicuous in the Georgian period. Music in the Cathedrals unfortunately now had sunk to a low ebb, and we had so little faith in our unique School of English Cathedral music, that adaptations of foreign concertised masses were freely introduced. Discretion is now being more used in this matter. These adaptations fit in badly with our English Communion Service and do not usually have the right atmosphere.

The rightful traditions were carried on in the last century by the two *Wesleys, Crotch, Smart, Stainer* and *Stanford*, and there is no reason why the sincerely devotional spirit should not be combined with modern harmonies and solidity of construction.

Our Cathedrals are still, in the best sense, Schools of sacred music, in which all that is high souled and masterful in the long list of Cathedral Music may be and is frequently performed. What *Mace* said in 1676 is still true, that we have "in this nation, a large collection, store or provision of the very best pieces of Art (properly fit for that service) that can be produced in the whole world" as well as "men most excellently skilful and expert as to the art of singing." Likewise we have, he says, "allowances left us" "towards a perpetual maintaining of that so glorious and illustrious service", and many stately and magnificent structures, ready built for us," and therefore "we must necessarily have excellent and most exquisite church music." Wordsworth rightly hits the note when he puts it:

"Aspire: Aspire!
So pleads the town's Cathedral Quire,
In strains that from their solemn height
Sink, to attain a loftier height."

With so great a treasure in our Cathedral masters, what then shall be said of the introduction of selections from the concertised masses of Mozart, Schubert, and Weber, with orchestra and the theatrical Gounod. One can understand the appeal such music makes. Much of our cathedral music is *non-characteristic*—though it is devotional, and surrounded as we are every day by music which appeals to the emotions, the average man is more susceptible to the modern harmonies and direct emotional appeal of the continental masters. Personally I would say, let true devotion be the test of whatever age, and reject the rest. Keble aptly says—

"What if to the trumpets sound,
Voices few come answering round,
Scarce a votary swell the burst
When the anthem peals at first."

Music that does not arouse the emotions is valueless—but it must be the *right* emotions—in other words, Church music must be devotional.

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Apart from our Cathedrals and Parish Churches the cause of music did not always run smooth. Among the Nonconformists, the Baptists, owing to persecution, in times of which all singing was suspended for fear of betrayal, had come in the seventeenth century to forbid all singing in their churches, and *Keach's* "Breach Repaired in God's Worship, 1691," was an effort to overcome this attitude of abstention from sacred praise.

Quite a number of pamphlets were published on this question.

The introduction of instrumental aid in worship was also fruitful in controversy. *Dodwell*, in his Treatise of 1700, defended the use of instrumental accompaniment, and contended against the Puritans who, following Calvin, discarded it.

It was not until Isaac Watts (1674-1748), an Independent minister, began to write his numerous hymns, some of them founded on the Psalms, as in the case "O God, our help in ages past," that progress began to be made in public worship, but it was, however, the Wesleyan Revival to which we owe the real revival of congregational worship as a whole. *Charles Wesley* (1708-1788) and his brother John were the moving figures in this. Wesley originally came into contact with the Moravian Missionaries, and from them imbibed a love of the Lutheran Choral, and the sentimentalism of Moravian hymns, so that his musical taste was built on a solid foundation, but unfortunately, his followers enthusiasm outran their discretion. Dr. Allon avows that "Secular melodies were sung to very exciting hymns, and this led to the publication of tune books, in which, with much that was good, secular and florid tunes, with infinite complexities and endless repetitions were inserted and speedily became popular." Wesley himself protested against these excesses.

Billings, the New England Psalm Book Editor describes each part as "straining for victory, the audience entertained and delighted, their minds surpassingly agitated and extremely fluctuated, sometimes declaring for one part and sometimes another." "To adjust the figure," says Dr. Allon, "and preserve harmony, to insert repetitions, and prevent parts becoming entangled," "demanded most accomplished musicians."

Examples of these old Florid tunes are to be found in the old Psalm or Tune Book Collections, tunes such as Desert, Calcutta, Refuge, etc.

Outside the Cathedrals, these florid repeating tunes and the metrical Psalm tunes were the musical items of service, the former being more in use in Nonconformist places of worship. Reverence seems to have been at a discount. The village bands played in the west gallery and charity children formed the choir. Thus the advent of the *Oxford movement* brought the next Revival—a real one in many ways. It brought in a revival of order and reverence, and the restoration of chanting and of the old cathedral masters. The leading lights were Newman, Pusey and Keble. In Keble's refined and sympathetic "Christian Year," published in 1827 we have the inward expression of the Revival. This brings us down to modern times, and for an introduction the reader can be referred to the ensuing "Problems of the Present."

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The study of Church music is such a vast subject that it is not possible here to more than outline its main divisions and of these there remains the study of Passion Music, Oratorio and Church Cantata.

In Passion music we have set forth the history of Christ's Passion and Crucifixion of which the earliest English setting was by Richard Davy (c. 1490-1504).

A feature of Passion Music is the dialogue setting in alternate chant or chorus of the narrative words spoken by our Lord and others. After this there are early German examples of 1573, Vittoria's well known setting of 1585, and those of *Schutz* (d. 1672), *Sebastiani* (d. 1672), *R. Keiser* (d. 1739), and above all of Seb. Bach (d. 1750) down to Stainer's popular Crucifixion of 1837. The *Oratorio*, closely akin to Passion Music, dates, in name at least, from the "Azioni Sacri," given by St. Filippo Neri (d. 1545) in the oratory adjoining his church. Works by *del Cavaliere*, *Carissimi*, and also *Scarlatti* prepared the way for Handel's oratorios, masterpieces written from 1720 to 1759, and the more modern works of Haydn, Spohr, Mendelssohn and Elgar. The *Church Cantata* follows a similar course from the works of Bach founded on some familiar choral, with recitatives, arias and duets, down to the deservedly popular church cantatas by British composers.

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Part II. Problems of the Present.

If one looks down the past three centuries or so, it would seem, to judge by pamphlets issued at various times that hardly any period is without its protest against certain features of Divine Service.

In the Puritan régime it was summed up in the decree of 1571.

"We allow not the tossing of Psalms from one side to the other, with intermingling of organs." This symptom of "divine discontentment" is and was certainly to the good since it betokened a desire for something better, or the pursuit of the ideal.

At the present time one cannot look through the musical journals without being made aware that things are not what many enthusiasts think they should be. Often one can see they are groping for light without having a very clear conception of what the ideal is.

I.—Problem No. 1. is the advocacy of *Unison Singing*. When one looks further, the demand is not for an occasional unison verse in a hymn, but so as to have the way for entire unisonous singing of Plain Song Chants. Looking further still we find that this party is not content with that, but that it is a step to abolish the Anglican Chant. The Anglican Chant, though sometimes its compass errs on the extended side—is without doubt, from a practical congregational view as regards *pointing*, the evolution of the fittest. It needs no added notes, no clippings off—no various endings. But it is not medieval enough, and so the medievalists demand the exclusive use of Plain Song.

Even thinking men are misled as to unison singing. Possibly they are men with high baritone or tenor voices.

Este (or East) in his Psalter of 1592 says the tunes are "put into foure parts, that each man may sing that part which best may serve his voice." *Moore* in his Psalter of 1756 also admonishes the congregation to sing in 3 or 4 parts. "This harmonious way," he says, "is so sublime and ravishing that it is altogether impossible for those who have never heard it to form an adequate idea or conception of it." Moore must have heard north country congregations, where each singing his or her own part form a chorus, filling the whole church. Compared with which the unison drawl one hears in German churches is tame indeed.

Why should the low voice (bass or contralto) be debarred singing their natural parts. Personally speaking as a youth I was singing treble one Sunday and bass the next, and for years found a difficulty in monotoning as high as G (in the 4th space) which is only natural for an untrained bass voice approaching the register transition point. By all means introduce occasional unison melody effects of limited compass for contrast's sake, but let them be short for the sake of the low voices.

II.—Concerning *Instrumental Accompaniment*, it can hardly be said that the use of it is a problem except in the Western Highlands, and Northern Ireland, where it is still tabooed in some churches.

Yet the proper use of accompaniment to prevent flat singing is still a problem, and always will be. *Mace* in his "Musick's Monument" of 1676, says "Experience teaches that no voice has ever been found able (certainly) to sing steadily and perfectly in tune, and to continue it long, without the assistance of some instrument." Again, he says "What shall the *unskilful*—*inharmonious*—*cross-grained*—*harsh* voice be able to do without some certain help or support? Most apparent it is, that it must needs sing miserably out of tune."

And yet in Anglican Churches it is a common custom to sing the responses without organ, with the inevitable result of the *habit* of losing *pitch*, together with lack of *support for the congregation*. Surely the first thing should be the encouragement and support of the congregation to sing their own responses promptly up to pitch and in tune, whether they are ferial or festal. Therefore the organ should always be used. The fine part singing of the choir need not be overwhelmed by the organ, and certainly will not be by the people. Of the continued effect of lack of instrumental support the writer once had painful experience at a Recital to which he listened. An instrument was introduced for the occasion (this not in England) but the powerful choir found the habit of *losing pitch* too much for them,—and the instrument could not be used.

III.—*Modern Hymnody* is the most conspicuous feature of the modern church worship of all branches of the reformed church. From a musical point of view the modern hymn is the lineal descendant of the metrical Psalm Tune. Hymns and hymn tunes were the very life of the Wesleyan Revival which, by its fervour carried all before it. This energy of the Revival though somewhat chastened descended into the tunes of *Dykes, Barnby, Smart, Sullivan, Monk, Hopkins, Stainer* and others. The introduction of hymns not only reanimated the services of the Anglican, Scottish and Nonconformist churches, but also the Evangelical churches throughout the world. Such a musical flood as evidenced by numerous well got up hymnals—in which the clergy have always had the preponderating influence—have not been an unmixed good, either from a literary or musical point of view. Perhaps this was hardly to be expected, and ultimately we may, in reason, expect the evolution of the fittest. The *problem of the present* is how to educate our organists to discriminate and use their influence for the best. And this leads us back to our starting point. Only by study of the History of Church Music, the various origins of the various styles and the necessarily varying treatment. Unfortunately organists are sometimes coerced by ecclesiastics into violating their artistic conscience. The service must be made "bright" (whatever the selection of hymns)—it must be got in to a certain time. "Accordingly", as Archdeacon Gardner puts it, "we hear *German Chorales* like "Hail to the Lord's Anointed" and even 'Now thank we all our God' raced through at a preposterous speed and with metrical precision. The result would be ridiculous were it not sad." Anyone who knows the German Choral as it is painfully drawled out—in Germany, in a sitting posture, with long interludes between the lines—would, we think, be glad to avoid German Chorales altogether. They are quite foreign to our style of services—and a weariness to the flesh. Enthusiasts have spoken of the unanimous singing in the German Churches—but it will not compare with that in our Nonconformist churches; the position of the choir, etc., are against it in Anglican churches.

As an antidote to the German Choral we have what is described as modern "feministic gush," and for examples of this we are referred to weak specimens of the above composers. This is manifestly unfair. All composers and authors have their weak moments. It is the educated organist's part as well as that of the editor, to select the fittest and let oblivion take the rest. Unfortunately, both organist and editor are sometimes overruled by clergy, and music, the predominant partner, suffers. As editor, the clergy on their part are unduly influenced by past association, or some ism (as medievalism), which is responsible for much that is feeble if not downright bad in our collections of both words and music. As Keble puts it,

"As for some dear familiar strain,
Untired we ask and ask again."

From the musical point of view there is always the device of alternative tunes possible, but not on the literary side. When the literary portion of the Hymn Book is selected by literary men, and the music by experienced organist choirmasters—both these of various persuasions and men devout—then perhaps we shall get the ideal Hymn Book; and as the Hymn Book is the link between all the divisions of the Christian Church, it would be worth trying for.

From the literary point of view we are told that in the "Ancient and Modern" "we have to ring the changes upon a comparatively small number of really sane words." And there is probably a good deal of truth in it. Probably, again, the English Hymnal is stronger in this sense, but then the objection is 'the enormous amount of Welsh secular folk song which glares at one from nearly every page'—and it is not always easy to get away from the *secularity* of folk song. Much may be learned from the *national* point of view from the Welsh Hymn Book, and the Scottish Psalter, but in church one certainly expects the *devotional* atmosphere.

IV.—This is the age of the People. The people are asking their full share in their own service—not only in the Hymn and Chant, but also in the Canticle and other full settings. There are churches, especially in Scotland where the whole church will rise and sing through the whole of Jackson's *Te Deum* in F. Though not of the best type, no other *Te Deum* has yet made anything like the appeal of Jackson—and this to cultured congregations. Neither with Smart's in F, nor Hopkin's in G, for instance, can you so unanimously flood the church with sound. The problem speaks for itself, and until it is solved, I would ask for a modernised organ accompaniment to Jackson, to hide some of its superficialities.

Of the Magnificat settings the problem seems easier to solve. Bunnett in F led the way, and some simple, melodious and concise congregational settings will yet come to the front.

As regards the Anthem, the Congregationalists insist in the Congregation taking part. Doubtless such a thing can be and is often well done. *Dr. Allon*, in his "Church Song" takes up the attitude that "God cannot be worshipped vicariously," and that "In nonconforming churches, church song is the only congregational act. The people are preached to, and prayed for, surely they are not to be sung to as well."

V.—In Anglican Churches the modern crux is the musical participation of the people in the Communion Service, especially the introduction of so-called "Mass"—which means usually a concertised version of the Communion Service—and this often at the expense of the glorious heritage of the English Church throughout the world, i.e., morning and evensong. The Anglican Communion Service, as of monastic origin is far too long, and usually almost entirely monopolised by the Choir. We are still in the position of Germany before Luther reformed the Choral Communion and made it a peoples' service.

It may be asked in what manner did Luther popularise the Communion Service: by putting the essential features into metrical form. It does not follow that we should do exactly the same—but it is possible to make these features so that in a Choral Communion everyone can take their part.

Luther was essentially broad minded. He gathered his words and tunes from whatever source pleased him; he acted the part of a compiler in days when the law of copyright did not exist.

His work, however, was for the good of all. He wanted good singers and good music from whatever sources. "Most of the singing in the Mass," he says, "is very fine and glorious, breathing nothing but thankfulness and praise; such as the 'Gloria in Excelsis', the Alleluia, the Sanctus, the Benedictus, and the Agnus Dei—especially the 'Agnus Dei' above all hymns is appropriate to the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, for it clearly sings and praises Christ that He hath borne our sins, and it lovingly and powerfully brings up the memory of Christ in few and beautiful words."

VI.—As showing interest in the Church Music Problems of the present, it is interesting to note the Bishop of Oxford's recommendations as to the Anglican Service as set forth in the introduction to the Rev. Geo. Gardner's little work on "Worship and Music" (S.P.C.K. 1919), viz.:

A.—The abolition of choral devotions in the vestry.

B.—"Though the Psalms are doubtless intended to be sung," better to say the Psalms in country churches—still singing the Glorias and Canticles.

C.—Congregation to sit or stand for an anthem according to whether it is prayer or praise.

D.—In the Eucharist to sing the Kyrie, Collects, Epistle and Gospel, Creed, Sursum Corda, Benedictus, Agnus, Lord's Prayer, and Gloria in Excelsis" but not the comfortable words.

E.—Limit both length and number of hymns.

F.—End Evensong entirely with the Benediction.

G.—"The worst place from which to lead the singing is the Chancel."

As to G that is self-evident. The Royal College of Organists in their recommendations evidently think the same.

As to E.—For the congregation's sake I would say limit the length, but increase the number and contrast them more.

As to D.—The congregation should have the right to take part in all but the Collects, Epistle and Gospel.

Dr. Buck is quoted in Mr. Gardener's book with his evident support. "Organists would do well to remember the aesthetic value of contrast." For contrast sake silence is necessary during the Collects Epistle and Gospel.

The difficult points in the service are the ten times *repetition* of the Kyrie. By all means make the Marbeck Unison setting universal as well as the Plain Song Sursum Corda, but keep the Creed (as the peoples' belief) as simple as possible; a monotone setting with standard final intonations would be suitable. The Sanctus and Gloria are Ancient Hymns and of the people—and there should be some simple, exalted standard hymn setting—but in any case let us not accept the dirge-like settings of Marbeck.

The Benedictus and Agnus could suitably remain with the Choir as to the Communion Anthem when one is desired.

The Rev. G. Gardner, who is a Mus. Bac., well observes "In England the Eucharist will not become the popular service we want it to be until the congregations are, at any rate, given more chance of joining in its singing than they have now often have."

Regarding B.—The Jews did not intend, and do not use all the Psalms for musical worship.

The difficulty in Anglican Churches is that there is always too much chanting, i.e., too many Psalms. Limit the chanting to about 20-25 verses of Psalms and one canticle in each service, as many earnest churchmen recommend; congregations would not be wearied and choirmasters would have a chance to do justice to the selection. The Convocation Church Year selection of Psalms is a great improvement upon the old method, but there are usually too many verses.

It would help mission churches if a list of Psalms best *recited* and offered as *Prayers* were made. A selection of good metrical versions, such as the (Old) Hundredth Psalm would be useful.

VII.—Another Problem of the present—truly a remarkable one—is the issue of the Archbishop Committee's Report on "The Worship of the Church." This report on the Musical Worship of the Church of England was compiled by Clergy—one organist (not of a Parish Church) assisting—is remarkable for the opinions expressed (some of them contradictory) and for evidences of the "irrepressible amateur", writ large across its pages. The pity is that circulating among the clergy it will carry weight and encourage the clerical "irrepressible amateur" still more.

What would the clergy say if the musical profession were to issue a critical report on the revision of the Bible or the Constitution of the Prayer Book? Not that there are not men among the 600-700 University graduates among us (very many with other degrees) capable of presenting such a report—but surely it is a case of the shoemaker sticking to his last. Fortunately the Royal College of Organists have taken the matter up. It is only another sign that the Musical Profession, like all other professions, must organise to carry weight" not only in this but on other vital questions nearer home.

Organisation, however, is not sufficient, and the last and greatest Problem of the present is the education of the organist as responsible for the conduct of the musical portion of the church's worship.

Organists must organise and educate. Organise themselves as a power in the church. Organise so that every aspiring organist go through a course of reading and study. Organise so that the leading men may educate the clergy, not only to take their part in the church Song creditably, but, to teach them so that they may understand not only what has cost them many years of hard study to learn but also the urgent PROBLEMS OF THE PRESENT.

On a Few Points of the Organ Building of the Future.

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An old proverb has it that "a prophet is not without honour save in his own country," but one does not necessarily conclude that out of his own country the profession of a prophet is an easy one; therefore, in writing this article on the future evolution of the organ, I would feel it imprudent to have undertaken this task with the pretension of defining what would be the organs of the future. My purpose is more modest, as I intend only to show in what direction it appears to me that pioneers should direct their experiments towards improving the capabilities of the organ.

I possess a copy of the interesting Lecture delivered in 1908 before the London Conference of the Incorporated Society of Musicians by Mr. Francis Burgess and entitled, "The Organ of Fifty Years Hence"; but since that date things have progressed, and have brought before us a great many results which open new ways. The moving-picture organ is born and thriving; it has grown, and has developed in a direction different from the Church organ. Its first quality is not ponderous dignity; its musical function is extremely various, its duty principally orchestral; therefore, its tone quality must be plurivalent. Occasionally, and for short periods, it will have to be used in conjunction with a religious scene running on the film, and amongst its foundation stops it will contain what is necessary for reproducing a Church tone. Church tone, in itself, is a thing which in England has much varied during the last fifty years. In France, the Parisian school and most provincial builders (with the honourable exception of Monsieur Theodore Puget of Toulouse, a pioneer of the new capabilities of organ tones and mechanism) have remained in the style of 1870—Cavaillé-Coll; and often English organists, relating their ramblings in France, mention the pooriness of tone given by slotted diapasons and the blatant character of bombardes, trumpets and clarions.

Church tone, *in se*, does not exist. Church music, with a devotional religious character could be better defined, although admitting many varieties of form and style. Played upon the piano or organ, certain pieces of music, written for an orchestra, sound quite religious in style, notwithstanding that the tone qualities are quite different. For ages past the idea of religious music has been suggested to our minds by the organ tone, which gradually has much varied from the time of Frescobaldi to our own day, but which has always retained the general characteristic of ponderous sustained tones, which cannot be imitated by the orchestra.

Undoubtedly the organ in the Churches will remain an organ, but less by the limitation of its tones than by their appropriate use; for the finest Cathedral organ can render, in the manner of huge orchestrians, very light and even quite improper dance music! but such abuse would not be tolerated, and the Church organist is confined to a choice of pieces more or less concordant with the sacredness of the place.

Now if we consider the concert organ as a powerful orchestra of pipes, or the chamber organ as a reduced orchestra, the case becomes quite different, not only because the style of music here is free from any religious obligatory prescription, but because the acoustical conditions are not identical. Concert Halls very rarely possess the magic qualities of rolling reverberating tones presented by high vaulted and aisled Cathedrals, in which the surface of reflecting walls and glass is so great in proportion to the absorbing surface. Everyone knows that the same organ pieces, with the same combination of

stops, will not sound the same in a resonant Church and in a Concert Hall even when empty, and still more unlike when quilted with auditors' heads and garments. Consequently, both by the possible character of the music to be played and for acoustic reasons the concert organ can aspire to greater musical efficiency on other lines than the Church organ.

Concerning the chamber organ, and particularly of the theatre organ (which you may call, without detriment, a keyboard orchestra), one may safely say that there is no theoretical limit to their future capabilities. But apart from these classifications of organs based upon their limited uses (which the true organist, well conscious of his task, must always have in consideration), the future of the organ must consist in the improvement of the capabilities offered to the player, supplying him with tone qualities he may require and the means for their convenient control in order to give birth to the special musical emotions appropriate to the Church, the Concert Hall or the Theatre.

It is not of the future of the aesthetics of the organ I would venture to speak, but only to examine the elemental means that future organ builders will offer to composers and organists for creating musical beauty, such means, comprising sonorous agents, being chiefly pipes governed by keyboards.

I have not here to examine the evolution of tonal design as influenced by Schultze, Hill, Cavaille-Coll, Willis, Walker, Lewis, Casson, Weigle, Hope-Jones and other pioneers of the art. Each one possessing his theoretical basis, its realisation bringing forth a characteristic of artistic value. Musical Reviews opening their columns to considerations on organ matters contain, apart from personal quarrels, a lot of interesting contributions, but too often a big lot of rubbish, because even a *bona fide* correspondent is not *ipso facto* competent in all complex questions relating to the organ; the abuse of comparisons and analogies, too often presented as explanations, is quite delusive; we want demonstrations, not mere opinions and dogmatic utterances.

Experientia magistra rerum, and it is by experimental data, easy to perform upon existing instruments, that I will try to suggest to the reader the ways to be attempted by practical men if they wish to increase the capabilities of the organ, but for such study it is necessary to liberate oneself from prejudices; not to consider the organ as an intangible instrumental block, as the King of instruments, but rather as a Republic of instruments, a federation of families of pipes which must live in *entente cordiale* by harmonious blending. One must forget, in some degree, the past and historical standing of the organ, even its traditions, and consider it as an instrument which has by no means reached its perfection, and which still requires improvements and changes.

And now let us consider a few experimental researches, easy to perform, for gaining experimentally based convictions, each one judging for himself as to their usefulness in the future improvement of the organ.

A BETTER USE OF THE NUMBER OF EXISTING PIPES IN A GIVEN ORGAN.

Tubular and electro-pneumatic actions allow facilities unknown to the tracker system. Borrowing, extension and duplication, as proposed and used by Thomas Casson and others, and which, on their first appearance, have been met with much bitter opposition upon theoretical grounds, are now considered as legitimate, because the only important requirement for an organ scheme is its tonal efficiency when played. These methods, if judiciously used, and not driven to absurdity, have proved that they provide tonal effectiveness. Therefore, they will remain in the future development of the organ.

Thomas Casson's duplication, namely, borrowing the 16ft. pipes of the Manual department an octave higher in order that they may be used as an 8ft. stop upon another department, may reappear, as it has already reappeared in America, and may become a characteristic of the future organ. It avoids the old reproach of duplication of the same stop on the same manual. I say the "old" reproach, because its apparent value, when you read its theoretical effectiveness from music written upon staves, is quite different from its real effectiveness as judged by the ear, as, for example, when a trumpet or a

second diapason is used as 8ft. and 4ft., not alone, but combined with a group of other stops.

I am told that old firms, which a few years ago would not have admitted duplication on the same manual, are now using it with great advantage, and with no disturbance of tonal balance. Stops playable from different manuals as did Elliot & Hill in their Birmingham Town Hall organ, 1825, have received a modern realisation by Hope-Jones, and with the device used by Compton whereby it is possible to play upon a special manual not having stops of its own, any desired stop belonging to the other manual. This is the "collective" manual. The same methods could be applied to pedal stops. But it is usually demanded that the pedal, if possible, must have its special foundation tone voiced on other lines than the manual. Then of these 32 or 44 special pipes, only one at a time will be speaking. This is all right when playing soft or *mezzo forte* polyphonic music, where the pedal part must be distinguished by its tone, but when you add manuals to pedal, the tone becomes mixed, and in the full organ, where the maximum of power obtainable is required, 31 pipes out of 32 remain silent. They are large scaled pipes and costly. Could they not be called to sing in the *tutta forza* effects? I think it is possible. Let us have a small additional chest of treble pipes, and let us have this extended pedal stop playable from the great, *an octave higher*. You will gain a powerful increase of effectiveness.

EXPERIMENTS CONCERNING PIPES USED IN DIFFERENT POWERS.

In my small three-manual chamber organ, I have on the great an English open diapason by Palmer, voiced on 4in. ; coupling swell to choir I may group harmonic flute 8, salicional 8, stopped diapason 8, flautino 4, and by nice adjustment of the swell boxes (for the great is enclosed) I can obtain a synthetic tone very closely reproducing the open diapason tone. You can play a scale, C. on great, D. on choir, E on great etc., without any remark from an auditor in the adjacent room or from a blind organist seated by you on the organ bench. I have many times performed this experiment, joined to the following one ; as the powerful and bright tone of the English diapason is not familiar to French organists, I asked them, hearing or playing the diapason alone, how many stops are drawn ; and they named Montre 8, (the slotted French diapason), flute 8 and flute 4. The organ of the Trinity Wesleyan Church, Leamington, contains many such synthetic effects, notably a synthetic diapason tone consisting of viola 8, flute 8 and flute 4. The ear being the only judge here, we find that a single stop in a swell may afford the same combination of fundamental and harmonics as the group of four aforesaid stops. Quite probably the same experiment, minutely analysed by the phonodeik of Dayton Clarence Miller, would show slight differences of shape in the resultant curves ; but here we have to consider the musical tone alone, and if the ear is satisfied that is all we want ; and even more than we want, for if you complete the test by playing written music with the diapason alone or with the aforesaid group of swell and choir stops, or with one hand on great and the other hand on choir with swell coupled, the result will sound quite right, for it is musically correct to have the bass singing with a perceptible difference of tone from the treble. We may then agree as to the legitimacy of one octave of pipes used in different powers to supply the base octave of two or more stops. *Nil novum sub sole* ; before the War, in the columns of "Musical Opinion," a correspondent (Mr. Swinburne, I believe) proposed a similar device.

Similarly I know by experiment how the bass of my 4ft. flautino, divided into treble and bass in the special choir box, may be advantageously coupled to the bass of great diapason, dulciana or gamba, for it imparts to their lower twelve notes a vivacity of attack and roundness of tone by virtue of its prompt speaking octave tone. It is when using orchestral transcriptions with a self player, that I have appreciated the great value of a 4ft. bass so coupled (in different powers by the swell box) to the 8ft. stop.

That is the elemental fact. Is it susceptible of more extended application in the future of the organ? I think so.

STENTOR PIPES.

The first time I became acquainted with Stentor stops was in Frankfurt-Main, and a few days after, in the Lieder Hall Stuttgard organ, I was again amazed by the volume of their rather coarse tone when played separately, but well enough blending with the remainder of the organ. In the works of their maker, Mr. Carl Weigle, I had in my hands these then called "hauptdruck stimmen"—high pressure stops—showing a circular mouth as a steam whistle. But a more refined tone was obtained by Walcker's Seraphone pipes with two adjacent mouths, and finally with the ordinarily disposed mouth by Laukhuff. In the tone of diapason, flute and gamba, they are already effective for 4 inch wind, but higher pressures are *preferable*; they are great "windeaters," but with mechanical blowing this objection vanishes.

Here is the result of a comparative experiment: from a model pipe, helped by Mr. Talon, a well reputed French voicer, imprisoned as myself in Lille, I made CC, GG, C, E, G and middle C diapason Stentor pipes. At first, although easily speaking, we regarded them as a failure, for compared to the pipes of my chamber organ in a small hall (28ft. x 16ft. and 14ft. high) their power was not predominant! . . . But having been transplanted in the St. Pierre and St. Paul's large Church, 35ft. x 250ft. and 70ft. high, and fed with only 4 inches pressure from the west gallery organ (32 speaking stops by Merklin) these six pipes delivered in a chord such a volume of pervading tone, that, to obtain the same efficiency, seven ordinary stops of 8ft. had to be drawn; 42 pipes to match 6 Stentor pipes, the tone of these latter being a bit less bright on account of a gamba in the group of the 42 pipes. This demonstration was quite a revelation to musicians, clergymen and organists, who in France are unaware what an amount of tone may be given by a large English open diapason copiously winded, which is practically a Stentor diapason. Voiced on high pressure, closed in a swell (which even when opened destroys a part of their pervading tone) the Stentor stops playable from different manuals may impart to any desired division of the organ their remarkable qualities.

Used as a solo stop, accompanied by flue work, the Stentor is predominating, as a kind of "Flue tuba" in the manner of the Grand Cornet of an old French organ, but with a much more refined tone.

Two lessons are to be learnt from this aforesaid experiment: 1st, Stentor pipes sounding deficient in tone if heard in a small room, may, on the same pressure, deliver a great amount of sound in larger buildings. 2nd, Stentor pipes, in the diapason scale, supply a powerful foundation tone. But it must not be supposed that in future organs one single Stentor will remove the necessity for diversely toned 8ft. stops for constituting the same quality of foundation tone. It will be, in small and medium sized organs, with moderate pressure, a valuable adjunct for massive effects; in large organs, treated as octave and mutation ranks by extension in different pitches, the Stentor family (as we see further on) affords new possibilities in organ tone.

In addition to Stentor pipes, I think that the future organ will use Vincent Willis's ingenious device of superposed langward with internal airway leading external air, or free air from the interior of the pipe, to the proximity of the flue of the pipe. This invention facilitates a large increase of power of tone without interfering with its purity, or one can obtain from a large scaled pipe a development of upper partials, similar to those found in narrow scaled pipes, but with a greater volume.

The story of the organ shows the old instrument quite devoid of expressive swelling power; then after Jordan's invention the swell device was first used only for the treble, then extended to tenor C, afterwards to CC and, after many discussions, enclosing the choir and solo, and now even a special division of the great organ itself and of the pedal! All this evolution governed by the musical need of stops playable in different powers!

It is beside the mark to object that the music of Bach, Mendelssohn, Rheinberger, Widor, Guilmant and Franck does not require these improvements for it is music conceived without swells, or for mono-swell organs, but

often benefits by an artistic use of a swell or swells, although written before these facilities were available.

In the evolution of art, "*antiquitas sæculi, juvenus mundi*" is true, but especially when the manifestation of the art has to be transmitted to auditors by mechanical means. But these considerations would draw me away from my subject!

Let us return to stops available in different powers. Before the modern method of partly enclosing the great stops, the octave and mutation work was calculated for use with the full foundation stops in medium sized organs; in large organs, the multiplicity of 4ft. stops and the presence of multiple compound stops allowed a choice for combining the octave and mutation appropriate to softer combinations.

With enclosed mutation ranks on the great, you can modify them and associate their silvery tone to any soft stop. In medium sized organs, it is an invaluable resource and a considerable economy to have in the swell box a full toned principal for full great with reeds, and its strength reducible to the degree required for full great without reeds or for any softer grouping of stops. Such a device is not often met with, but it may become a resource demanded of builders by those ordering the organs of the future, because it unites relative inexpensiveness to increased differentiation of tone. It may be necessary to locate these pipes in a small swell box above the rackboard in the manner of a mounted cornet, with access for tuning, etc. etc.; but the ingenuity of a competent builder will easily find a good solution of any difficulty which will be encountered. I may, without indiscretion, say that Monsieur Puget, the well-known and reputed organ builder in Toulouse, is now finishing a chamber organ of 40 stops for a connoisseur, Mr. Fr. Lauth, who ordered that each rank of mutation should have its special stop key and its special swell box. The whole is enclosed in the choir swell box; for the purpose of building at will the composition of mixture work and adjusting the relative power of quint, tierce, septime, etc. when sounding together; also for using them separately as elements for creating *timbre* by adding upper partials to any selected stop, for compound tone studies.

COMPOUND TONE STUDIES.

Here we enter into quite a new chapter of practical acoustics, based upon experimental researches whose results are astonishing if compared with the dogmatic affirmations accepted and repeated by musicians in general and by so many organ builders and voicers concerning tone.

Mr. Dayton Clarence Miller in his interesting book, "The Science of Musical Sounds" demonstrates that the old notion that the pitch of a compound musical tone is determined by the predominance of its lowest component, called fundamental, is subject to some revision. He shows that when the flute in its lower octave is played loudly, the first upper partial or harmonic, the octave, is the most prominent, its intensity being thrice the fundamental intensity! Then comes the double octave with twice and the quint with about two-thirds of fundamental intensity; it is the alloy of these widely different intensities which gives the Gamba tone of the lower register in the orchestral flute.

If we consider a keen viol d' orchestre, specially created and voiced for giving oboe imitative tones (reedless oboe pipe) in the 2ft. C the intensity of the partial tones is as follows:—

quickly vanishes ; and if differential tones are still heard by the tuner close by pipes, at a few feet they become inaudible, and therefore unable to really reinforce the prime tone.

But our ear may be easily suggested to perceive a considerable sensation of prime tone, even with only a small percentage of it being present, if convenient upper partials are simultaneously heard ; higher up we mentioned it to have been demonstrated for the oboe, violin, and flute. Moreover, this fact concords with the Cavaille-Coll's enregistreur harmonique : its 30 pipes, conveniently tuned at the pitch of the 30 upper partials of a prime tone, when called one by one to sound simultaneously, little by little build a resultant tone gradually imposing the sensation of the prime tone ; it is an illusion of our auditory sense. Therefore, it is easy to understand how in the old organs, when 14 or even more mutation ranks were added to four softly voiced stops, namely : stopped 16, stopped 8, open diapason 8, principal 4, they could give a very distinct sensation of slightly increased foundation tone, beneath the explosion of fiery upper partials supplied by properly voiced pipes. It was a special tone colour of the old organ ; with a peculiarly effective suggestion of increased prime tone, much more by the presence of its upper partials than by their too weak differential tones.

But the reader will ask why, having to speak about the future evolution of the organ, I extend so abundantly upon old organs. My purpose is to show that real organ tone cannot be built on paper by a more or less fine looking list of stops. The compound tone laws, of which we begin to surmise more and more clearly the conditions, are to be considered in the future by an alliance of old and new laboratory records with actual trials. Practice has realised very fine acoustic effects in the tone of stops and in their harmonic blending ; the laboratory will explain why it happens, and how results can be surely obtained and varied in such and such directions, for obtaining new and valuable tones in the organ.

The laboratory researches as planned and performed by Mr. Dayton Clarence Miller have not only dissected complex tones into their vibratory elements ; they do more ; having tried, he succeeds in wonderfully rebuilding these tones by the juxtaposition of vibratory elements, separately produced by instruments quite different from the one producing the tone under consideration. Before Mr. Dayton Miller, many investigators, chiefly Helmholtz and Koenig, had likewise attempted the synthesis of analyzed tones, but with imperfect results.

Similarly the vowel sounds pronounced by the human voice can be reproduced by using groups of organ pipes separately giving the dullest tones ; they are stopped pipes of large scale, low mouthed, in order to get 95 per cent. of fundamental tone with very faint upper partials. Not only have eleven vowel sounds been so reproduced in a fashion quite satisfactory to the ear, but the natural voice pronouncing the vowels, and the group of pipes emitting the synthetic vowel tone, generate similar curves registered by the research apparatus. The same methods applied to the tones of orchestral instruments were satisfactory ; violin, clarinet, oboe and others have been imitated by stopped pipes voiced at the pitch and intensity indicated by the analysis. A reed tone obtained from dull sounding stopped pipes will appear incredible to many organ builders and voicers, if not quite unknown to Mr. Compton. But a little reflection will show that the old organ builders long since obtained a quasi-reed tone by the five-rank mounted cornet, and by varying the pitch of the ranks they nicely imitated the Glockenspiel tone, chiefly in the treble of the so-called "cornet carillon." It is quite logical to suppose that the organ of the future will present its mutation ranks each to be drawn separately and contained in its own swell box in order to impart the silvery effect of mixtures in different compositions and powers ; and that in each box will be put a second rank of pipes of the same pitch, but of quite dull tone for building special orchestral tones and perhaps vowels ! Why not, if their judicious use prove equal to the admitted usual *voix humaine* stop?

The remarkable capabilities of quintatön pipes for creating clarinet, saxophone and oboe-like tones when coupled to string-tone pipes voiced *ad hoc*, are not very often used in England, but the labial clarinet and labial oboe are valuable acquisitions. All the more as each component stop may be used separately, keeps in tune with the other pipes and, by the prompt speaking of the Quintatön in the bass, gives the impression of quick attack by the coupled pipes. There is a wide field open to discover what modification to the labial clarinet or oboe tone will be caused by the suitable conjunction of dull toned pure upper partials. No doubt surprises are in store for enquirers in that direction.

COMPOUND TONES OBTAINED FROM EXTENDED STOPS.

Before writing the following lines, I paid on, Easter Monday 1921, a recent visit to Montauban Cathedral (40 speaking stops) where Puget introduced, as an experiment, a Stentor Violin diapason extended in 8, 5-1/3, 4, 2ft. By the courtesy of the Canon Coutensou, I performed the following experiments:—1. A choral being played on Foundation stops, the mutation work and the quadruply extended Stentor Violin diapason were alternatively added, this latter affording a brilliant and *quasi*-reed tone, pleasantly contrasting with the mutation effect, and well blending with it in the "tout ensemble," establishing a degree of transition between mutation and reeds in crescendo. The theoretical "holes" in the number of effective pipes, for playing all the notes of the written chords, were not more perceived by the ear than the breaks in the mutation work.

2. I asked the organist to play these four extended stops as a solo. He answered it would be a horrid thing; but he was amazed to obtain such a rich tone, that it could be accompanied by swell reeds, the box half-closed. When the 16ft. Bourdon was added to the solo combination, it caused a smooth reed tone, without altering the impression of a quick attack in the lower notes.

Therefore such a stop extended in 8, 5-1/3, 4, 2 pitches reveals itself as giving a new mixture effect if added to foundation and played in chords. Used as a solo stop, it is a new tone; and the artistic usefulness of such extended stops becomes evident if we imagine flute, quintation, gamba and perhaps reed stops (?) so extended.

Experience will prove it efficient or not; our ear being the sole judge of played music, we want tones which are a result, much more than an immense number of pipes, which are only means for obtaining tones.

THE POSSIBLE REAPPEARANCE OF FREE REEDS IN PIPE ORGANS.

The great objection to their use is that they do not remain in tune with the flue work. This is true, but Hamel in 1850 found a solution in having three ranks of reeds tuned at different temperatures, so chosen that at least one rank was in tune with the flue stops. As harmonium reeds are not so costly as pipes, the solution used by Hamel is to be considered if the tone obtained is valuable. (Also see British patent specification No. 17689, 1915). No one can speak of large scaled harmonium free reeds, even without pipe resonators, until he has heard the Physarmonica in a large Cathedral building such as in Berne or Ulm (nave 150ft. high). It is very effective, and combined with the flutes the tone is very fine and pervading.

The tone becomes powerful if these large scaled free reeds are supplied with resonators of half-length, in the fashion used by Welte & Son for imitating the brass band tuba playing *mezzoforte* in their orchestrons. I have compared such CC free reed bombardon with CC pedal trumpet of a Church organ in Lille; the tone was more smooth, but with a volume comparable to the trumpet tone; and by shading the aperture of the resonator with a cardboard, the tone, without altering its pitch, could be reduced to a thin harmonium tone. As the adjustment of half-length resonators for free reeds does not require the same nicety as for beating reeds, a good tone is more easy to obtain. But great power may be imparted to free reeds. English organists may have gained the conviction when hearing the 32ft. bombarde in Leeds Town Hall

(I don't know if it still remains), and good orchestrions show it in a pronounced degree.

ORPHEAL REED STOPS.

M. Cloetens, the clever organist and organ builder of Brussels, gives this name to a full rank of 56 or more beating or free reeds, all speaking into the same resonator, in the wall of which they are perpendicularly planted. This contrivance had previously been attempted, but not brought to a point of achievement such as is obtained by Cloetens by the use of certain peculiar features of construction, which render the tone refined and homogeneous in solo as well as in chords. The resonator being closed at the end, the Orpheal gives the old regal tone; with tremulant, it turns into a vox humana; if you open the end and adjust to it terminals of various shapes, the tone becomes brighter, fuller, oboe-bassoon like, and even organ-trumpet like, but in a subdued power not possessing the same éclat.

During the leisure imposed by the German occupation of Lille, in the same St. Peter and St. Paul's Church where I had compared Stentor pipes and free reed bombardon with stops of the West Gallery organ by Merklin, I tried Orpheal tones, both with free and beating reeds; their boots were perpendicularly planted in a wooden quadrangular trumpet resonator, horizontally directed towards the altar as a "*trompette en chamade*." Beating reeds gave strong bassoon tones, and the free ones a tone comparable to the free reed *cor anglais* of this organ, but more powerful; and reduced, with a closed box effect, by closing the end of the resonator. So the principle of the Orpheal opens a new way for obtaining smooth reed tones; and if located by the side of other pipes of a non-enclosed manual, you can, by a very simple swell action at the end of the resonator, use it in several powers. It is inexpensive, it takes little room, is easily tuned and in small organs would be a very effective 16ft. pedal reed in different powers, and even in different tone qualities by the use of movable sliding terminals adjusted to the resonator.

But the Cloetens Orpheal develops all its quality when allied to piano tone by a device in which the same piano keyboard moves the piano hammer and gives wind to the reed. It imparts a special attack to the reed tone which "swallows" the percussion tone if played staccato and which gives a stringy quality quite peculiar. The beating reed remains in tune with the piano wires.

Long before Cloetens' Orpheal, other builders unknown to me, but certainly in 1904 Puget had, by electric action, coupled to the great organ of Mr. Pauilhac in Toulouse a Pleyel grand piano, which provided the sensation of percussion attack to the reeds; and in the organ of Mr. Boittiaux, the same builder had affixed a device by which the organ self-player actuated a piano-forte at will. This feature appears now in the large American pipe organs whose specifications have been recently published by "The Diapason." Its use combined to the pedal could be admitted, even in the Church organ, for giving variety of tone and vivacity of attack to the bass pipes. Extended to the whole compass of the manual, this device would reproduce the peculiarly fine tone qualities of the Orpheal; and more or less modified by flue tones, it offers to the organist new artistic resources for orchestral effects in the concert and cinema organ. Don't object that the piano will have to be nicely tuned before each concert. Is it not what you do for the organ itself?

Here we have to mention: the Choralcelo, the Pianor and other instruments producing sustained tones by the action of electro magnets (through which flow interrupted currents) upon piano strings or ribbons of steel. The tone obtained is as that of the tuning fork, and the partials naturally absent are provided in quantity and pitch by corresponding generators controlled by draw-stops. The Choralcelo produces tones of great carrying power with unlimited possibilities of combining compound synthetic tones. Its artistic place is marked in the future organ.

EFFICIENCY OF EXPRESSIVE POWER IN THE ORGAN.

Quite sterile discussions are periodically arising in the musical press about the use, abuse and even inutility of Swell boxes, and concerning the compared

expressive capabilities of organ and orchestra. Let us here try to clear the debate by experimental documentation.

Violinists, flautists, hornplayers, pianists when they alter for expressive purpose the tone of their instruments, can obtain it by dynamic action of their bow, of their touch, or their blow, as well as the organist by the use of the swell pedal.

But now if we consider the modification produced in the tone by this dynamic action, we find great differences : in the organ the moving of shutters does not modify the number and relative intensity of partials yielded by the pipe and constituting its tone, but only their reaching power towards our ear.

In orchestral instruments, the Phonodeik of Mr. Dayton Miller has demonstrated (with greater precision than before) that the same note played *piano*, *mezzoforte*, or *forte* does not contain the same partials, which vary in number, pitch and relative intensity, so the volume and the quality of tone are simultaneously modified.

The difference between orchestra and organ thus appears quite striking. However, a question remains to be cleared up by scientific researches, namely, whether the disturbance caused by narrowing and finally closing the passage between the shutters is the same upon the reaching power of every member of the unchanging group of partials emitted by the pipe ?

Certainly the amplitude of vibration is a great factor in the reaching power of partials, and as we know that the action of the swell shutters modifies the tone, we must conclude that all the pipe vibrations cannot reach our ear through the obstacles with the same relative intensity ; thence a modification both in power and in perceived upper partials. So the difference between organ and orchestra concerning the essence of their expressive power would be diminished. But there is another difference and a very important one in the performance of the dynamic action itself, which is instantaneous for bow, touch or blow of instrumentalist, whereas in the organ the inertia of mechanism to be moved (even with the help of electro-pneumatics) render this dynamic action less susceptible to instantaneous minute variations.

Without opening here the question of " old pump handle " *versus* balanced swell pedal, the old device presents advantages for quick *sforzando* effects ; and if the church organ does not want such orchestral effects, the concert and cinema organ may require them as a useful characteristic.

Therefore it is possible that the future organ presents the old *sforzando* pedal governing a special set of easily moving shutters of small inertia, affixed to one side of the box, for quick accentuation.

In the same way, the recently tested " Expressive touch " invented by Mr. Compton, causing the note to sound louder or softer according to the force with which the key is struck, will perhaps, open a totally new field to the player of the future organ.

It should be remarked that the *Crescendo* by stops, adding or suppressing them gradually, when artistically used, imparts to the organ something of the nature of orchestral expressive power. Returning to the aforesaid Montauban trial we see a new artistic capability by creating tone by partials of a four times extended stop, gradually called or muted by a device, combined or not, at will, with a small-inertia swell-box.

In the state of acoustical science concerning music, we must guard against *ex cathedra* affirmations, for even when the physicist has minutely ascertained the number, pitch and intensity of the co-existent partials of a tone, their reaction upon the human ear still remains subject to physiological laws of the perception.

Our auditory system is the involuntary receiver and transmitter to brain of resultant vibrations, which are appreciated as musical tones by our intelligence, but the auditory system remodels the vibratory periods delivered by sonorous bodies. So the differential or beat tones, which we hear and we know to be agents of the quality of tone, have no physical objective existence ; they are purely subjective, but they impress our auditory sense as if they were real tones ! Our ear is a transformer : so practice has demon-

strated that an electro-pneumatic swell pedal obtaining expression by only sixteen successive sudden partial closings or openings, gives us the sensation of continuous crescendo or diminuendo without breaks, as if obtained by a direct mechanical connection.

There are illusions of the hearing as of the sight, and they have become elements of our artistic emotions ; but here we would enter into the realm of psycho-physics . . . let us return to the mechanical antecedents of sensation.

ACTION.

The important question is that the church or concert organist may well hear how his instrument sounds ; this necessitates that the keyboards shall be at a convenient distance from the pipes. Surely in the organ of the future the action will be an electric one, combined or not with tubular devices in certain parts of the organ, or possibly with the Bowden flexible spiral wire, a system to which organ builders have not perhaps paid sufficient attention.

The future organist will have stop-keys, so easy to move, all sorts of fixed and adjustable pistons, perhaps with the already known luminous pearls clearly showing, as in telephonic boards, what stops and couplers are grouped in each prepared combination.

All kinds of couplers, not solely for power by sub or superoctaves disturbing the tonal design, but for creating tone and expression, will be found, including the melodic bass and the melodic soprano attachments, tremulants and vibrati, on the condition that they may be instantaneously working at speeds variable by the foot while it moves the corresponding swell pedal. Pizzicato touch, sustained tone after the key has been released, gradually receding power while the key is still held, swell boxes so coupled by pairs that when one is opened the other is closed, and other subsidiary devices will be features of the future concert orchestral organ, but will require a highly developed musical sense for their artistic use.

Now we ask if instruments so improved can be easily mastered by one single player, whose controlling capabilities are limited even if he were supplied with the device of Father Willis for moving swell shutters by a flexible tube terminated by a cigarette-holder-like mouthpiece !

This consideration leads us to auxiliary keyboards with a duplication of their own control of stops, couplers and swells, a thing difficult with the tracker system, more easy with tubular, and quite easy with electro-pneumatic action.

Every one knows that very fine transcriptions of old classic or of new intricate music are more effective when transcribed for piano *a quatre mains* than *a deux mains*. But a transcription for two pianos, leaving each pianist quite master of his expressive means, is to be preferred. *A fortiori*, the four hands transcription, for two different consoles, will be more desirable for the organ, enabling the players to show the architecture of the music and to suggest orchestral tones by imitating them in a manner interdicted to the pianoforte.

But here we are confronted with the peculiar psychology of the virtuoso organist, who too often is a musician of special mentality ; a bit vainglorious and proud of artistically governing unaided bigger and bigger instruments ; and we truly admit, it is quite a legitimate conceit. Nevertheless the populace, particularly in cities not possessing municipal orchestras, have right to musical emotion, and this possible collective enjoyment counter-balances the solo player's selfish satisfaction.

Consequently, if in the future, new organs appear offering new capabilities of musical beauty on the orchestral side, and if these capabilities by their number and diversity are beyond the full control of one solo organist, we can claim that several players are necessary in order to display to the utmost degree the combination of their multiple expressive powers.

Likewise, composers wishing to hear how their music sounds and wanting to interest the possible publisher better than by a relatively colourless piano arrangement, will find in the future orchestral organ a much less expensive

means for an artistic transcription. Difficulties of execution, imposed upon instrumentalists by modern tendencies, will be easily mastered by multiple keyboards.

The artistic legitimacy of orchestral music transcribed for organ is a chapter of aesthetics beyond the scope of my present study. Now you will allow me a comparison ; a piano transcription of symphonic music (and there are magnificent ones by Liszt) gives of its orchestral rendering an idea analogous to the idea you may form of a picture reproduced by its black engravings ; whereas a fine organ transcription is to be compared to the idea of this picture from a beautiful chromophotogravure reproducing the colouring. Naturally the most artistic reproductions don't exempt you from seeing or hearing the original works.

CONCLUSIONS.

This study is not for physicists but for organists and lovers of organ music ; therefore I have deliberately left in the shade, for my explanations, new ideas concerning : under partials, resultant and beating tones, vowel theory, objection to Helmholtz's dicta, etc., etc., and the need of a synthetic revision of what we think to know about generation and audition of tones ; these constitute a " New Testament " in Acoustics.

My conclusions are self-contained in each division, where I have striven to propose, as far as possible, experiments easy of reproduction by anyone wishing to gain a personal idea of their value.

I believe that in the future, researches based on more scientific lines will afford a good lot of modifications in the dogmas of organ-building.

Having reached the end of this sketch on the possibilities of the future organ, the reader will grant that I have not attempted any travel in the realm of fancy. Notwithstanding it is possible to conceive that, with the progress of mechanism helped by science, certain inventions such as the violin player, so delicate but so artistically realised by Hupfeld, or the violin tones from synthetic partials, the choralcello, the anemophone, in which the piano strings, after the hammer shock, have their vibrations sustained by a jet of air, and many other dormant devices will be revived, with reliable improvements making them desirable in the concert Orchestral organ, together with quite new unforeseen inventions.

Then by the side of the genuine pipe organ, the new tone-producers, incorporated in the orchestral organ, will constitute, played by several artists, a new keyboard orchestra, which, helped or not by the ever inimitable string quartet, will be able to give artistic musical enjoyment to "*hominibus bonæ voluntatis*," either by the interpretation of chosen transcriptions, or by playing new special music adapted to display these special tone creating and combining capabilities.

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Anybody who casts an eye over the following list of books and pamphlets will see at once that its contents are of a very miscellaneous character. "From grave to gay, from lively to severe" I have endeavoured to steer my course through the whole domain of literature on the organ. The field is so extensive that I can offer here only a portion of what has come under my notice. Books of the "Tabulatur" and "Orgelschule" species are but sparingly introduced, for their name is legion; mere leaflets, consisting of nothing but the names of stops in individual organs—such as can be supplied in handfuls by every organ-builder—are rigidly excluded; tradebooks, with a few noteworthy exceptions, are ignored; and I have been obliged to forgo my original intention of including magazines in my survey. Nor can I profess to have made a personal examination of all the items chronicled: in many instances I have had to rely on the testimony of previous investigators; but I have made every effort in my power to check the accuracy of the information derived from such sources. Yet, in spite of all my care, no doubt many errors of commission as well as of omission have crept in, and I shall be very grateful to any reader who will be kind enough to point them out to me.

ORGANISTS' ASSOCIATIONS. THEIR ORIGIN AND DEVELOPMENT.

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Musicians in general, and, we venture to assert, organists in particular, have been at all times reluctant in expressing a desire for organisation, or in taking upon themselves much trouble with a view to the formation of any regular constituted body more or less calculated to uphold and further their particular interests and ambitions. Through some peculiar method of reasoning, musicians, amateurs quite as readily as professionals, have seemed to prefer to tread the path alone; to exist, as it were, entirely upon their own resources and attainments. Evidences have often been forthcoming which denoted a kind of fear or misgiving lest close communion with those engaged in a similar capacity, might result in the divulging of secrets—secrets of which the individual musician deemed himself to be the sole possessor. This characteristic nervousness has not, even at the present time, entirely disappeared, but it certainly is less pronounced than was the case a few years ago; indeed it is gratifying to find that to-day, there is a more complete recognition of the fact that whatever gifts of which any one of us may be possessed are not entirely our own but are gifts so conferred that all may participate. In associating with those engaged in like occupation we must of a certainty intensify our own abilities and, at the same time, equally assist others to a fuller realisation of the innumerable phases of art. Furthermore this mingling together of ideas and graces invariably results in the brightening of the path of everyday existence and in rendering the common task much easier of fulfilment. Viewed from another standpoint, one at first apparently somewhat paradoxical, the musician has, especially in the leisure hours which may have fallen to his lot, always sought for and best enjoyed the fellowship of kindred spirits. None have been more happy than those so assembled upon the cessation of regular duty or following upon some specially arranged rehearsal of music. The jokers, and those more rude than kind, have, for years past, been reiterating the statement that a gathering of those musically inclined, a full orchestra, or a large choir, could be obtained within a few minutes if, together with the request for such assembling, came the announcement that refreshment would be provided. Without in any way wishing now to take sides or argue on this particular matter, we must frankly admit the fact that the first step taken in the direction of forming an association of organists did actually occur on the occasion of a dinner party in which some half dozen or so Wakefield organists were prominent. Notwithstanding a suggestion made through the columns of the "Musical Times" so far back as October, 1853, to the effect that the formation of an association of organists was both desirable and necessary for preserving the general interests of organists, yet was nothing attempted in this direction until 1890 when, as already intimated, a definite move was made by organists resident in Wakefield.

In the latter part of 1889 half a dozen organists met at the house of an enthusiastic vocalist. During the evening the host genially, if somewhat cynically, remarked that he had never known so many organists meet without "fratching." A suggestion was made during the evening to try and arrange for the organists of the town to meet at dinner during the ensuing Christmas season, and to invite an organist of distinction as a guest. This was carried out, and on January 2nd, 1890, the event took place with Mr. J. Naylor Hardy, Mus. B., F.R.C.O. (Wakefield Cathedral Organist) in the chair, and

Dr. J. Naylor, Organist of York Minster, as principal guest. At first an annual event was the utmost that was intended. However, the idea of something more permanent evolved in the minds of some of the promoters. At Mr. Hardy's suggestion, Mr. A. E. S. Sugden, prepared a paper on the possibilities of an Organists' Association, and the lines upon which it might be worked. This was printed and circulated amongst the organists of the district and, at a meeting on March 2nd, 1890, after careful consideration, the Wakefield and District Organists' Association was formed, Mr. Hardy being the first President. The two chief objects set before the newly formed association were "the promotion of friendly intercourse among its members; and the interchange of opinion on matters musical." The basis of membership was made as broad as possible. The only condition was the holding of an organ appointment, honorary or salaried. No distinction was made. Churchman or Non-conformist, amateur or professional—all were qualified to enter. Experience has proved the wisdom of this course, whilst the good-fellowship, the kindly feeling and brotherhood has remained firm from the very beginning. During the whole of this long period (1890 to the present day) as full of interest as it is remarkable, for its success, this, the first association of organists, has had the services of Mr. A. E. S. Sugden as secretary. No account of the origin and development of these organisations could be considered complete in any sense which did not unreservedly acknowledge the earnest and ungrudging labour so spontaneously and so generously given by Mr. Sugden. As one of the founders and as one who has sustained the keenest interest from the commencement of the venture, he has earned, indeed has secured the gratitude of every thoughtful musician.

In 1903, an association working on similar lines was formed in Huddersfield with Mr. Arthur Pearson, Mus B., F.R.C.O., as first President and about five years later new associations were started at Derby and Oldham. From thence onwards, further progress was not particularly striking, yet the numbers gradually increased until the present time with its total of some forty associations.

The number of members in these respective associations varies very considerably. In some cases it is upwards of 300 whilst in one instance, it is not more than 16. The annual subscription is determined by each association for itself and here again the figure varies from 4s. to 10s. 6d. In almost every instance, amateurs as well as professionals are admitted, the essential qualification being, in a general way, the holding, or having held, an appointment as organist. Deputy-organists are equally eligible. A new President, often the Vice-President of the previous year, is usually elected each year and the alternative appointment of professional and amateur has been found specially acceptable. In this way is the interest maintained and new thought and ideal available.

It was only in the natural order of things that, as time went on, and as the number of associations slowly, yet surely, increased, an attempt should be made to co-ordinate and cement these several units into one properly organised body—one with a correspondingly broader outlook and more ambitious endeavour. It was on the suggestion of the writer that, on May 31st, 1913, a meeting took place in Southport for the express purpose of discussing the question of forming a federation of the then existing associations of organists. Mr. Sydney L. K. Crookes, of Glasgow, also keenly interested himself in the movement and the outcome was a very successful and representative gathering of northern musicians. Mr. S. W. Pilling, of Welton Hall, East Yorkshire, President of the Wakefield Association, presided. It was unanimously decided that the various associations should be affiliated, and that the delegates should meet in Manchester on November 15th, 1913, for the election of officials. The attendance at the Manchester meeting was still more encouraging and eventually the following were elected as officers for the first year, viz., President, Mr. S. W. Pilling; Hon. Treasurer, Mr. H. Burrows; Hon. Secretaries, Mr. John Brook, Mr. S. L. K. Crookes and Mr. A. E. S. Sugden. It was also arranged that two delegates from each affiliated association should together

constitute the Executive Committee and that the capitation fee should be two-pence per member. The title "National Union of Organists' Associations" was adopted, and certain Rules and regulations fixed. The great war intervened, and unmistakably interfered with the progress of the Union, yet, none the less, something was accomplished, and several new associations were enrolled. At the present time thirty associations are affiliated to the National Union whilst about a dozen more are in process of formation.

As the number of associations thus increased, and the operations of the National Union became more and more important and far reaching, so was it obviously imperative that the constitution of the Union and its rules, be placed upon a sound basis, and the qualification for membership therein as clearly as possible defined. Thus, on September 7th, 1920, on the occasion of the First Congress, a new Constitution and Rules were approved at a General Meeting of the members. It was perhaps more than a coincidence that the first Congress should have been held in Southport, where, as already intimated, the inauguration of the National Union had been decided upon some years previously.

The publication of the "Quarterly Record"—the official journal of the Union—was begun in October 1915 under the editorship of Mr. John Brook. It has received quite remarkable appreciation, and is, to-day, apparently more than ever acceptable.

The National Union of Organists' Association had a humble and unpretentious beginning; it has already attained to responsible and important position and the future is full of possibilities for even greater development. The necessity for such united effort is unmistakable, and the comradeship now existing among the members is an outstanding feature of the whole effort.
